COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

Owls

Most people like owls although it can be quite eerie to hear one calling on a still moonlight night. The most recognisable call is 'too – whit too – whoo' but the Tawny owl is the only one to make that sound and it is in fact two owls calling with one answering the other. There are five species native to Britain. Locally three of these species are common, the Tawny, Barn and Little owl. The latter is little larger than a song thrush and is not truly native to this country as it was introduced from the Continent in the late 1800s. Little owls have brown plumage speckled with white and it is quite common to see them sitting out in trees during the daytime. They nest in holes, most often in trees but also sometimes in walls, cliffs, straw stacks and even in the ground. Their diet consists mainly of insects such as moths, cock chafers, crane flies and worms but occasionally they may take small birds and mice.

The white Barn owl can quite often be seen hunting across fields and along



roadside verges even during daylight hours. Close up they are not as white as they appear for their backs are a golden-buff colour. Their call is more like a drawn-out strangled shriek and their diet consists predominately of small mammals such as mice, voles, rats, although they have also been recorded occasionally as taking small birds, moles, fish and even bats. Barn owls nest in old buildings and hollow trees For decades their numbers have been declining and the trend for cutting down old trees and converting barns houses has aggravated the into

problem. Fortunately they have adapted to using specially designed artificial nest boxes instead. Barn and Little owls prefer open farmland but the Tawny likes to be amongst woodland and normally nests in holes in trees. It feeds on small mammals and will take birds up to the size of a partridge.

The attractive Long-eared owl make its home in coniferous woodland and nests in old squirrel dreys or magpie nests and also occasionally on dunes, marshes and heaths. Continued on Page 8

GARDENING TIPS NO 44

What a difference a year makes! This time last year we were all waiting for the winter to go away! This morning as I type this article the sun is shining promising a beautiful spring-like day. However, don't be in too much of a hurry with your tender plants, although the weather may have improved quite early in March there is still time, right the way through into the latter part of May for frost to occur. The early warmth has brought plants in general into their flowering cycle much earlier this year and as a result dead heading – yes, even though it is only April, will be one of the jobs to do this month. In this regard I am thinking mainly of the narcissi family. Early flowering shrubs will also be shedding their blossom so pruning will be another task earlier than usual!

This month we can really start planting almost anything except for the more tender subjects. I have no doubt that those of you with vegetable plots will already have taken the chance to get ahead with quite a lot of work. Conditions now should be satisfactory to plant all of the remaining vegetables with the possible exception of sweetcorn. I have never tried the idea but I suspect that you could bring on your plants initially under glass and then plant them into the cropping situation when the danger of frost has passed. It's a thought that has worked well with other subjects and it could give an earlier crop, subject to growing conditions through the summer months.

Many of the annual flower seeds sown in the greenhouse last month will be ready to prick out into plant trays. With seedlings like antirrhinum and asters I like to plant forty into a large seed tray. This gives them ample room to grow to a size whereby they can be planted out into their flowering positions. Some other plants like dahlias grown from seed need more room to grow and I suggest about eighteen to a large tray. Indeed I often put these, in their seedling state, straight into a $4^{1}/_{2}$ diam. x 3inch deep (11.5 x 9cm) pot. This gives the young tubers space to grow.

Autumn or even January sown sweet peas should now be ready to go out into their flowering positions. A week or so before planting them out give the soil a top dressing of blood, fish and bone and work the fertilizer into the top few inches of soil. One of the main problems this year where there has been a heavy rainfall through the winter will be leeching. All the wet weather will have drained many of the nutrients out of the upper layer of soil. If you are spring digging your plots then many of the nutrients will be brought back to the surface layer but whatever the case a good application of compost or a general fertilizer like Growmore will not go amiss. It's possible to see Short-eared owls locally but they are more commonly found on Northern open moorland where they nest on the ground. Their main diet consists of voles and numbers fluctuate in direct relation to the vole population.

Most species of owl hunt at night. They all possess soft loose plumage enabling them to fly silently. They not only have excellent eyesight but their acute hearing also helps them detect their prey. Because owls eat their prey whole the indigestible parts such as bones and fur are formed into pellets which are regurgitated. Owls sit on their eggs as soon as they are laid therefore the chicks hatch out several days apart. This safeguards the survival of at least one or two if food is scarce as the oldest and therefore the strongest ones survive. Only the female incubates eggs but both parents care for the chicks. When angry or frightened owls will snap their beaks and hiss.

Lawns, oh dear, if yours are anything like mine you have a big job on hand! Two of my grass areas suffered somewhat in the very dry period we had last summer. Partly due to the dry conditions, but I subsequently found it was more due to ground based insect life which I shall watch out for more carefully in future. The resultant bare patches, which I could not re-seed last autumn, have developed into severe patches of moss during the wet winter conditions and, my word, they are growing well! Having given the overgrown grass that remains an early cut, I shall use the remedy suggested last month to get rid of the moss. I then will probably have to seed the resultant bare patches to repair the lawns. This brings a problem in its wake as I would normally like to give the lawn areas a spring feed but, it is unwise to treat newly seeded grass in this way! I will report back in due course!

Meanwhile I wish my readers all the best for the new season. *Roy Coughtrey*



RECIPE PAGE

Easter Biscuits

4oz margarine 4oz sugar 1 small egg 8oz plain flour 1tsp grated lemon rind 1/4 tsp cinnamon or mixed spice 2oz currants A little milk



- Cream margarine and sugar together, add beaten egg, flour and rest of ingredients and mix to a stiff dough.
- Roll out 1/4" thick and cut into 4" rounds. Brush with egg white and dredge with sugar (optional)
- Bake until golden brown in a moderate oven.

Simnel Cake

1 6" rich fruit cake - bought or made 1/2 lb marzipan - bought or made

- Cut off 1/3 marzipan and roll out into a round slightly less than the diameter of the cake.
- Cut the cake across the centre and place the marzipan between the two pieces.
- Using half the remaining marzipan, roll out into a round and cover the top of the cake.



- Using the other half of marzipan make 12 small balls—they represent the apostles. Place them evenly around the top edge of the cake. Brush these over with a little egg wash.
- Put into a hot oven until the balls are browned. When cool, pour glace icing into the centre and decorate with chicks, chocolate eggs etc.

INCINERATOR UPDATE

This April the County Council are due to vote again whether to abandon the incinerator. Since the last vote (28th October 2013) much has changed. Last time Council officials incorrectly claimed, ending the contract would bankrupt the Council. Since then emails, from the Government Department responsible for Local Government, showed the threat of bankruptcy was in fact false and at least two cabinet members knew this. Instead of alerting their colleagues they kept guiet and supported the myth of "Financial Armageddon". Norfolk's leader has now written to try and pressure Eric Pickles in to making the planning decision before the Council vote. The County officials behind the incinerator are finding it increasingly difficult to justify continuation. At £105 per tonne the 'Willows' would be the most expensive incinerator on this scale anywhere in the UK. Official figures show the UK average cost is £78 per tonne. Alternative offers could save up to £8.5M annually if used instead of the 'Willows'. Even if Norfolk had to pay a ridiculous £20-£30M penalty to abandon the contract it is still much cheaper to get out than pay 'over the odds' for 25 years. Some authorities negotiated to minimise or avoid expensive compensation clauses. For example, when the Sherwood Forest incinerator failed to get planning permission, Nottinghamshire County Council did not have to pay any compensation; they even managed to recover £2million in legal costs. Those who 'negotiated' the 'Willows' contract 'on our behalf' have some explaining to do. Despite the failure of some councillors, Alex Kemp has stuck to her pledge to fight the incinerator. Some councillors seem to think 'crossing their fingers' is a 'good enough' effort, they would do well to follow Councillor Kemps example; she finally left her party to continue the fight free of the party whip.

NHS BLOOD AND TRANSPLANT

Give the gift of life this Easter

In the run up to Easter, NHS Blood and Transplant is asking Anglia residents to think about those less fortunate than themselves and give blood, as well as giving gifts and chocolate to friends and family.

According to Derek Carr, Lead Donor Relations Manager for NHS Blood and Transplant for the Anglia area:

"Easter is a time of celebrating new life and what better way to celebrate than to help those who need it, by donating blood. It's an important time to give, as blood stocks are often more vulnerable around public holidays, when people go away or are busy getting out and about as the weather improves.

"If you have an appointment to donate at an upcoming session, please keep it, especially if you are an O negative and B negative blood donor. If you don't yet have an appointment booked, please make one to donate in the upcoming weeks and help us to keep stock levels healthy.

"We are always grateful to donors who respond to calls such as this and appreciate that in doing so they do give up some of their precious time. Please bear with us if there are slightly longer waits than normal on session as a result."

Donors with blood group O negative are typically known as the "universal donor" as their blood can be given to patients with a different blood group. This can prove vital in an emergency situation when there may not be time for an immediate blood grouping test to be carried out

B negative blood is in demand because certain ethnic groups are more prone to particular diseases that require blood, such as sickle cell anaemia and thalassemia and a higher proportion of these ethnic groups are Group B. Group B negative blood can be given to B negative or B positive patients. Just 2% of the population are B negative.

Blood donations are a vital part of treatment for many conditions including cancer and long term illnesses, people involved in accidents and in maternity care. Hospitals across England and North Wales need 7,000 units of blood every day and each unit can save the lives of up to three people.

Anyone aged between 17-65, weighing more than 50 kg (7st 12lbs) and in

general good health could potentially start saving lives by becoming a blood donor.

There is no upper age limit for donors who have donated in the last two years.

1. NHS Blood and Transplant (NHSBT) is a joint England and Wales Special Health Authority. Its remit includes the provision of a reliable, efficient supply of blood and associated services to the NHS in England and North Wales. It is also the organ donor organisation for the UK and is responsible for matching and allocating donated organs

2. Donors can search for sessions, change their contact details, book appointments and change/cancel their appointments in real time on www.blood.co.uk

3. There are apps available for Android and Apple Smartphone and tablet devices which enable donors to search for their nearest blood donation session

4. NHSBT's donor line - **0300 123 23 23** - is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week with all calls charged at the standard local rate, even from mobile phones

5. NHSBT collects 1.8 million units of blood each year from over 23,000 blood donation sessions in more than 3,000 venues

6. Hospitals in England and North Wales need around 7,000 units of blood every day to treat patients with a range of health issues

7. Only four per cent of the eligible population are active blood donors

8. A unit of blood is measured as 470mls (or just under a pint)

9. There are four main blood groups – O, A, B and AB. Group O is the most common and therefore the most in demand. Over 95% of the blood collected is processed into its main components – red cells, platelets and plasma. A regular supply of blood is vital – red cells last 35 days and platelets only 7 days

10. Female whole blood donors can give blood every 16 weeks, while male blood donors must wait 12 weeks between donations. Platelets can be donated every 2 weeks

Following the public meeting on 11th March to discuss proposals to alter

Wereham's Primary School Catchment area, Wereham Parish Council has received the following correspondence from Norfolk County Council's School Admissions Team:

County Councillors at the meeting of Children's Services Overview and Scrutiny Panel this afternoon (13/03/14) supported the proposal to change the catchment area for Wereham to James Bradfield and as part of this decision specifically supported the need for transitional prioritisation for younger siblings at Hillcrest including transport support. This would mean free transport to Hillcrest for these protected pupils (those who have an older sibling on roll who will still be on roll Hillcrest when younger siblings starts). Subject to the final decision the LA will discuss the change with Iceni Academy and Downham Market Academy and hope and anticipate both schools will amend their admission arrangements to match the change and the transitional arrangements.

The recommendation will now be forwarded to the County Council's Cabinet who will make their decision on the above recommendation and the other proposals for admission arrangements in 2015/16 on 7 April 2014.
