COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

This has been the longest dry spell for 40 years and exceedingly high temperatures combined with a moisture sapping wind have led to serious drought conditions. Following a wet winter and spring, there is apparently enough water in reservoirs and underground water levels are high but a 30% rise in consumption has led to problems delivering sufficient through the pipelines. During the severe drought in 1976 restrictions on water use were introduced. Ironically, a Minister of Drought was appointed and shortly afterwards saw the start of several weeks of heavy rain. We've all found that some plants are better at coping with drought conditions than others. When its' really dry those at most risk quickly set seed. They themselves might die but they attempt to reproduce before this happens. Everywhere the grass is brown, but grass is very resilient and will come to life again when we get some proper rain. The immediate shortage of grass however is of huge concern to livestock farmers who not only rely on it as summer feed for their cattle and sheep but just as importantly to provide fodder for the winter. Streams which normally provide natural drinking water for livestock have dried up and alternative supplies have been needed. Locally many farmers have built reservoirs for watering their crops and the irrigating they do must have helped wildlife survive. Wheat is not normally irrigated and might look as though it's ripening but it is in fact dying off. The grain will be sub-standard and straw supplies may be an issue later on. Heath and grass fires are an ongoing problem. A layer of peat lies beneath heather moorland and once this catches light it will continue to burn underground making it extremely difficult to extinguish.

Like us animals and birds suffer from the heat and use various ways of trying to keep cool. Obviously seeking shade is the primary method. Nearly all animals sweat but to varying degrees. Perspiration evaporates providing a cooling effect and water consumption is increased to compensate. Humans, primates and horses have the most sweat glands. To a lesser degree other animals sweat not only through their skin but also the pads of their feet. Cows have only 10% of the sweat glands we have and as a last resort attempt to cool down by opening their mouths. Birds and many other animals, in particular dogs, pant to avoid overheating. Water evaporates from the moist lining of the oral cavity and pharynx. To lower their temperature species which have big ears increase blood flow to them. Pigs, hippos and rhinos however don't have any sweat glands so rely on wallowing in wet mud to protect themselves.

To date (11th July) there is little sign of the drought breaking but no doubt by the time you read this it will be raining. Nature has an amazing way of balancing things out so by the end of the year this heat wave may be but a distant memory although higher food prices may act as a reminder. *Jill Mason*

FREE HOME ASSESSMENTS ON OFFER

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes. Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.


Children are well catered for too, with a range of games and activities and a variety of food outlets plus a licensed bar and vintage teashop will ensure that nobody goes hungry.

Dawn moved into the Rectory at Beachamwell in 1966 with her husband Bob and three children Nigel, Hilary and Simon. There she established a nursery school which several local people will no doubt remember attending.

Dawn and Bob later moved into Friar's Oak, a bungalow they had built in the grounds of the Rectory. After Bob died Dawn moved to Barton Bendish where she lived for more than 20 years and where she joined in with various activities. When she gave up driving she wasn't able to venture out as much as she would have liked, but was still as bright as a button when it came to maintaining her independence. She mastered the art of shopping on line with Waitrose, getting her prescriptions delivered, etc. The charity Age Concern Swaffham and District helped her a lot by getting her to hospital appointments.

Dawn was only poorly for a day or so and died soon after they took her to hospital that evening. She'd always said she didn't ever want to move away from the bungalow and garden she loved so her wish was granted. She really was quite a character and our condolences go to her children and grandchildren, all of whom she was justifiably very proud of. **Jill Mason**

St Mary's Church

As the third Sunday of the month, when our second service would have been, was a joint Deanery service at Stow Hall in Stow Bardolph, where all 33 of our Deanery Churches join to worship together in an open air service, there was only one service in St. Mary's in July, which was a Service of the Word. It was another beautiful summer morning with the sunlight streaming through the



stained glass and creating moving patterns across the stone floor. We and some lovely hymns including one of my favourites, *Dear Lord and Father of Mankind* which asks God to *forgive our foolish ways*. Considering that the congregation consisted of five people and that number included the preacher and the organist, one couldn't help but wonder how many more services will be held in this church before it is reduced to the status of a museum. Of course, there is no telling how long people will be willing to preserve a building which has lost its purpose and St. Mary's might well end up like the ruins of St. John which only serves now to shade sheep from the hot sunshine.

After the service, we had an interesting discussion about the role of the church in rural communities where the population is much more concerned with preserving the building than in using it as a place of religious observance. The preacher talked about his past life working as a detective in the Metropolitan Police which involved the investigation of gruesome murders. His later conversion to Christianity has enabled him to perceive his past life and the people he dealt with in a more forgiving light and hope has come to transcend despair. In the light of our discussion, he suggested the possibility of arranging a monthly discussion group in which interested people could explore their beliefs. *James Knox Whittet*

Wereham Cemetery Memorial Safety - The Parish Council are trying to trace relatives or those responsible for memorials. The Wereham Parish Council have recently reviewed its responsibilities for health and safety within the Wereham Cemetery and commissioned a report with a registered qualified inspector of all memorials. The inspector advised the Parish Council of 17 memorials in the cemetery that they classify as 'dangerous' to public safety and therefore in order to remedy they recommend fitting what is called a 'naam bar' for the current memorial to remain in use, these 17 are memorials that we would like to hear Please contact the Clerk if you are responsible for a from people about. memorial in the cemetery. Other options that could be considered other than this, would be for the creation of a new memorial, or arrange for it to be laid down on the ground if your memorial is one of the affected ones. The Parish Council recommends that purchasing records are checked for any guarantee of workmanship which it may be possible to claim from. The inspecting company is able to provide costs of fitting a 'naam' bar. If you are the person responsible, relative or have knowledge of contact, a response would really be appreciated, as you will have realised, this is a health and safety issue which the Parish Council are obliged to resolve as soon as possible. The Parish Council will be reviewing responses in July 2018.

Dog Fouling -We will all agree that this is just not acceptable for dog owners to not collect and dispose of their dog's mess, and it has been going on for far too long all over the village where this has not happened. Latest that the Clerk had noticed was dog fouling about 10 steps from the bin at the end of Lammas Lane! The Row in particular is an area where dog owners at times do not pick up their dog mess, sometimes outside residents front gardens. This is not acceptable and if you are someone that does this please refrain from doing so. The Clerk has noticed that walkers particular who let their dogs off on leads almost certainly do not know where their dogs are going and need to keep their dogs on

a lead if they cannot collect their dogs fouling. The boundary of Wereham extends past the houses and this includes the country walk roads and pathways which are there to be enjoyed by all. For a resident of Wereham to not collect their dogs mess in the village or in the surrounding countryside is without due care and is just not acceptable. Wereham Parish Council and the majority of residents do not want this blighting the village any longer and the Clerk will be stopping any dog walker in the village to check they have the necessary dog bags for the foreseeable future. The Parish Council has supplied and pays for three dog bins and for them to be emptied across the village but unless certain dog owners take their responsibility they are in vain. This has been increased to four with one now installed at the Wretton Road sign at the bottom of The Row, and soon another on Church Road/Back Lane Junction. They other three are located at the end of Lamas Lane (Flegg Green end); along Cavenham Road towards the public footpath field end; and on the playing field near the village hall entrance.

Wereham Heritage Group will be working in collaboration with reunion organisers during the afternoon. The foyer and community room in the village hall will be open from 2.00pm to 4.00pm with a display of Wereham photographs and other village images projected onto screen, with tea, coffee and biscuits available. The village hall event is not restricted to those attending the school reunion, so if you are curious about Wereham and its history please pop in to see us. We are always keen to acquire more old photographs and will have a scanner set up to make copies of any images you are able to bring us on the day. With demolition of the old hall scheduled soon we are especially keen to build up an archive of pictures taken both inside and outside the building. So many events have been held there over the years — parties, weddings, celebrations and dances, and I'm sure may photographs exist— do bring along your pictures for us to scan!

We will also have copies of Wereham entries in the 1939 Survey for people to look at. This document, showing address, name, date of birth, occupation and marital status was then referred to as the National Register and was drawn up following visits by enumerators to every civilian household in Great Britain and Northern Ireland on 29 September 1939. The Register was a critical tool in coordinating the war effort at home, and was used to issue identity cards, organise rationing and more. Amazingly this extensive record remained in use by the NHS until 1991 when paper records were discontinued, and name changes between 1939 and 1991 are shown. The records of people still alive and born less than 100 years ago are not viewable (closed records). If you had family members living in Wereham at the time this document may be of particular interest to you.

Carrot and Ginger Soup



Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons of olive oil
- 1 large chopped onion
- ♦ 1 2 crushed cloves of garlic
- 1 tablespoon of finely grated fresh root ginger
- ♦ 12 oz sliced carrots
- ♦ 1and 1/2 pints vegetable or chicken stock
- ♦ 2 tbsp fresh lime or lemon
- ♦ Salt and pepper

Method

- ♦ Heat oil in saucepan over a moderate heat, add the onion, garlic and ginger and cook gently for 5 6 minutes until softened.
- ♦ Add sliced carrots and stock. Bring to the boil then reduce the heat and simmer for 15 20 minutes until the carrots are tender.
- Puree the soup in a liquidiser or food processor with the lime or lemon juice (in batches if necessary) until smooth.
- Strain the soup through a sieve and return to the saucepan to reheat.
- Serve with soured cream in each dish of soup and sprinkle with chopped parsley
