From The Rectory Escape to the Country?

You may well have seen the television programme called Escape to the Country. The opening title sequence depicts numerous trains, traffic and people hurrying in a cityscape. Then, to draw a distinction, what appears to be Ann Hathaway's cottage, or a similar thatched abode surrounded by abundant gardens and farmland.

Who can blame people for wanting to escape from the urban sprawl and the frenetic way of life. People living in inner cities and in large towns do feel that the countryside offers a form of escapism. All too often they are viewing the possibility of living away from an urban environment through rose-tinted glasses. On one occasion I heard a participant saying that she and her husband wanted to live in the country 'so that my children can play in the fields'. They seemed to have ignored the fact that 'the fields' are workplaces and are there to grow crops and as pasture for livestock. Farmland is not a playground.

And that free-range children, as well as pet dogs, can cause immeasurable damage and can be in some danger. The right-to-roam only extends to well defined pathways and areas designated on official maps for open-air recreation as defined in the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000.

Like its title sequence the television programme does tend to show a chocolate box image of places where people want to move. A recent episode showed a couple who wanted to move to this area. They showed some shots of Downham Market. With carefully angled views of the Town Square and the High Street. The presenter stated that there a selection of independent shops but we didn't get to see Tesco, Morrisons, Iceland or even the market. Many of us have been fortunate enough to choose to come in live in West Norfolk. When I said I was moving here there were congratulatory remarks by friends back in Royston which, because of its easy commute (if there ever could be such a thing) to both London and Cambridge is one of those frenetic places from which people want to escape; not to mention the cost of housing. We are fortunate but let us remember that about 80% of our fellow citizens do live in urban areas. And they live with the problems associated with that. A recent survey found that people in urban environments knew more about characters in soap operas than about their next-door neighbours! This applied all the more to those living in high-rise blocks of flats. There is a great deal of suspicion and even fear of wanting to make contact with someone they don't know. One of the consequences is that people do feel trapped. Yet another reason that they want to escape! I am truly thankful that what appeared to pragmatic circumstances have allowed me to choose to live here. Because that nebulous feeling of freedom and quality of life exudes an air of tranquillity. It has given me the opportunity to become part of the local Church of England Ministry team. Perhaps the move here was not simply pragmatism but a calling to serve in West Norfolk.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

Conservation measures here in Barton meant the estate adopted the new concept of 'No Mow May' which means leaving lawns uncut allowing any flowers to bloom and feed native bees emerging from hibernation. Our personal bee conservation efforts involved David making a bug box. It surprised us how quickly many of the holes were sealed over but alas, earlier this week, a greater spotted woodpecker destroyed the lot.

Did you know there are 250 species of bees to be found in the UK? There are 25 different kinds of bumble bees, about 224 species of solitary bees, which as their name implies don't live in colonies, but only one honeybee. Solitary bees nest individually although sometimes in close proximity to each other. Some have weird names such as the Box-headed Blood bee, the Pantaloon bee and the Hairy-footed Flower bee which makes a habit of visiting tubular shaped flowers. The Common Mourning bee behaves like a cuckoo laying her eggs in nests of other bees where they hatch and eat the food intended for their own young!

Different kinds of solitary bees nest in holes in the ground, often in lawns, old holes made by beetles and hollow stems which they seal with a plug. Three species make use of empty snail shells. Mason bees nest in cavities often in walls. Mining bees live underground and leaf cutters use leaves to line their nests. Bumble bees are sociable bees which live in colonies of anything from a few dozen to several hundred, sometimes colonizing bird nest boxes.

There is only one species of honey bee in Britain with very few existing in the wild. They are nearly all kept for honey production in colonies of up to 40,000 in each hive. Honey is liquid when extracted from the comb. It comes in different colours and flavours depending on which flowers the bees have been collecting pollen and nectar from and takes variable lengths of time to set. Rape honey sets particularly quickly.

Bee species are divided into two types, short tongued and long tongued. All can pollinate flowers although individually they have preferences. Some flowers are shallow and easily accessed by all bees, but longer-tubed flowers are more suited to long-tongued bees which include the garden bumblebee, common carder bumblebee and most cuckoo bees. Short-tongued species include the white-tailed and buff-tailed bumblebee and the honeybee.

Not all bees enter the flower from the front when collecting nectar while at the same time pollinating the flower. Some known as robber bees cheat by chewing a hole at the back of the flower and stealing the nectar without pollinating the flower. Other bees also make use of these holes. Although most species of cuckoo bees tend to have long tongues, they still rob most of the time. One experiment revealed that more bees were collecting nectar by robbing rather than foraging. The proportion was higher when it was cloudy and cooler and bees opted to save their energy by robbing. (Jill Mason Barton Bendish)


DATE FOR YOUR DIARY

RECIPE PAGE

Crab and Sweet Corn Soup

1tbsp corn oil; 4 oz cooked crab meat; salt; 1tbsp rice wine or dry sherry; 12oz can whole corn kernels; 2 pints chicken stock;

2 lightly beaten eggs (whole eggs or simply beaten egg whites); 2 level tbsp corn flour

Heat oil in saucepan.

Add crab meat, season with salt and wine.

Add drained corn and chicken stock.

Bring to the boil, reduce heat and simmer for 5 minutes.

Add corn four blended with a little cold water.

Cook for a few minutes then finally add eggs and cook for a further minute.

Sweet Potato and Lentil Soup

4 big sweet potatoes; Big mugful of yellow or red lentils

1 large onion; 2/3 dried chillies or a very small one chopped (be careful with them, add bit by bit and taste regularly) or you could just add some black pepper); Tin chopped tomatoes;

Seasoning; Greek yogurt/crème fraiche for topping (optional); Chopped parsley (optional)

Peel and chop the sweet potatoes into very small pieces and boil until fairly soft.

Meanwhile chop and fry the onion in a large separate saucepan until soft.

Add a pint of water, add washed lentils, bring to the boil and leave to cook on a low flame.

When the sweet potatoes are ready mash them and add to the lentils when they are nearly cooked.

Keep the liquid from the sweet potatoes to top up the soup if it becomes too thick.

Stir it all in and watch over it, giving it a stir every so often.

When it is thickening and the lentils are soft add some of the very finely chopped chilli (optional), some salt and the tin of tomatoes.

Add water or potato juice if needed.

Add Greek yogurt/crème fraiche for topping and some chopped parsley

Open Gardens 26th June

Well, we weren't expecting the overwhelming crowd we had last year but this year still managed to exceed expectations. The weather was kind to us although it was rather breezy.

A day like this takes a lot of organising and many people in the village were involved in some way or another either opening their gardens, selling tickets or in the catering department. We had around 350 visitors and a steady stream of visitors meant that I never left my garden all day! There didn't seem to be a minute when someone didn't want to ask me about something, tell me about their garden or folk I knew called by. David's photo albums of old Barton proved immensely popular and there was someone or other looking at them all day.

Open Gardens as always is a community effort and this year the village came together to raise more than £4,500 for St Andrew's church.

A year ago, as the Pandemic once again seemed to be drawing to a close, Open Gardens in Barton Bendish was one of the first public events permitted. We looked forward to it with some trepidation because we weren't sure that people would be confident enough to come. Some restrictions were still in place. Masks were worn in the church cum Ticket Office but the public came in droves, delighted to be able to do something normal. The year before we'd been limited to a virtual Open Gardens where people posted pictures and videos of their gardens on Facebook. I loved overseeing that but, more importantly, I was very impressed by our community's resilience and determination to do what it could.

This year we thought that we couldn't match the previous year's achievements but hoped plenty of people would come having enjoyed it last time. Over 350 people came, raising £4,600 for essential maintenance and repairs to both St Mary's and St Andrew's Churches. The Village Hall was heaving with people wanting Refreshments. 140 Ploughman's Lunches were sold as well as countless cups of coffee and tea. The Sun shone and, although the start was gradual, it seemed that parking was at a premium and the gardens were crowded. Many visitors told me how welcome they felt, how wonderful the gardens were and how lucky we are to live here. I always tell people thinking of opening their gardens that the visitors don't expect perfection. What they enjoy is feeling welcome. That is the thing which makes me most proud to be a Bartonian. I recognised several people who'd been before and I think, even more than I did before, that opening your garden for the enjoyment of others is

not about showing off. It's much more to do with being neighbourly.

None of it would be possible without the small army of people organising the display of veteran cars, the Pimms tent and the cake stall, all major attractions. But the real powerhouse is the PCC who plan, organise and enable the whole thing. Many of them were very busy the day before and others manned the church all day on Sunday. Our PCC is the most effective I know anywhere and I know that they are appreciated by many.

My own favourite moment was seeing Sarah Thorpe approaching across our garden. She has been seriously ill and it was wonderful to see her out and about. As Clerk of the Parish Council she is universally respected. She is brilliant at her job and has always been willing to go the extra mile. I'm sure that many other people will have been delighted to see her too.

The Barton Bendish Breakfast, now held at the Bedingfeld Arms in Oxborough, is one of my favourite events. It would be wonderful to think that one day we might return to the Berney in our own village but these are uncertain times. Community breakfasts are a great way of getting to know your neighbours better and to share their concerns. The more the merrier! Among other things, the July meeting discussed the cost of living crisis, the morality of our Prime Minister, what we should do about Russia and whether Covid is still a threat. Budgets for the Army, Schools and Hospitals got a mention too. We would make a good government.

We also discussed the decline of Swaffham, the sale of Strattons Hotel and the dereliction of the buildings of what was once Hamonds Grammar School, which for a brief time was an Antiques Centre. I remembered going there for fixtures after which we had fabulous meals upstairs in the Corn Exchange. A further rummage in my rapidly diminishing brain recalled that the best food following school fixtures was to be found at Greshams, Paston - where Lord Nelson have carved his name on a desk - King's School Ely and at Cawston College. I'm sure that there must be a book in there somewhere.

Barton Bendish Village Hall Trust – Annual AGM held 15th June 2022, 7:30 Trustees Report

Barton Bendish is a very small rural Norfolk village with very few amenities. The Village Hall provides a venue for social, cultural, and fund-raising events within the village. The purpose of the Trust is to maintain the hall in a sound, warm and welcoming condition to allow these activities for the benefit of parishioners.

The objective of the Trustees is to maintain the hall to a standard that attracts people to come to events and to make their visit pleasurable. The Village Hall re-opened last year after extension and renovation but in uncertain times with variable covid-19 restrictions which put paid to the planned formal opening functions. Instead, the hall re-opened as a central venue for a bumper Open Gardens function and followed this up with a record Arts and Crafts Exhibition. Since then functions have included regular yoga sessions, sound baths, film shows, pop-up cafes and numerous private hirings. April showed 16 separate bookings in 30 days and May 15 bookings in 31 days: both substantial increases on pre-renovation activity levels.

The Trustees have completed arrangements with Albanwise Ltd., to extend the lease and licence to occupy until 2047.

The Village Hall has operated under a Trust Deed dating to 1990 and registered with the Charity Commissioners. This is felt to be outdated, giving the right to appoint Trustees both to the Parish Council and the Bowls Club which no longer has any active members resident in the village. The Trustees have negotiated with both organisations and gained their agreement to relinquishing their rights to appoint and to replacing the Trust Deed with a new structure as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation. The current Trustees are Tim Webster (Chair), Anthony Blanchfield, Will Chapman, Chris Parsons (Secretary) and Robin Simon, (Treasurer).

Total receipts for the year were £40,484.25. Total payments for the year were £43,884.27. The net result for the year was an excess of payments over receipts of £3,400.02. Adding bank and deposit balances brought forward at the beginning of the year, the balances carried forward at 31st March totalled £7,146.78. All building work has been completed and paid for. As of now we have no restricted funds.

It is the Trustees policy to try to maintain a balance on unrestricted funds which equates to at least the annual expenditure. This is equivalent to circa £1,500. It is held to smooth out fluctuations in cash flow and to meet emergencies. The cash balance of £7,146.78 held on unrestricted funds at the year end exceeds this target.

The Trustees met six times during the year with an average level of attendance of 86.2%.

BOUGHTON VILLAGE NEWS

Boughton Parish Council

In early July Cllr Payne and I had a meeting with Albanwise to re-establish a channel of communication after the departure of the previous farm manager. It was a productive meeting leading to a better understanding of points of view and a mutual desire for a positive working relationship. As a result a WhatsApp group has been created to allow for rapid, effective, two-way communication between the council and farm management.

The first result of this cooperation was our ability to inform residents, in advance, of the recent rye harvest on Wretton Road. 1800 tons of rye were taken off the land over two days using a one-way traffic system. This was published on the council website and Facebook page.

Two items of significance were discussed at the Ordinary Council meeting of 5th July. Firstly, the conditions in the pond and the health of the fish therein. Secondly, the state of the playground equipment and how to move forward. Two members of the public attended the meeting to speak on these items.

With the current warm and dry weather, the oxygen levels in the pond have become low, leading to reports of dead fish. This is to be expected from time to time, but a severe occurrence as in 1976 could lead to a very significant loss of fish stock and resulting health hazard as they rot away. The Environment



Agency have suggested that the fish could be removed entirely, but the council is minded to attempt to manage problem by temporarily improving oxygenation. The reed cull last year and the growth of the flag irises will be a help in this regard, as will deploying barley straw bales next season. For now, we will look at aeration solutions, starting with a trial of a dirty water pump.

BOUGHTON VILLAGE NEWS

The playground equipment was installed in 2004 with an expected life of 15-20 years. Eighteen years later several items are showing their age, in particular the swing set that now has significant rot in the uprights. It was agreed at the council meeting that the playground should retain its facilities. While not yet a hazard, the swings will need replacing and the council is therefore seeking quotations for a similar replacement to be installed in the medium future.

The next Boughton Parish Council meeting will be held on 6th September at 7pm in the church. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

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
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
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
