'FROM THE RECTORY'

Advent, Christmas, New Year 2016/17 *Dear Friends,*

It seems strange to be writing a Christmas message before the middle of November but even with parish magazines deadlines are necessary.

The Common Worship lectionaries while giving us a more inclusive access to the Bible also provides a longer period of preparation, allowing an additional four Sundays before Advent. These weeks together with Advent itself allow us to prepare ourselves for the coming of the Christ's kingdom as well as preparing for the celebration of His Nativity.

As we move through Advent we can read or hear the ringing authoritative utterances of the Old Testament Prophets with the promise of Hope for Israel and the world. As we look back on this year 2016 with its centenary of the battle of the Somme we can hardly have been more in need of Hope. The Brexit vote in June and the November election in the United States together with the ongoing turmoil in the Middle East have shown us just how divided we and other nations are. It was just such a divided world that the infant Christ came to reconcile to God.

I sometimes think that the way we prepare ourselves during Advent and for the coming Christmas has a built in guarantee that things will follow a well known pattern. Does our preparation play it safe, or might we hope to be surprised? After all the Messiah came in such a wonderfully ordinary way that the world was taken by surprise.

One of my favourite stories is from America. It is about a Sunday School Nativity play, or pageant as it was called there. Everything went wrong from the start, even before the rehearsals. The smart good children sulked so the kids from the wrong side of the tracks got the main parts. They were so unfamiliar with the Christmas story that it came upon them that this story, this play, was for them; changing the way they saw themselves and others around them. Those who attended expecting the usual Sunday School fare were so surprised and moved that it was declared 'the best Christmas Pageant ever!'

May this coming Christmas both surprise and comfort us as we face many changes in the New Year.

RECIPE PAGE

Peter's Chilli Tomato Chutney

This is my variation of one I found on the web, using chillies, lime juice and balsamic vinegar. It's got a nice bite to it!

Ingredients:

1kg ripe or semi-ripe tomatoes

1 large onion (I used several small ones, 150g)

A knob of butter

A pinch of salt

100ml cider wine vinegar

130g Demerara sugar

1 tbsp Balsamic sauce

1 tbsp wholegrain mustard

2 finely chopped red chillies - medium size

Optional, the juice of a squeezed lime

Kitchenware:

A large pan

2 400ml jars

Something to stir with

Method:

Chop the onions fairly finely. Melt a knob of butter in the pan with a pinch of salt. Add the onions to the butter and fry gently until soft. Roughly chop all of the tomatoes. Add them to the pan.

Add the rest of the ingredients then stir. Bring to a gentle boil and then simmer on a low heat with the lid off for 40 minutes to 1 hour. The aim at this stage is to reduce the tomato chutney until its thick and changes colour to a more golden brown.

At this point you'll want to put your jars in the oven at 140°C, just enough to kill any germs from your pre-cleaned jars and remove any water you haven't dried out.

Pot into hot jars and seal immediately.

FROM THE SMALLHOLDING IN LATE AUTUMN

The downsizing is beginning to look promising and even taking shape! I am indebted to friends, neighbours and other helpers who in various ways don't want me to give up.

The **raised bed**, the idea and example of friends and with the patience of the ever capable Bill is almost finished; it is filled with beautiful black fenland topsoil and farmyard manure. All that remains now is to find flagstones to surround the base to prevent slipping. To all who have helped both materially and practically **thank you!**

If all continues to go well we will start off by sowing over-wintering broad beans. The apples not yet picked are providing rich colour in the orchard and on the espaliers. I would like to be able to dispense berried holly and mistletoe from the gate but the mistletoe seed or fruit which I had smeared onto the bark of some apple trees has not taken. However Golden Hornet crab apple and Red Sentinel are very decorative especially when there has been some frost, blackbirds and fieldfares love them. There is a touch of Dickens about one of the colourful winter apples, the Norfolk Beefing and Biffins which are mentioned in a Christmas Carol. Beefings may also be useful for making dried apple rings. The **apple harvest** has been wonderful with only the late winter eaters still on the trees. The two **juicing** days were very successful with no break-downs and a total of around 100 gallons of mostly very sweet juice being produced, not all

for cider! A very sincere thank you all who provided apples and labour of any

kind.

The farm on our eastern boundary has decided to protect their field from rabbits. We have therefore agreed to co-operate by fencing our southern boundary and continue round on to our gate on Eastmoor road. We are using four foot chicken wire, buried to the depth of a foot. It is a moot point as to whether the fence will keep the rabbits in or out! If it works it will be a real relief to know that the fruit trees are protected during the winter.

On the northern boundary Bob is doing a wonderful job of re-building his lovely old wall that has been ravaged by ivy and jasmine and rain. We hope that on our southern side the American Pillar roses which were there when we arrived will grow again.

FROM THE SMALLHOLDING IN LATE AUTUMN



The leaves of the apple trees are holding on but will have fallen by the time we are ready for pruning in the New Year. We are beyond climbing ladders now so there are some nicely coloured high apples available to blackbirds, fieldfares and the red wings which often travel together. The other thrushes are flocking in healthy numbers as are the rooks and jackdaws. Holkham last week starlings in good numbers were coming in to roost in good numbers; as far as I could see they were heading for bushes bordering the wet meadow where a flock of perhaps a thousand or so pink feet had recently alighted. It made me wonder whether our starlings would use Boughten Fen again this winter.



Winter has its own work to do on soil and trees. We have some tender perennials to protect from frosts. The dwindling chicken flock, now boosted by four point of lays, is being tucked up for winter too. One of the first entries in my 2017 diary is the blessing the plough ceremony at Northwold which will come a day or so after Wassailing and the day after Epiphany, a good start to the New Year.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

Christmas Carols

Christmas has long been a time for singing and every now and then a Christmassy song tops the charts. Surprisingly some of those we're familiar with were written quite a long time ago. 'Jingle Bells' dates back to 1857 and 'O little Town of Bethlehem' to 1868. Bing Crosby's famous 'White Christmas' was recorded in 1942 at about the same time as 'Little Drummer Boy' based on an old Czech carol. Even 'Frosty the Snowman' and 'Mary's Boy Child' have been around for more than sixty years. 'Do You Hear What I Hear' was written in 1962 as a plea for peace during the Cuban Missile Crisis.

Religious Christmas songs are better known as carols. The word 'carol' is a medieval word of French and Anglo-Norman origin believed to mean a dance song or a circle dance accompanied by singing. Although it's not known when the first one was written the period 1350 - 1550 was considered to be the golden age for English carols. 'Ding Dong Merrily on High' first appeared as a secular dance in the 16th century although was not published until 1924. After then the popularity of carols waned but was revived again in the mid18th century when most of the traditional carols sung today were written. 'Hark, the Herald Angels Sing' was first heard in 1739 with 'O Come All Ye Faithful' following soon after in 1751. 'Silent Night', originally written in German, was first performed in Austria on Christmas Day 1818. Of Cornish Origin 'The First Noel', appeared in 1823 and 'God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen' and 'I Saw Three Ships Come Sailing In' were published in 1833 although date back to the 17th century. Two Frenchman composed 'O Holy Night', first sang in 1847, and only later translated into Ten years afterwards Rev John Hopkins wrote 'We Three Kings'. Interestingly the African-American spiritual 'Go Tell It on the Mountain' dates back to 1865.

One of the strangest carols is apparently about the countryside with no religious significance. However it encompassed a hidden meaning known only to members of the Roman Catholic Church in England who from 1558 until 1829 were not permitted to openly practice their faith. Each element in the carol 'The Twelve Days of Christmas' contains a code word for a religious reality.

A partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.

Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.

Three French hens stood for Faith, Hope and Charity.

Four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

Five golden rings recalled the first five books of the Old Testament.

Six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.

Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit – Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self Control.

Ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments.

Eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.

Twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

FAMILY ACTION

Dear Parish Clerks

I write to introduce ourselves as Family Action, as we are especially keen to promote our Wellbeing Group to the residents of your villages but also our other projects, which you will find details of below.

The Wellbeing Group is held on a Tuesday morning in Swaffham Community Centre, Campinglands, Beech Close, Swaffham PE37 7RD. Please look at the poster on page 20, which advertises our Group and also a copy of our programme until Christmas, with the activities which we have planned.

Below are some of the other projects which Family Action facilitates:-

ESCAPE Project

It is based at community allotments at Tumbler Hill and the orchard around Orford Road playing field. This project is open to all and supports vulnerable adults to learn new skills, spend time outdoors and socialise. The project is currently staffed Monday - Friday, 10am - 3pm, The site has various outdoor areas, a covered kitchen with a cob oven and 3 large poly tunnels, enabling it to remain open all year round. Activities change with the seasons and include gardening, cooking and crafts like green woodwork and willow weaving. The project also offers a nationally recognised level 1 Horticulture qualification, which is free to participants.

Health Champions Project

It aims to offer support to families living in the West and Breckland areas, where a child is waiting for ASD or ADHD assessment. It is based on a 'Social Prescribing' model which is a non-medical method of providing help to patients. The aim is to link families with support in the community which could mean:-

Meeting other families with similar challenges

Providing information

Providing support to access other specialist services

Accessing activities in the community

The Health Champions are volunteers from the local community who are recruited, trained and supported by the Project Co-ordinator and then matched with families for a period of 6 - 10 weeks.

FAMILY ACTION

Volunteers also help in hosting monthly coffee mornings for parents which host guest speakers from local agencies and services. These groups share ideas for managing issues such as school, sleep, food or friendships.

We will be working closely with specialist voluntary and statutory services to widen the scope of support available to families at a time when they might be under great stress.

WellFamily Service

Supports individuals and families of any age who are registered with one of seven GP practices:

Swaffham (Campingland, Manor Farm and Plowright Surgeries), Litcham, Great Massingham, Feltwell, Boughton, Brandon (Norfolk residents)

We can offer advice and support around a wide range of issues including emotional stress, mental health and wellbeing, parenting, child behaviour, school issues, relationship difficulties, financial problems, housing, social isolation and support and advice for carers.

Sad News - Two Deaths

It is with sadness that we record the death of a Boughton resident, Mr Ivor Roy Tidy, on 29th September, aged 95.

Ivor was born in 1921 to a large family of 13 children in Caterham, Surrey. He saw active service with the RAF in World War II, including Burma, and was not de-mobbed until 1946. For most of his life he worked as a motor mechanic. Ivor moved to Jays Cottage in Boughton in 2006 with his wife Janet, daughter Jane and grand-daughter Sarah. His eldest daughter Teresa already lived nearby at Oxborough. He became a great-grandfather to Richard in 2009 and Edward in 2016. Until 2015, Ivor laid the wreath at the Boughton war memorial at the annual Remembrance church service in November. He had been active, although registered blind, until a year ago, but has spent much of 2016 bedbound. He spent the last few months of his life under the excellent care of the hospice unit of Amberley Hall in Gaywood, King's Lynn, where he died.

The funeral was held at All Saints Church Boughton on 12th October, with the service conducted by the Reverend Brian Redgers, assisted by Reverend Robin Blackall. As well as family and friends, also in attendance were representatives of the RAF Association Downham Market branch where Ivor was a member, including their standard bearer who led the funeral procession from Jays Cottage to the church. The family would like to thank those members of the community who gave their support during this difficult time. *Teresa Squires*
