

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COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

There is always local opposition when a new motorway or road is planned especially in relation to wildlife and yet once construction is completed the verges and embankments become mini nature reserves. They are very often set with plants and berried shrubs sympathetic to wildlife and popular with birds, Guelder rose being one Bull finches and waxwings are two species which love the berries when they get sof and sticky. As a finishing touch to new roads many local Councils seed parts of the verges and embankments with wild flowers beneficial to bees such as cowslips and oxeye daisies. In time naturally growing plants will become established providing a habitat for a variety of insects and winter food for birds.

Because these roads are part of a network designed to keep traffic moving as quickly as possible the roadsides are left pretty much undisturbed. Muntjac, a small species of deer that live in forests, can frequently be seen feeding on road verges, notably the A134 Mundford to Thetford road. Mice, voles and rabbits make their home in untrimmed roadside vegetation and are all a food source for birds of prey. The population of voles fluctuates from year to year and is reflected in the breeding success rate of barn owls and kestrels, common locally but which are on the conservation amber list as in many places there numbers are declining. These two species are very dependent on voles. Sadly road casualties occur such as hedgehogs and barn owls but this is an indication of the numbers attracted to the adjacent rich source of food. There must also be millions of unseen insects killed by traffic each year.

Another unexpected nature reserve can be found close to some major road junctions. There, lagoons have been constructed to collect surface water to prevent the roads from flooding. Even though this is probably polluted it still attracts wildlife and in dry times can provide an important source of water. The lagoons are often inaccessible to the public and, in time, natural vegetation grows round them making them a haver for all kinds of birds, amphibians and water loving insects. Locally, the Hardwick Flood Lagoon attracts migrants of all kinds who drop in for an undisturbed rest or their journeys. Besides gulls, which are only to be expected, more uncommor visitors recorded are wigeon, little grebes, a family of rare black-necked grebes avocets, black-tailed godwits, sandpipers, yellow wagtail, greenshank and golder and ringed plovers.

It is no coincidence that owls are often associated with churchyards for they provide a secluded home to mice and voles, their primary source of food. There is minima disturbance to church yards, and wild plants and insects also thrive in tha environment. Many churches are inhabited by bats; at least eight of the seventeer species of bats breeding in Britain have been recorded as roosting in churches They are not always welcome guests but because they are legally protected their roost sites are mostly left undisturbed. *Jill Mason (Barton Bendish)*

RECIPE PAGE

Budget Liver Casserole for Kids

This recipe was created as a matter of necessity when I had 4 very hungry and rapidly growing brothers to feed on a very low budget. They had previously been subjected to a version of shoe leather which had somewhat tainted, justifiably, their view on liver. *Geoff Siddons, Beachamwell*

Ingredients

500g pig's liver; 1 tin chopped tomatoes; 30ml tomato puree; 4 medium onions (white or red, it does not matter, whatever you have to hand); 2 cloves of garlic;

1 tsp mixed herbs (whatever you have, mixed, Italian or 'de Provence'); 2 tsp sweet paprika; 15ml Worcestershire sauce; 5ml rich soy sauce (dark or light, both will work); 5ml fish sauce; salt and pepper; flour; vegetable oil (sunflower is also fine)

Method

The liver preparation is the key to this recipe and needs a little time and care with a sharp knife. Discard the chewy bits. Cut the liver into 5mm x 5mm strips, approx 50mm long then pat dry with kitchen towel.

Place some seasoned flour on a plate and lightly coat a few pieces of liver at a time placing them all into a sieve. When you have coated all the liver gently shake the sieve to get rid of excess flour.

Add a little vegetable oil into a very hot frying pan and quickly brown a few pieces of liver - you are not trying to cook them through just get some colour on them. Place them into your casserole dish.

Reduce the heat in your frying pan and add your finely chopped onions and cook gently until translucent, add a little water to prevent burning of all the bits on the bottom if needed. When the onions are nearly done add the garlic if you are using it. Add all to the casserole dish.

Add your tomatoes to your frying pan and fill the can to half way with water and swill around to get the last of the tomato, add in the tomato puree and stir to dissolve then add to the frying pan to get all the remaining tasty bits off the bottom and heat through until bubbling.

Add whatever herbs/seasonings from above you like to use to the tomatoes and stir in, in the original recipe I used an oxo cube, if that is all you have then use one, it is the economy option.

Add the tomatoes and seasonings to your casserole and stir gently.

With the lid on cook at 150C fan, 320F, gas mark 3 for an hour, then check it is done as the time will vary depending on your casserole dish.

I used to serve this with finely shredded Savoy cabbage lightly sautéed in butter so still slightly crispy and either brown rice or mashed potato.

At the beginning of our meeting at the Mundford Bowls Club on Tuesday the 7th January, Mundford champion of good causes, Rod Billen, began the evening's programme by announcing that, after a red-tape dispute, his considerable efforts had not been in vain and consent has been given for a permanent memorial to be erected at the WW2 Lancaster Bomber crash site in Thetford Forest (MR 52.493126 – 0.639661). An inaugural ceremony is to be held at the site on 21st March at 1-00pm and all are invited to attend this and the Bowls Club later, between 2pm and 3pm, for tea and cakes.

After the raffle and bowls club banquet, Techie Fred proposed the idea of registering the attendance of members with the employment of a card reader system. There were no formal objections to the concept being trialled.

Fred preceded his own presentation by giving a résumé of his personal interesting background and then proceeded to illustrate, with the assistance of 'Powerpoint' and accompanying downloads, various instruments, their advantages and weaknesses; this included the pitot tube and the angle of attack sensor.

Viewers were then invited to watch a cartoon depicting a race between various animated antique aeroplanes; it was easy for them to be recognised by such a well-informed audience.

Fred's final showing depicted a lone pilot of a light passenger aircraft flying from Tampa Executive Airport to St. Peters, Clearwater FL. This demonstrated the intensity of concentration necessary to control an aeroplane and, at the same time, maintain a continual dialogue with air traffic control.

The evening ended peacefully and we were invited to return to the venue next month, Tuesday the 4th, to sample 'David's Mystery Movie Night'.

FREE HOME ASSESSMENTS ON OFFER

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes. Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

Residing in Oxborough means that it is just another normal day seeing, hearing and enjoying the 'air shows' of aircraft going off to the range and returning to base.

Anglian Water – An Update

It would seem that we have won a pyrric victory against Anglian Water, who have also distinguished themselves by flooding properties in Milton Keynes. I wrote to the Parish Council and Liz Truss about the latest assault on out environment by tankers damaging verges which they themselves had repaired



last year. They promised, quite reasonably, that we would be kept informed of any problems at the water treatment centre which were likely to result in nocturnal visits or extra tanker activity. The agreed curfew wasn't observed and none of us knew about any problems other than the damaged roads and mud pies being made outside our homes.

We have been assured that the latest damage will be fixed, the repairs protected and that the nighttime curfew will be extended, which is great news. Surely working with customers is better than responding to their justified and repeated complaints?

Village Hall Update

We now have £171,067 towards the cost of improving and extending the Village Hall. We are currently waiting to hear about two sizeable grant applications and have reason to be optimistic. We will know by February. Work has gone out to tender now and will begin in April. Initially, the improvements to the Hall will be the focus and if we manage to get enough grant the extension will be done as well. I am grateful to Chris Parsons who has done so much work on grant applications, preparing drawings, making estimates and getting us to this stage... without his expertise, the project couldn't have proceeded as smoothly as it has.

As I write, I have just heard that Garfield Weston have agreed to grant us $\pounds 25,000$ which brings the total to $\pounds 197,067 - 71\%$ of the required amount, which is brilliant. Thanks are also due to Robin Simon and Anthony Blanchfield who have put in hours of work on bids for grants. The Tenders for the work are due back on February 14th.

Finally, it would be remiss of me not to mention the sad loss of Valerie, our fellow committee member. She shared our vision and was asking me how the project was going a matter of days before her death. It is profoundly sad that she didn't live long enough to see the work completed but I know how pleased and proud she would have been. When the day comes we will raise a glass to her.

PS I should add that we are very grateful to Plandescil Ltd, Consulting

Engineers from Attleborough. Engineering work has been carried out by them pro-bono. Contributions like this from local companies will help us to reach our target. We hope to have a public meeting in late February or early March to help us with final decisions once our funding position is clearer.

Beachamwell Parish Council

The Parish Council held a meeting on 6th January 2020. Below is a summary of some of the matters which were discussed at the meeting:

Precept

The Precept is the annual income the Parish Council receives from Breckland District Council who collect it from residents as part of your Council Tax. It was agreed to set the Precept at £6000 for 2020/21, which will be a reduction of £1500 from 2019/20, when the Precept was set at £7500. Councillors were able to reduce the Precept as the cost of repairs to the church wall will now be significantly less than had been expected. It was noted that we may need to increase the Precept again in future years as expenditure is likely to be above income, which will mean reserves decreasing each year.

Village Sign

You may have noticed that the village sign has been removed. It was taken down as we were advised that it was looking quite unstable. A new oak post has been obtained and the sign is currently being sandblasted and then repainted prior to being reinstalled. It is hoped that it will be back in place by the end of February.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Monday 2nd March at 7.30pm. This is a meeting for residents and even though it is arranged by the Parish Council it is not a Parish Council meeting. It is an opportunity for residents to raise any concerns or issues relating to the village. Parish Council

Hello again and may I wish all readers a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.

This month I would like to update you on the last Parish Council meeting that took place on 7th January. But first, can I remind you that the public are more than welcome at our meetings. The regular, or "ordinary", ones are held in Boughton Church at 7pm on the first Tuesday of odd-numbered months - the next will therefore be on 3rd March. Why not come along and see what your council does for you?

We have received a letter of resignation from our long-serving councillor Andy Beeston whose support will be sorely missed. Andy is heavily involved in other activities, notably the Riding for the Disabled Association and feels he needs to prioritise his time. We wish him well, and I'd like to record the council's heartfelt thanks for all the effort he has put in over the years.

Cllr Beeston's departure means that we now have a casual vacancy on the council, which will be advertised in due course. If you would like to be considered as a councillor, please contact me, our clerk or the Borough Council as soon as possible.

The meeting discussed several points relating to the village marquee, including its maintenance and relevant insurances.

We confirmed that our application for grant part-funding of our vehicle-actuated speed sign has now been acknowledged and we shall hear if we have been successful in mid-March. Once the grant is received we can order and commission the equipment.

We are in receipt of several submissions by Albanwise to Norfolk County Council concerning the public rights of way across their land. These submissions indicate that Albanwise do not plan to add any further rights of way across their land in the future. We understand that these submissions are a formality simply to confirm the definitive maps being drawn up by the county and do not imply any loss of current public rights of way. Similar submissions are being presented by landowners all over the country in readiness for 2026 when the new definitive maps will be adopted. However, it is unclear to what extent, if any, these submissions affect existing permissive paths. We have written to Albanwise for clarification. In addition we will be looking at historic routes with Norfolk County Council to see if any might be re-instated on the definitive maps. A Boughton resident asked if she might be allowed to place some planters in front of the white village gateways, using funds she has raised though various

social events. The council were pleased to allow this, having already gained the appropriate permissions from the County Highways Department.

From time to time the village is visited by the Highway Rangers - a County Highways group able to undertake small maintenance tasks affecting the roads and verges in the village. In previous visits they have trimmed hedges obscuring speed signs, straightened sign posts and rebuilt verges. If you see any maintenance tasks that need attention please bring them to our notice and we'll pass them on.

On a more sombre note, the Parish Council soon needs to make some decisions on how to respond in the event that 2020 sees the passing of a senior public figure, especially the Duke of Edinburgh or Queen Elizabeth. We intend to work with the church to make sure that facilities are made available for residents to pay their respects as they would wish. There are national guidelines for this, called Operation London Bridge. This will be an agenda item for the next meeting on 3rd March.

As is customary the January meeting agreed the council budget for the coming financial year, covering all aspects of the council's work such as pond and playground maintenance, administrative tasks supporting it and its committees, equipment maintenance and projects (such as the seed sign) that are raised at the Annual Public Meeting each May.

Finally, I intend to arrange another village litter pick, probably towards the end of March when the weather has improved. The last pick in July saw a good haul but the verges are again suffering from the actions of the ignorant.

Rainfall since October 2019

As I write this (15th Jan), we have just experienced a horrendous night with gale force winds and heavy rain for hours. I understand that the road in Crimplesham is closed again, for the second time in less than a month with flooding, and anyone driving around some of the country roads cannot have failed to notice large areas of road underwater as the ditches cannot cope and are just overflowing.

Following my previous report, October continued very wet, with a further 26.7mm from the 12th until the end of the month, by which time the total reached 77.2mm November carried on the same way, with 72.3mm falling during the month; and December was worse with a total of 82.9mm.

Already in January, we have been deluged with 46.7mm, which includes two heavy falls of 9.5mm, and 15.5 last night.

My notes frequently state torrential rain, or rain all day and night. 20th December was particularly memorable day with continuous rain over more than 24 hours amounting to over an inch of rain. I spent the entire day wading about in 2 inches of water – thank goodness for a decent pair of wellies.

Boughton Fen through the Winter

At last there is water back in the fen. It is not called a wetland for nothing, but over the past eighteen months it has been incredibly dry. Whilst it may make it easier to work, it is not a good thing. The reed beds need clean water for part of the year in order to thrive, and a prolonged period of dryness allows other plants and scrub to take over, and if it were to continue like this, the reed bed would eventually disappear under a mass of scrub, bindweed and the like.

The marsh harriers have been present almost continuously. It is always worth stopping to watch them as they swoop and soar over the fen and the surrounding land.

The fen committee, aided by a band of volunteers, have been busy over the past few months resulting in some significant repairs to the boardwalk being

achieved.

We were fortunate that one of our committee, Paul Smith, was able to bring his colleagues on a volunteer day from their workplace. They managed to clear a considerable amount of scrub and blackthorn – in fact we have not had to do any more scrub clearance ourselves, so thanks go to them for their hard work. It will not be long now before we start on the annual reed cutting. Aside from the services of the reed cutter, this requires a lot of assistance to collect and burn the reed. 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
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
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
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
