Hedgehogs

Most people have a soft spot for hedgehogs especially those brought up with Miss Tiggywinkle. As they love to dine on the slugs, snails and worms that reek



havoc to vegetables and flowers they are welcomed by gardeners. They will also take mice, young rats, frogs and snakes and in Victorian times could be purchased in London markets to be kept in houses to deal with the cockroaches. However there is a darker side to hedgehogs which doesn't endear them to gamekeepers and some conservationists for they also have a

penchant for eggs, chicks and even adult birds. In 1566 a law was passed that three pennies would be paid by churchwardens for a hedgehog dead or alive. This law was not repealed until 1863. In 1974 five were introduced to the island of South Uist off the West Coast of Scotland (an important breeding site for wading birds) to fend off a plague of garden slugs. During the next thirty years their numbers had multiplied to an estimated 5,000 and were having a serious effect on the population of wading birds, so much so that the controversial decision was made to eradicate them by trapping and relocation to the mainland.

Hedgehogs are widespread as can be seen by flattened remains on the roads. Rolling into a ball is no defence against a speeding motor car. I think they are attracted on to roads because they also feed on carrion as well as fresh meat and the squashed corpses of other road casualties provide easy pickings. Hedgehogs can become relatively tame if food is put out for them regularly although cow's milk is bad for them. Contrary to one popular old country tale they don't suck milk directly from cow's udders; however they do self-anoint themselves with a copious amount of frothy saliva which they spread over their body and spines.

Hedgehogs are nocturnal and mostly only seen after dark or maybe heard making a variety of grunting and snuffling noises. Their portly appearance belies the fact that they can swim, climb and run quickly; as evidence of their presence they leave behind cat-like droppings. They hibernate in winter making a nest of leaves in a dry place. Occasionally, on a particularly warm winter's day, they

may wake up and come outside for a short while. In July or August a litter of four to seven babies are born which are helpless and have only a few soft, pale-coloured spines. They need to find sufficient food to grow quickly and gain sufficient body weight to survive their winter hibernation for they will lose about 30% during this period.

In the ten years since I originally wrote this article it is estimated that the British hedgehog population has declined by a third. Theories abound that this is due to climate change, farming practices and habitat loss but I have another theory. Badgers are the only animals which kill and eat hedgehogs and their numbers have dramatically increased during this period. Is this just a coincidence?

GARDENING TIPS

We are now into the second half of the year and I am pleased to say that most plants, be they perennial flowers, vegetables or fruits, seem to have almost caught up with the time of year despite all the early set-backs. Some, however, are still lagging behind – my tomatoes are now hanging with unripe fruit on the initial trusses. Normally there would be ripe tomatoes in the first week of this month but not this year. Remember; start feeding the plants as soon as the first truss is set. Geraniums grown from seed or bought in as plugs are nowhere near as advanced as they should be. I am writing this article on 6th June with the sun shining brightly. Proving that it is still there and does appear every now and again! It seems an awful long time since we had a spell of settled weather; such as we are currently experiencing. Let us hope it is the forerunner of a more normal summer season.

Just this last weekend I noticed the first greenfly on my roses but they were swiftly dealt with early the next morning but today I noted there are still some aphids on a climber so they will have to be dealt with tomorrow. Fortunately there are no signs of black spot so far. My first rose of the season, on the climber 'Swan Lake', came into bloom on June 2nd. To produce individual quality large flower (old H.T.) roses, nip out the side buds in each cluster leaving the king bud in place to gather all the strength from that shoot and so develop into, hopefully, the perfect bloom. However, you must keep it clean and free from aphids.

Autumn sown sweet peas should now be producing a steady rotation of flowering stems with four good strong buds on each stem. If some of your plants develop five-buds on a stem then as soon as practical carefully take off the fifth bud. If you don't then the lowest floret will be dying or even dead before the fifth bud fully develops. Keep the plants watered if dry conditions persist and feed regularly with a high potash liquid fertilizer. Remove all tendrils and nip out any side shoots if you are looking for exhibition quality flowers, otherwise leave some of the side shoots in place which will ultimately give a spectacular mass of colour but the quality of the blooms will be reduced.

Dahlias and chrysanthemums will need staking and tying in to keep them upright and as with roses, if you are looking to produce top class single blooms you need to remove the side shoots and buds other than the king bud (top centre). In the case of spray chrysanths and cluster roses it is the king bud that should

be carefully nipped out, allowing the surrounding buds to develop evenly.

As far as I can see soft fruit seems to be in tune with the time of year. If the weather is dry then keep the bushes and canes well watered and a final feed of sulphate of potash well watered in would not be out of place. The water and fertilizer will make a real difference to the yield and the quality of the fruit.

About the middle of this month is the ideal time to sow wallflower and winter pansy seed. The sown seed needs plenty of light and warmth but it does not want to be scorched by direct hot sun. I suggest you keep the seed shaded in very hot conditions. If the seed starts to germinate and then gets scorched that will be its end!

So far this year I have hardly seen a bumblebee and there are usually many in my garden. There was a flush of wild bees a few weeks ago but they seem to have disappeared as well. If the same applies in your garden then you will probably need to aid the pollination of your pea and bean flowers with a <u>very</u> gentle spray of water.

It is the Downham Market Horticultural Show on Saturday, 6th July. Come along and see all the exhibits on display. Better still, bring along your best produce and exhibit it in one of the many classes available. Schedules are available from the Downham Market Garden Centre in railway road and several other places. Come on – have a go you may well be surprised at what you can achieve.



DOG FOULING – LET'S KEEP BRECKLAND BEAUTIFUL!

Most dog walkers are very responsible, but some individuals are not clearing up after their dogs and Breckland has experienced an increase in reports of fouling in recent weeks. Dog mess is unpleasant and can carry diseases like toxocariasis through contaminated soil, resulting in symptoms such as eye disorders, aches, dizziness, nausea and in extremely rare cases, seizures/fits

Our Dog Warden, Mike Gardiner will be stepping up his patrols, especially in hot spot areas. He is also asking for residents' help – if you are aware of someone who is not cleaning up after their dog, please call Mike on 07771 617417 with a note of times, dates and a description of the owner. Some dog owners may simply not be aware of their responsibilities and in the first instance Mike will usually just have a quiet chat.

Dog owners have a legal obligation to clear up after their dogs and failure to do so can result in prosecution with a fixed penalty notice of £80, or if the case goes to court, up to £1000.

NEW COUNTYWIDE CARER SUPPORT SERVICE SET TO LAUNCH IN JULY

A Carer is anyone who spends a significant proportion of their life providing unpaid support to a relative, partner or friend who is ill, frail, disabled or has a mental health problem or substance misuse problem.

Eight experienced, local carers organisations have come together as the Carers Agency Partnership led by Crossroads Care East Anglia, who have won the contract to provide a new Carers Support Service, funded by Norfolk County Council and the five NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups in Norfolk and Waveney. The service will commence operation on 1st July.

Norfolk has approximately 93,000 carers and this new single service will make it easier for people to find information and to get support in their caring role wherever they may be in the county.

The Norfolk Carers Helpline on 0808 808 9876 will be the hub for information and referrals for the service and anyone can contact us to find out more. There will be a network of Locality Leaders who will work with volunteers and other organisations to provide one to one support, carers groups, short breaks and the information and advice people need to continue providing care.

Maria Plumb, Helpline Co-ordinator said: "By providing a single main source of information and signposting, plus access to any of the 8 partners in the Carers Agency Partnership we can ensure carers get the support they need through one phone call, email or on line enquiry. Please ring us or have a look at the carers website at www.norfolkcarersinfo.org.uk for more details of what is available now and look out for more information as the partnership develops the new service."

Maria went on to say that the service will be developing new methods for communication including online forums and social media.

Sue Whitaker, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Services at Norfolk County Council, said: "We know how important it is to offer excellent and reliable support to those people who care for a friend, relative or loved one in Norfolk – we're acutely aware that without them, the strain on professional health and social care services would be so much higher.

"This is the first time we have had a countywide service of this kind that is dedicated to carers. This partnership brings together a wealth of experience and, in addition to providing services, will help to raise awareness of the help

that exists and to identify carers who have been isolated in the past. I have every confidence in the Carers Agency Partnership's ability to improve the quality of life of carers in Norfolk, and as a consequence, the thousands of people they care for."

Dr Anoop Dhesi, chair of NHS North Norfolk Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "We welcome this new support service and are happy to make a financial contribution. This service recognises the important role carers play in looking after a relative or loved one."

The new service will also provide support to the Carers Council for Norfolk, which works with carers to highlight their needs. Sharon Brooks, Chairman of Carers Council for Norfolk said "We are looking forward to working closely with the Carers Agency Partnership, to champion carers' needs and provide feedback on the new service. Carers save the country £119 billion per annum and must be supported to continue caring during this period of economic austerity and reductions in the services available."

Clinical Commissioning Groups

Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) took over from Primary Care Trusts (PCTs) on April 1st 2013, following restructuring of the NHS locally under the Health and Social Care Act.

CCGs are led by local family doctors and their role is to commission (plan and purchase) healthcare for their local populations.

There are five CCGs in Norfolk and Waveney. NHS Great Yarmouth and Waveney Clinical Commissioning Group (NHS GYW CCG and widely known as HealthEast) was authorised in December 2012. NHS North Norfolk, NHS Norwich and NHS South Norfolk CCGs were authorised in February 2013, while NHS West Norfolk was authorised in March 2013.

MEDICAL EQUIPMENT AND MOBILITY

Have you got a family member, friend or neighbour who has been ill and needs medical equipment to live independently? Did you know that the British Red Cross medical equipment service aims to provide smaller items of medical equipment on loan and can also order larger equipment to help people cope at home following illness, injury or post-operatively. They are also able to provide equipment to bridge the gap while clients are waiting for long-term provision from statutory services e.g. they are the major provider of wheelchairs for short-term use. The Red Cross lend to anyone who needs help. The service is free of charge, but donations are always welcome and the loan period usually ranges from 3-6 months.

The local outlet is in the Swaffham Community Centre (01760 336525) and the office is currently open Tuesday & Thursday 10am-1pm.


INCINERATOR UPDATE

The County Council was meant to be debating getting out of the incinerator contract on 17th June but officers did not allow all members to see the contract and instead a press release was issued suggesting it could cost over £80million to walk away. An officer report said compensation would be due to Cory Wheelabrator even if corruption had occurred. This prompts the questions what other surprises are still 'lurking' in the contract and were any of the terms negotiated favourable to Norfolk County Council? Cabinet agreed a QC should examine the contract and review the advice given to the Council that led to it being signed. It was also agreed that waste industry experts would assess the potential savings that could be made from alternative waste treatments. These are likely to be significant because more advanced waste treatments are both cheaper and more efficient. Cory Wheelabrator's technology was 'state of the art' in Germany and America around 20 years ago, things have moved on, expensive marketing does not make up for having an out of date product. On 10th June 2013 Cabinet "approved in full" recommendations which included having independent waste industry experts prepare a "Waste Management report" looking at what can be saved by using alternatives. It will be a good opportunity for the new administration to show it is better than the last.

RECIPES OF THE MONTH

Banana Loaf

2 Beaten Eggs

4oz Cherries or Dried Fruit 2 or 3 ripe Bananas 8 oz Self Raising Flour Pinch of salt 6oz Brown Sugar 4oz Margarine







Mix all ingredients together.

Cook for 1&1/4 hrs - 1&1/2 hrs @ 325F

2 tsp Ground Black Peppercorns

- 4 tsp Ground Cumin
- 4 tsp Ground Coriander
- 2 tsp Salt
- 1 flat tsp Chilli Powder
- 1 1/2 tsp Turmeric

Mix all spices together

Store in an airtight container.

Heat oil in the oven at approx 180c Cut sufficient potatoes into wedges.

Coat in the hot oil and sprinkle over sufficient spice mix to give a fine dusting.

Cook for approximately 10 minutes

Turn potatoes and again sprinkle with spice mixture.

Cook for a further 10 minutes or until the potatoes are crisp.

Note: This mixture will store for over a year when stored in an airtight container.

Just as I was wondering if I would get a job, one of those answers to prayers occurred. I visited my old job to see people and one of the teachers, Alison, said "I was talking to my neighbour about you yesterday". The neighbour was Deputy Head at a good high school and was moaning that the new maths teacher had let them down. Alison said that she knew someone looking for a job. I sent my CV, followed up with a phone call, then interview and I got the job. New Zealand is a lot about networking and who you know.

All is going well in the new job but it means new courses and more lesson planning. The terms are 10 weeks so in the first holiday. Steve and I decided to go to Napier. It was about a 5 hour drive. In NZ that means the choice of one road and making sure you have a full tank of petrol. We stopped for coffee in Cambridge and whilst in Napier we visited Hastings and Havelock North. The B&B was on the edge of a vineyard and at 5pm we were served a glass of wine and canapés and joined by 'mine hosts'. The reason for a visit to Napier is that it was a town almost completely rebuilt in the 1930's after an earthquake. We have all heard of Christchurch but Napier was devastated mainly by the fire that started after the earthquake and wiped out the centre of the town. It was rebuilt in the Art Décor style. The earthquake lifted the surrounding area so that Napier instead of being on a small peninsula was then surrounded by fertile land which could be used and built on. We joined a tour which showed us many things to look for which you would miss if just walking round on your own. Depending on the wealth of the shop owner as to how much decoration and pattern they put on their building but everyone had something which have now become historical features. The vineyard trip on the second afternoon added to our relaxation and finding out a little about local growing conditions was interesting.

We had a lovely five days and came home well rested.

- 11. We ate cupcakes, white bread and real butter (or dripping) and drank soft drinks with sugar in it but we weren't overweight because...WE WERE ALWAYS OUTSIDE PLAYING!!
- 12. The idea of "five a day" fruit and veg was impossible because there was a war on we were lucky to get one green veg a day and one piece of fruit a week.
- 13. We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the streetlights came on.
- 14. No one was able to reach us all day and we were O.K.
- 15. We would spend hours building our go-carts out of old prams and then ride down the hill, only to find out we forgot the brakes. We built tree houses and dens and played in river beds with matchbox cars.

Boughton Parish Newsletter Summer 2013

Welcome to the second of what is now a regular feature of your Parish Council Newsletter keeping you abreast of the Council's activities over the last quarter.

The Council would dearly love to see more parishioners at our meetings. The Council represents YOUR interests, YOU pay the Precept and YOU have a voice. Please exercise your right to attend, see how the Council works, and contribute to how the village is looked after. Dates for Council Meetings are on the Notice Board in the Playground and are set for the current Parish Year.

What has the Council been doing since the last newsletter? The Village Pond has had the last of the larger willow growth removed thanks to willing volunteers and Councillors. The steady approach to controlling willow growth has meant that no major removals have been necessary and this has not left any scars on the pond-scape. As this is written, shortly after Open Gardens, the Pond looks a treat with the flag irises in full bloom. Also a new overflow has been installed following the blockage of the original overflow, which was built in the big drought of 1976 as witnessed by the date carved in the mortar around the base. We can now ensure that the level of the Pond can be controlled to prevent flooding of the road, and ensure a good volume of water is maintained.

Boughton Wishing Bucket: This continues to collect money for charity and recently received a makeover courtesy of Mr & Mrs Howard. This year's donations are going to Brambles Animal Rescue Centre as suggested by Mr & Mrs Golds. Thank you to all who make a wish and drop some coins in, your generosity is helping others.

The Fen: Activity has slowed following the start of the nesting season, but the verge-side trimming, final scrub clearance and boardwalk installation for this working year have been carried out. STOP PRESS! Boughton Fen has won another award for the efforts of the Fen committee and volunteers; see the article elsewhere in this edition.

Street Furniture: The circular memorial bench and the Frank Savage Memorial table have both had a clean and preservative treatment to keep them looking in tip-top condition.

Playground: The playground has had an annual inspection and minor maintenance work recommended has been carried out by councillors. A regular regime of interim inspections will continue to monitor the equipment.

Parish Councillors: We now have a full compliment of councillors, which is a

significant achievement in current times, when many parish councils are struggling to achieve a full council. Boughton Open Gardens Day 2013

The day dawned bright and sunny, with a promise of summer heat to come no, that would have been lovely, but it was not to be. After all the sunshine of the previous week, it was cloudy and definitely without summer heat. However, it stayed dry, in spite of some light drops in the morning, so not a repeat of the dreadful day a couple of years ago, when it didn't stop raining all day.

After weeks of preparation, there was little else I could do but hope I'd done my bit in publicising the event. There were a couple of heart-stopping moments the tickets hadn't been printed on Friday morning, but thanks to Alan Wilkinson they were done at the by the afternoon. Many thanks for stepping into the breach there, and to Amanda for getting them done in Downham Market. Then on Friday, I also found that the Lynn News had left us out of the weekend calendar!! However, the power of email and word of mouth can work wonders and when I went to the church and saw how beautifully Sandy and her team had laid out the church/community space for lunches and teas, I knew that the day would be a success. Thanks to Andy Beeston and Frank for all they do to support the church and community space.

On the day, we had twelve faithful supporters who opened their gardens to raise money for the church. They had all done it before and knew what an enjoyable day it can be, but it would be lovely if next year we had some new gardens. They don't have to be perfect in every blade of grass, or full of beautifully sculpted shrubs, because the people who come just like looking at a variety of gardens in different shapes and sizes. There are a range of styles - mine is variously described as 'full', 'good for wildlife' or 'interesting. It wouldn't suit everyone, but somewhere in the village is another garden which suits the taste of someone else. It was interesting to compare the effect of the weather this year with previous years. We always hold the event on the same weekend in June, so direct comparisons can be made. In previous years, my clumps of oriental poppies would have finished flowering, but this year they are only halfway there with plenty of buds still to open and the 'Patty's Plum' poppy was still showing in all its glory – that's never happened before. On the other hand, the delicate blue irises are only just beginning to flower and the first roses have appeared since Sunday. I expect the other gardeners would say the same. I know they would also say that they would love a chance to see the other

gardens, but so far we haven't managed to work that one out. Everyone's too busy before the day and too exhausted afterwards.

I must thank Tony Golds and Carol and Giles Luckett, who were selling tickets and welcoming people to the village. It ties them in one place all afternoon, but is the first impression visitors have. Sandy and her team did a wonderful job in the church and as people came round the gardens they were singing the praises of the lunches and planning to go back for tea. They were delighted to be given tea in REAL china cups and were enthusiastic about the whole experience. Good catering has always been a strong point in our OGD days and I know that once Sandy has volunteered, I can forget about it. Many thanks to Sandy, Lynne, Debbie, Wendy Baines, Michelle Heath and Marion, who were on duty when I went down to sample the cakes. Thanks also to the people who made cakes and donated items for the lunches.

The Plant Emporium was beautifully laid out and stocked with some really good bargains. There weren't as many plants as we sometimes have, which is true of all plant stalls so far this summer, but the quality was excellent and the results justified all the hard work put in by Angela and Andrew. Thanks to those who gave so generously.

As I said on the maps and in the publicity, this event is the major fundraiser for the church. We depend on it to help pay what Ely demands from us, which helps to maintain an overworked priest in our eight parishes. We depend on your support year after year and your appreciation and enjoyment of the day make it doubly worthwhile.

Update from Wereham Village Hall Committee Brief update from our last meeting on 21st May -

We welcomed new Trustee Roger Collins to the Committee as the representative of the Bingo Club. We were unsuccessful with our application for funding to fix the floor and flat roof, we are now in the process of obtaining three quotations and will aim to resolve at our next meet. We have taken delivery of the chair trolley and 20 navy table cloths to match the chairs. The New Build Team gave an update on visits to three other village halls that have been successful with funding, an update in response to discussions with Wren and Lottery, a business case (displayed in the hall) and advised the next stage of the project is evidencing community issues/needs and the various types of evidence required for funders. At our next meeting on the 18th June, we have a guest speaker from the recently successful Thornham Village Hall who were awarded £500k by the Lottery last September.

Governance -

For the benefit of the charity, holding/trustees and funding applications, we are in the process of replacing our 1961 Trust Deed with an up to date version supplied by the NRCC. We are working with our holding Trustees (the Parish Council) on this. This is still pending.

New Build Team -

We have been advised by our area co-ordinator at the Lottery that they will require -

- * An up to date door survey to evidence about what's difficult about living in our village and what the village hall can do to remedy that (get thinking caps on)
- * Evidence that we support other communities with events/clubs as our village is too small to gain major Lottery funding

To gain this evidence we will be actioning as follows -

- * From the 8th to the 21st July, members of our Committee and 'Friends of' will be conducting a door to door one page survey.
- * By the time you read this we will have actioned a community event at the Church Open Gardens and be preparing for a survey at the Church Fete.
