

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

What a peculiar year it has been so far weather wise! From mid-April until the time of writing (the second week of May) we have experienced summer, winter and spring all in under a month! I think we tend to forget that Britain is an island and it is bound to affect our weather. Even so it seems a bit extreme that the temperature can be 27C one week and only 7C a few days later. And then there have been several seriously windy days, and wet ones. This spring must have been a nightmare for farmers attempting to get on with sowing their spring crops of cereals and sugar beet. At least locally they weren't trying to cope with sodden clay soil which can be unbelievably wet and sticky. Crops already growing in the ground deteriorate quickly in cold, water logged soil. Many grassland farmers in other parts of the country had problems getting their cattle turned out. The grass was growing but the fields were so wet that scores of hooves soon turned the saturated ground into a quagmire, destroying the grass. Having said all that though it's amazing just what a difference a few days of warm sun and a drying wind can make.

It's not only farmers that have been badly affected but also the flora in our countryside although once again it's incredible how a few warm days, not necessarily sunny ones, and more importantly warm nights, can initiate a rapid spurt of growth. In late April I was checking our clematis for signs of growth and a week later I needed to tie them in! Our migratory birds are also at the mercy of the weather. I didn't see a swallow in the village until the beginning of May and as for house martins and swifts I'm still waiting. They don't seem to come round here much anymore. Why? Cuckoos visit Boughton Fen but I haven't seen or heard one in the Barton area for several years. It doesn't seem that long ago their incessant repetitive calling used to get on my nerves – now I'd love to hear one!

David and I are regular visitors to the Scottish Islands and it always amazes us that swallows, martins and cuckoos arrive there at least a month before here. Logically one would think it would be colder further north and they'd arrive later but that never seems to be the case. I wonder if it's because they follow the Gulf Stream, carrying warm Caribbean water, up the western side of Britain and bypass us to start with. Surprisingly some species of butterflies migrate that far northwards from the Continent and I shall never forget one year seeing thousands upon thousands of Painted Ladies filling the sky above the RSPB Reserve at Balranald on North Uist in the Outer Hebrides. Perhaps they too followed the same route.

Who knows what this summer will bring, but you can be sure our British climate will occasionally throw up the unexpected, and sometimes the unwelcome!

RECIPE PAGE

Lemon Drizzle Cake

6 oz Margarine


3 eggs

1 lemon

6 oz Caster Sugar

6 oz Self Raising Flour

11/2 teaspoons baking powder





5 oz Butter or Margarine

2 Eggs

2 oz Desiccated Coconut

5 oz Caster Sugar

6 oz S R Flour (or Plain Flour with 2 level teaspoons

of Baking Powder)

Milk to mix

Decoration: Glace Icing, Desiccated Coconut

and Glace Cherries

Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy.

Beat in the eggs.

Stir in the sieved flour, baking powder and coconut with enough milk to make a sticky consistency i.e. so that the mixture only drops off the spoon when shaken hard.

Put into a lined 2 lb. loaf tin and bake for approx. 1½ hours in the centre of moderate oven, gas 3, 160°C 150°fan.

When cold top with Glace icing, desiccated coconut and glace cherries

FREE HOME ASSESSMENTS ON OFFER

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes. Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.



SWAFFHAM MUSEUM 2018



In January we featured in an episode of **Antiques Road Trip**. Raj Bisram came to explore the connection between Swaffham and Howard Carter who discovered the tomb of Tutankhamun in 1922. We have one large room dedicated to Egyptology and Howard Carter.

One of our new displays 'From Beginning to End' is also very exciting as we celebrate the Swaffham Railway. This opened in 1847 and closed under the Beeching cuts in 1968. Some of you may remember catching the train to the coast for a day out, or using it to travel to work or school. Whatever your memories, you will enjoy our displays of photographs and memorabilia and the model rolling stock.

We have also delved into our store rooms and have a room of art work. All are by local artists and include a number by Ben Ripper. There is also a digital display of some of the museum's photographs of old(er) Swaffham.

Also new to the museum this year is the 16th century Communion Chalice, with its 19th century paten, from the ancient church at Houghton-on-the-Hill near North Pickenham. The church itself has a latest date of 1090 and its remarkable wall paintings system of the same date is world renowned.

The Houghton display includes a Roman ring found in the hedgerow by the church and a mourning ring to Robert Say. Reverend Say was vicar at Swaffham and then Rector at Houghton-on-the-Hill in the 18th century. The ring was found on Campingland and subsequently sold on ebay. Luck, or otherwise, brought it back home. The museum tells the story.

There are children's activities, take home information sheets and family museum trails as well as a Museum Shop which also houses the Tourist Information Centre.

Opening times are Monday to Friday 10am to 4pm and Saturdays 10am to 1pm.



Village Hall Developments – Public Consultation June 1st 4pm - 8pm



Possibly the most exciting project in decades in Barton Bendish, the decision to pursue funding to expand and improve the Village Hall, has reached the next stage of the process. Having received the backing of the Trustees, the Parish Council and other stakeholders, drawings of two alternative schemes have been drawn up by local resident, Chris Parsons.

Before pursuing Planning Permission, the next and most vital stage is the consultation of the residents and various groups who regularly use the Village Hall. Apart from extending the hall, it is necessary to replace the floor, improve insulation and cater more effectively for the disabled and the elderly. Before any application is made, the opinions and suggestions of residents will be eagerly sought.

The Consultation Meeting is set for <u>June 1st</u> in the Village Hall between 4 and 8pm. There will be a leaflet drop, to invite the public, in good time before the meeting. This meeting will not be formal nor involve a talk. It will offer an opportunity to look at the plans in detail and to ask questions of members of the Village Hall Management Committee.

We really need your views, both to inform the proposals but also to ensure any funders can be confident that the wishes of the community are properly represented.

It is very much hoped that all residents will look in and support the scheme.

Parish Council Notes - May 2018

This is the first of what we plan to be a regular series of articles about what your Parish Council here in Boughton is doing.

The 2018/19 financial year has just started and we thought you might like to know a little about our plans this year. Our precept income is quite small - a total of just £3160 - this year.

Our budgeted plans are modest and we rely greatly on valuable help from volunteers with such things as keeping the grass around the green nicely trimmed and of course the children's playground well maintained. Our expenses include insurance to cover theft of our assets such as our grass cutter and other equipment and any third party liability cover were an accident to occur on Parish land. We have a statutory duty to have a Parish Clerk and we pay ours a relatively modest salary. Much of the remainder of our budget is made up of a range of items including statutory annual audit fees, fuel for our grass cutter general maintenance, contributions to the church for cutting the churchyard grass and so on.

One thing that might be of particular interest is that we have a small reserve fund. Some £2500 of this has been raised by voluntary events and is earmarked to help fund the replacement of our playground equipment. The playground is immensely popular with both residents and visitors with children. At some stage we will need to replace or update the existing equipment — it is not a cheap option so ideas for any fund raising opportunities would be most welcome.

Incidentally, our present Clerk is shortly to leave due to her promotion in another role – so if any reader knows a suitably qualified Clerk who would be interested do let us know (Advert page 13) *Tim Scrivener*

anniversary of the end of the war.

'My grandfather was brought up in a house where the first language was Welsh. He was too young to volunteer but by 1917 he was working as a hewer of coal facing perils that were just as deadly as shells or mud.

After the war he escaped the pit and found work in Coventry. Sadly he was killed in the same raid

which destroyed the Cathedral in another World War.'
