Dear All,

I was reading an article the other day on 'responsible shopping'. As I'm dashing around a supermarket I often simply forget to weigh up the real cost of the things I'm buying. Things like the air miles or road miles the goods have travelled, the amount of packaging that has been used, as well as the human cost of things that are not Fairtrade. The Fairtrade initiative supports about 20 million workers and their families around the world, ensuring they have a fair wage for the work they do. Like most things it started fairly small but in this country we now spend about £2 billion on Fairtrade products each year.

Recently I have heard comments that we should really be supporting our own local farmers rather than buying Fairtrade goods. Well I don't know about you, but I haven't seen bananas, pineapples, tea and coffee grown in this part of Norfolk, so I think there is a place for both initiatives. Let's support our local farmers where we can, but for other goods let's support Fairtrade whenever we can. In the current economic climate we are all counting the pennies but we also have to see the bigger picture and count the real cost. Psalm 24 tells us that "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it." It is a great privilege for us to be entrusted with it, but an awesome responsibility, too.

Next Archdeacon of Cambridge appointed

The Bishop of Ely is delighted to announce that The Revd Dr Alexander Hughes, Vicar of Southsea St Luke and St Peter, has been appointed as the next Archdeacon of Cambridge. He succeeds the Ven John Beer who retired in March.

Dr Hughes was ordained in Oxford in 2000. He served his curacy at Headington Quarry in Oxford diocese before moving to the Diocese of Portsmouth as Bishop's Chaplain in 2003. Since 2008 Alex has been a parish priest in inner-city Portsmouth. He is also Chair of Governors at a secondary Academy.

The Bishop of Ely, the Rt Revd Stephen Conway, said: "I am delighted that Alex Hughes has accepted the invitation to become the next Archdeacon of Cambridge.

"Alex comes to us as an exceptional priest who encouraged the appointment panel with his passion for God, theological maturity and heart for the clergy and parishes. He comes with excellent educational experience as chair of a secondary academy to take on the role as Chair of the Board of Education.

"Alex is already eager to be involved in what we are seeking to develop as our generous and transformative vision in how we serve God's mission across our diocese."

Speaking about his appointment, Alex said: "I am hugely excited about joining the Diocese of Ely. I especially look forward to serving the parishes and deaneries of the archdeaconry, as they respond to the call to mission with generosity and imagination, and to working with the Board of Education in support of the Church's ministry in schools." Alex's wife, Sarah, is a trainee psychodynamic counsellor, and they have two children, Thomas (8) and Joseph (5). In his spare time Alex enjoys cooking and entertaining, reading, music and theatre. He took up running in 2012 and is currently training for the London Marathon.

Biography: Alex was born in Honiara, capital of the Solomon Islands, though he grew up on the south coast of England, in Southampton and Seaford. He came from a Christian family, but it was not until he was at Oxford studying theology that he sensed a call to ordination. After graduating Alex worked as a factory labourer at Parker Pen. In 1998 he married Sarah, and they spent their honeymoon back-packing round East Africa, Australia and Fiji. On return they

moved to Westcott House in Cambridge where Alex completed his ordination training and undertook post-graduate study.

Alex was ordained in Oxford in 2000. He served his curacy at Headington Quarry, before moving to Portsmouth diocese as Bishop's Chaplain. Since 2008 he has been a parish priest in inner-city Portsmouth. Among his duties in Portsmouth Alex is Chair of Governors at a secondary Academy.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

THE BATTLE AREA

Anyone who has been fortunate enough to have visited the Stanford Training Area (STANTA) will have thought they had taken a step back in time, indeed several locations were used in the filming of the 1970's TV series 'Dad's Army'.

The Battle Area is a massive training area extending for 30,000 acres from Hilborough estate in the north, almost to Thetford in the south and close to Watton in the east. It was created in 1941 when this huge tract of land was taken over by the MOD for training troops to fight in the Second World War. It resulted in the complete evacuation of six villages, Stanford, Buckenham Tofts, Sturston, Langford, Tottington and West Tofts at very short notice, about three weeks in fact. It also encompassed hundreds of acres of heathland, forestry and parts of several other parishes. David's friend, who died recently at the age of 100, was one of the first soldiers to be sent to Stanford. He arrived in mid-summer and recalled finding gardens of the abandoned cottages full of fresh vegetables and fruit for then nearly every family would have been growing as much of their own food as they could. The hungry soldiers made the most of this unexpected bounty. It must have been such a very sad time as families were forced to leave their homes and become split up.

Now occasionally organized groups are granted a guided tour and although there is no sign left of the cottages the churches have been spared and much of the landscape is little different to what it was then. For centuries the prime source of income from such poor quality land had come from farming rabbits. They were kept in enclosed warrens and bred both for their fur and meat but this organized management had been eroded when tree planting began in the 1920s and came to an abrupt end when the army moved in. Immediately post war a short-lived attempt was made to farm small parts of the training area and warreners, employed by the Ministry of Agriculture, were accounting for 30,000 rabbits a year. Modern farming is carried out in places on the periphery but the heart of the Battle Area is still very much in use for military training. Today, although some rabbits are still present, it is many hundreds of sheep that keep the unspoiled landscape open and relatively free from encroaching trees and scrub. There are a few small rivers and man-made lakes within the battle area as well as two or three natural 'meres'. These unpredictable lakes are sometimes dry, most often in winter, but a few months after the winter rains, when the water has had time to slowly permeate through the chalk beneath, they

mysteriously begin to fill which often happens in summer. This phenomenon varies from year to year.

Surprisingly the MOD take great pride in conservation management and under their care this natural habitat is carefully preserved as best it can be for the benefit of the animals, birds insects and plants that share this unspoiled area despite its continuing use as a high profile training area. *Jill Mason*

The only lockers that remain open are perfect squares (1, 4, 9, 16, etc) because they are the only numbers divisible by an odd number of whole numbers; every factor other than the number's square root is paired up with another. Thus, these lockers will be "changed" an odd number of times, which means they will be left open. All the other numbers are divisible by an even number of factors and will consequently end up closed.

So the number of open lockers is the number of perfect squares less than or equal to one thousand. These numbers are one squared, two squared, three squared, four squared, and so on, up to thirty one squared. (Thirty two squared is greater than one thousand, and therefore out of range.) So the answer is thirty one.

IT IS THE MONTH OF MAYING.....

The month of May was named for the Greek goddess Maia, who was identified with the Roman ergoddess of fertility, Bona Dea, whose festival was held in May. Conversely, the Roman poet Ovid provides a second etymology, in which he says that the month of May is named for the *maiores*, Latin for "elders," and that the following month (June) is named for the *iuniores*, or "young people"

May 1st - Observed as May Day, a holiday and spring festival since ancient times, also observed in socialist countries as a workers' holiday or Labour Day.

May 1, 1707 - Great Britain was formed from a union between England and Scotland. The union included Wales which had already been part of England since the 1500's. The United Kingdom today consists of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

May 1, 1960 - An American U-2 spy plane flying at 60,000 feet was shot down over Sverdlovsk in central Russia on the eve of a summit meeting between President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Soviet Russia's Premier Nikita Khrushchev. The sensational incident caused a cancellation of the meeting and heightened existing Cold War tensions. The pilot, CIA agent Francis Gary Powers, survived the crash, and was tried, convicted and sentenced to 10 years in prison by a Russian court. Two years later he was released to America in exchange for an imprisoned Soviet spy. On his return to America, Powers encountered a hostile public which apparently believed he should not have allowed himself to be captured alive. He died in a helicopter crash in 1977

May 3 Birthday - Italian writer and statesman Niccolo Machiavelli (1469-1527) was born in Florence, Italy. He offered a blunt, realistic view of human nature and power in his works *The Prince* and *Discourses on Livy*.

Birthday - Golda Meir (1898-1978) was born in Kiev, Russia. She was one of the founders of the modern state of Israel and served as prime minister from 1969 to 1974.

May 4, 1494 - During his second journey of exploration in the New World, Christopher Columbus discovered Jamaica.

May 6, 1937 - The German airship Hindenburg burst into flames at 7:20 p.m. as it neared the mooring mast at Lakehurst, New Jersey, following a trans-Atlantic voyage. Thirty six of the 97 passengers and crew were killed. The inferno was

caught on film and also witnessed by a commentator who broke down amid the emotional impact and exclaimed, "Oh, the humanity!" The accident effectively ended commercial airship traffic.

May 7, 1954 - The French Indochina War ended with the fall of Dien Bien Phu, in a stunning victory by the Vietnamese over French colonial forces in northern Vietnam. The country was then divided in half at the 17th parallel, with South Vietnam created in 1955.

Birthday - Composer Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) was born in Hamburg, Germany. He composed over 300 songs and numerous orchestral, choral, piano, and chamber works, including his *German Requiem* commemorating the death of his mother

May 10, 1994 - Former political prisoner Nelson Mandela was inaugurated as president of South Africa. Mandela had won the first free election in South Africa despite attempts by various political foes to deter the outcome.

May 12, 1937 - George VI was crowned at Westminster Abbey in London, following the abdication of his brother, Edward VIII. King George reigned until his death in 1952. He was succeeded by his daughter Elizabeth, the current reigning monarch.

May 18, Birthday - Pope John Paul II (1920-2005) was born (as Karol Wojtyla) in Wadowice, Poland. In 1978, he became 264th Pope of the Roman Catholic Church, the first non-Italian elected in 456 years and the first Polish Pope.

May 20, 325 A.D. - The Council of Nicaea, the first ecumenical council of Catholic Church was called by Constantine I, first Christian Emperor of the Roman Empire. With nearly 300 bishops in attendance at Nicaea in Asia Minor, the council condemned Arianism which denied Christ's divinity, formulated the Nicene Creed and fixed the date of Easter.

May 20, 1932 - Amelia Earhart became the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic. She departed Newfoundland, Canada, at 7 p.m. and landed near Londonderry, Ireland, completing a 2,026-mile flight in about 13 hours. Five years later, along with her navigator Fred Noonan, she disappeared while trying to fly her twin-engine plane around the equator.

May 21, 1991 - Former Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi was assassinated in the midst of a re-election campaign, killed by a bomb hidden in a bouquet of flowers. He had served as prime minister from 1984 to 1989, succeeding his mother, Indira Gandhi, who was assassinated in 1984.

Birthday - Russian physicist and human rights activist Andrei Sakharov (1921-1989) was born in Moscow. Although he helped construct the first atomic and hydrogen bombs for Soviet Russia, he later denounced the Soviet government and was exiled from 1980 to 1986. He was instrumental in formulating the political reform concept called *perestroika* and in encouraging *glasnost* (openness) in restrictive communist countries.

May 24, 1844 - Telegraph inventor Samuel Morse sent the first official telegraph message, "What hath God wrought?" from the Capitol building in Washington, D.C., to Baltimore.

May 28, 1961 - Amnesty International was founded by London lawyer Peter Berenson. He read about the arrest of a group of students in Portugal then launched a one-year campaign to free them called Appeal for Amnesty. Today Amnesty International has over a million members in 150 countries working to free prisoners of conscience, stop torture and the death penalty, and guarantee human rights for women.**May 29, 1453** - The city of Constantinople was captured by the Turks, who renamed it Istanbul. This marked the end of the Byzantine Empire as Istanbul became the capital of the Ottoman Empire.

May 29, 1660 - The English monarchy was restored with Charles II on the throne after several years of a Commonwealth under Lord Protector Oliver Cromwell.

Birthday - Founder of the Russian empire Peter the Great (1672-1725) was born near Moscow. He vastly increased the power of the Russian monarchy and turned his backward country into a major power in the Western world. Among his accomplishments, he completely overhauled the government and the Greek Orthodox Church as well as the military system and tax structure. He built St. Petersburg, established printing presses and published translations of foreign books, modernized the calendar, simplified the Russian alphabet and introduced Arabic numerals. He died at age 52 and was succeeded by his wife Catherine.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

This makes a very easy and quick supper dish served with a green salad.

TOMATO TART

INGREDIENTS

1 Pkt of Ready-roll Puff Pastry

1 Jar of Pesto

1 Box of small Plum Tomatoes

Handful of Parmesan Shavings

Sprinkle of Italian Herbs

Few drops of oil

Beaten Egg

METHOD

Roll out the pastry into an oblong larger than the baking sheet and trim round leaving

Enough pastry to add an extra layer all the way round to make a side for the tart.

Spread the base with the pesto and cover with the tomatoes. Prick each tomato to stop them bursting in the oven.

Sprinkle the top with the parmesan and herbs and dot all over with the oil. Brush around the edge with the beaten egg.

Bake in the oven at 180 until the pastry is cooked and looking golden. The tomatoes should have collapsed at this stage. 40 – 50 mins.

GARDENING TIPS

What a pleasure it has been to be able to get out into the garden, enjoy the warm spring sunshine and get a good start to the 2014 season which I believe, will turn out to be quite different in timing to anything we have experienced for a number of years. Seldom have we had such a continuous cornucopia of colour over such a long period both from spring flowers and shrub blossoms. I have a Viburnum Carlisii in my garden and this year it is a pleasure to behold – absolutely smothered in pink/white blossoms with such a heavenly scent. However, there is work to be done!

Dead head any bulb subjects as soon as the flowers have died off and give a feed of bone meal *gently* forked into the surface of the soil. If dry weather persists then the fertilizer will need watering in. When the flowers on spring flowering shrubs have died off lose no time in pruning the bushes. If the shrubs are getting oversize or out of shape this is a good time to deal with these matters as well. However, if you do have to prune hard then give the bushes a little help to recover. A dressing of blood, fish and bone watered in around the bush followed by a generous mulch will bring good dividends in subsequent years and help to keep the weeds at bay.

I anticipate that the soft fruit bushes and the cane bearing subjects will produce their fruit rather earlier than usual this year and will benefit from a dressing of sulphate of potash early this month. This applies equally to all the fruit bearing trees and bushes but do remember to *gently* water the fertiliser into the ground – it will do no good at all left on the surface of the soil!

Alpines and rockery plants in general will need tidying up as soon as their flowering period has passed. The old fashioned rockery plants need cutting back quite hard to keep them within their allotted space. However, the finer alpines should be treated with a little more TLC to get the best from them. Once the area has been cleaned up it is again a question of assistance from a suitable fertiliser to help them on into the new growth for their next season. Many rockery plants grow on very poor soils so don't overdo the feed, I usually give just one application of a soluble feed.

At the end of my April notes I commented upon the sad situation affecting two of my lawn areas. Having carried out the moss treatment I wrote about I think one area will recover with regular soluble feeding without having to reseed, but the jury is still out on the worst affected patch! Watch this space! Whatever the situation, all lawns having been raked out to remove the old dead matter left over

from the winter will require a spring and summer type feed.

It is early in April as I write this piece and at the moment I believe we shall continue to experience fairly settled conditions, with possibly the occasional unsettled day or two, for some time ahead. If I am right then we shall all be doing jobs in the garden several weeks ahead of what is normal. There is, however, always a fly in the ointment where weather conditions are concerned – if we continue to experience anticyclonic conditions, subject to where an anticyclone settles, we could run into late frosts. I can remember it happening in the past. In one such year I lost the entire top growth from my early potato crop in the first week of June! It reduced the yield by about 50%. So beware, even though we have an early season do not be in too much haste planting out those tender subjects! Those of us with the benefit of a greenhouse and a cold frame can usually manage to keep plants moving along on time. The problem with an early season such as we have this year gives the impression that we can plant our subjects with impunity. If you can provide the care that is necessary with the really tender subjects then you can get ahead by putting them outside on nice warm days and then back under cover at night or when conditions are inclement, but if you don't, then be patient.

In the vegetable garden the only items that now need care are runner beans and sweetcorn – it would be unwise to put them out into their permanent positions until the danger of frost has gone. You must watch the met forecasts day by day to get a true picture. On that note, which I am sure some of you will laugh at, I will finish this set of notes. The thought of believing a weather forecast – well I never! The Met people these days are more than careful after some of their rather unfortunate prognostications, but they are usually fairly accurate when it comes to predicting frost patterns. Those of you who live in known frost hollows must be particularly careful. *Roy Coughtrey*

INCINERATOR DEFEATED

I am very pleased to say; on 7th April 2014 the incinerator was finally defeated. Stopping it was the difficult part however; we still need to ensure Norfolk implements a sensible waste strategy. KLWIN and Farmers Campaign acted as a catalyst but the campaigns' success depended on active community involvement and a core of outstanding politicians. When we asked you to write letters, thousands responded making the difference between success and failure. West Norfolk Borough Council has been exemplary by standing up to County Council pressure. Henry Bellingham led Norfolk's MPs, effective lobbying on our behalf. Fortunately in 2013 many pro incinerator Councillors lost their seats. April's victory at County Hall was due to the cross party 'gang of six'. They are: UKIP leader Richard (Toby) Coke, John Dobson Conservative, Alex Kemp (now Independent), Andrew Boswell Green Party, Richard Bird Independent and Tim East LibDem. They set aside party politics to work together on our behalf. All UKIP and Green Party Councillors honoured their manifesto promises to stop the incinerator. The incinerator could be described as a 'near miss' in many ways; if it had continued regardless of the public mandate to stop it, voter participation in future elections might have collapsed. After all, why bother voting ever again, if politicians working together cannot stop the incinerator? Thankfully they did stop it, underlining just how important it is, to consider your vote carefully at every election.

If we don't vote or don't bother looking at the candidate behind the rosette it is easy to get 'stuck with' a second rate politician. Encouraging more people to pay attention to local government politics will help protect our future; we ignore it at our peril.

Lastly, Michael de Whalley deserves special recognition for his part in starting the campaign; and Richard from Burton Environmental Consulting, for providing his vital support entirely free of charge, Thank You.

All Saints', Shouldham

Praise Him upon the Loud Cymbals Psalm 150 is often used at bell-ringers' services because its references to lutes, harps, trumpets, etc. are no doubt thought appropriate to people with a noisy pastime! It is remarkable that almost six years have passed since All Saints' bells were rededicated following their major overhaul in 2007/08. Our faithful small band of ringers practises every Thursday, as well as ringing for most Sunday services; and there can be no doubt that the standard of our ringing has greatly improved since 'the Art' was re-started here in 1996.

Four of our bells are over 350 years old, with the two smallest being added by Sir Thomas Hare's family when the church was completely restored in 1870. No. 5 bell is the oldest, having been cast in the reign of Mary I (c.1556). It bears the founder's name: **AUSTEN BRACKER MAD (sic) ME ANNO DOMINI M...**

(the rest of the date filed off). Some of the letters are back-to-front, but there are also several, small shields on the bell's crown, including one of a Tudor rose with radiating sun's rays. Research has shown that Austen Bracker came from Ely and was an itinerant founder who probably cast the bell in a nearby field. Only about 8 of his bells still exist.

Bells Nos.3,4 and 6(the heaviest) were cast by the Norwich founder, John Brend II in 1652. The Brends (or Brands) had established a foundry in the city in 1564 and four successive generations continued it until the family was wiped out by plague in 1666. This second John Brend (1594-1658) cast a large number of bells for the Norfolk/Suffolk area, and is important to us as his inscriptions give a hint of the status of people connected to these castings. No. 3 bell is inscribed: "**Edmund Morris John Harpyle Church Wardens I.B. 1652**" (the initials are those of the founder); No. 4 has: "**Lennard Chambers Roger Erish I.B. 1652**"; and No.6 – "**Margaret Dunham: Peter Gage: John Skinner (sic) I.B. 1652**". These other names are likely to have been more affluent citizens who subscribed to the cost of casting. [Unusual at this time of the Puritan Commonwealth]. These ancient bells have neat scratch patterns inside their lips, showing where they were deliberately chipped with special hammers and chisels to bring them into tune with each other. Thus they still sound today exactly as they always have across the centuries.

As ringers, it is something of a privilege to perform on these antique instruments and to continue to announce the Gospel message. We are keen to introduce others to this very English skill, so if you are interested, please contact Brian Hullah (347814) or just come to see us ringing – absolutely no obligation! *Brian Hullah*

March 31st 2014 saw the retirement of Ian Berchem as Clerk to Barton Bendish

Parish Council a post Ian had held continuously for almost seven years following his appointment on 01 May 2007. It is difficult for me to do full justice to the dedication consistently displayed by Ian in his devotion to serve the best interests of all Parishioners throughout the whole of his period of service. There was never any difference between helping a single individual over some relatively minor matter and tackling a major issue affecting the whole of Parish life.

By way of illustration there are a few things I particularly recall.

July 2010 saw the resignation of some Councillors who could not agree with others and Ian was faced with a depleted Councillor number and the possibility of business failing because of the lack of the legally required quorum for the conduct of business. Ian dealt with the problem in a cool and detached manner arranging for the invitation of co-option volunteers as against the alternative of the expense of a full election. A full complement of Councillors was soon in office again with business being conducted in a thoroughly positive and friendly manner.

The early years of Ian's term as Clerk saw increasing concern over the stability of the War Memorial to the point where an eventual toppling over appeared an increasing possibility. Ian identified a specialist firm prepared to take on and guarantee the straightening and stability by means of silicon injections under the original footings and a fixed price contract of almost £4000 was agreed. Almost alone Ian arranged for successful grant applications covering the total cost and this meant that the work was soon completed at no expense whatever to Barton and Eastmoor Parishioners. The Memorial was cleaned and re-lettered and at the Remembrance Day Service of November 2011 was formally Re-dedicated.

The Coronation Jubilee celebrations at Barton Bendish were generally recognised as having been amongst the most successful of events in other Norfolk villages of a similar size. In typically enthusiastic fashion Ian ensured that our local celebrations got away to a flying start by hosting a superb garden party and flag raising ceremony at Holly House. This started a weekend of joyful activities culminating in Barton Bendish playing its part in the lighting of a nation-wide chain of Beacons to bring events to a most satisfying conclusion.

Ian Berchem takes with him into retirement as Parish Clerk the sincere and grateful thanks of the entire Barton Bendish and Eastmoor communities.



They are well versed in the Easter story—contrary to what you read in the press, schools do teach RE—and they are well behaved and enthusiastic. Reading aloud in church can be daunting for some adults, but the children did well. The singing is also excellent.

Harold Rix :On Maundy Thursday a former Boughton resident was buried in the churchyard after a short service. There are few people now living in the village who were born here, but Harold Rix and his twin brother John were natives of the village. They grew up and married twin sisters and lived in converted red single decker buses on land just across the road from the church. Harold's daughter Ann told me that they used to collect water from a spring in the churchyard. Harold worked on the land for George Wright in West Dereham. Harold died aged 88 and Hazel survives him. Does anyone remember Edith Marks? She was also buried in the churchyard, but no one knows where. It is very difficult to locate graves after many years if the family did not erect a name plate or a stone. Edith Marks died before I came to the village and if anyone can help locate her grave it would be appreciated.

The Easter service: As usual, Boughton celebrated Easter with the Vigil and first Communion of Easter on the Saturday night. It was a joyous occasion with most of the choir, fire, candles and a good congregation. Thanks to Robin, Pippa and Carol for celebrating and to everyone who came along and made it so enjoyable. **Open Gardens Day June 8th:** I now have several promises of gardens for the annual church fundraising event. If you haven't replied to my request, please do so. It makes it so much easier to plan and at the time of writing several people who normally open their gardens have yet to reply. It would be lovely to have a new garden as well. There is no pressure to make it perfect and a Kew Gardens replica. Speed Limit Following a note in a previous G4 edition, and posted on the notice board, asking for any opinions regarding a 20MPH speed limit through our village, we have received comments, written and verbal, indicating overwhelming support for this suggestion. The Parish Council have agreed therefore to take this forward to the next stage which is to consult the County Highways Authority to request this change. Thank you to the people who responded.

Boughton Fen Report for Parish Council Meeting 11.04.2014

Since my last report, the heavy rain during January and February has caused the fen to become very wet, but the new banks created by the EA have helped to retain some of the water. We will watch the new ponds formed behind the bank with interest, to see what arrives there.

Various people from Natural England have visited the fen recently, to refine some aspects of the HLS agreement with a view to enhancing habitats in localised areas.

Our major volunteer efforts for winter works have now come to an end, with large areas of scrub removed, pathways cleared and a new seat built on Highland Fen. Five working parties were held throughout the winter, with excellent numbers attending, including several new recruits, and my thanks go to all of them.

Over the next few days, the grass areas of Highland Fen will be cut to different levels to give varied habitat over the area. The cutting will be done by the Hawk and Owl Trust, who are kindly giving us a owl box for this part of the fen.

On 26th April, we are hosting a visit from CPRE Norfolk. We are one of six award winning sites opening their doors to guided tours. As of today .most of the places on the walk have been booked.

A number of seats are being built around the walk for you to break your stroll; we hope you enjoy them. Cutting of the path will, of course, continue during the summer. If you would like to help with this, please give me a call on 01366 500461. *Mark Pogmore*

Fincham St. MARTIN'S WINDOW APPEAL We have now been granted a faculty to restore the window in the north wall of the chancel. The window dates from the rebuilding of the church around about 1420-1430. It has aroused great interest because it depicts four musical angels, two playing lutes, one a harp and one a portative organ. Some of the original coloured pieces have been replaced with plain glass and there is heavy corrosion of the surviving paint and damage to the lead, as well as heavy deposits of algae on both inner and outer surfaces. Underneath are three tracery lights with glass dating from the 18th Century. One has been restored but the other two will be restored along with the medieval sections above. It should be a magnificent sight when nearly six hundred years of deterioration have been remedied. The window will have an internally ventilated protective glazing system when repaired which will not be noticeable but will protect it from the elements. The window will be removed and taken to the stained glass repairers in York. (yes - the window space will be covered for the duration!).

All this is going to cost £10,200. So far we have £1,015 donated by the Fincham Chorus from the proceeds of a concert, a donation of £1000 from Ken Blyth, a descendant of the Rev William Blyth, whose own commemorative stained glass window is opposite this one in the south chancel wall, a grant of £750 from The Glaziers Trust and the use of two legacies. This leaves us needing about eight hundred pounds. We are inviting donations of £5 to 'sponsor' a pane of glass for a member of your family or loved ones etc. that you wish to be recorded on a Master Drawing which will be and kept in the church.

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
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Fincham and District Women's Institute

Triangles and hexagons

Open the compass about two inches and press the point into the paper. This is the 'invisible' starting point from which the design will unfold. Draw a circle with the compass.

Put the compass point anywhere on the circumference of the circle and swing the pencil leg so that a mark is made on the circumference. Move the point of the compass to the pencil mark and make another pencil mark on the circumference. Continue doing this round the circle until there are six marks. From these six marks the series of hexagons and six-pointed stars illustrated here can be made.



Drawing stars within a hexagon
Join up the points in sequence round the circle to make the six-sided polygon, a hexagon. This has three pairs of parallel lines

Next join up every second point.
You now have an equilateral triangle

Join up the other three points and you have a second equilateral triangle. Together these two triangles make up a star. One triangle points up to heaven, the other points down to earth. Three pairs of parallel lines make up the star. In the middle of the star is another hexagon

Joining up every second point of the inner hexagon, makes another

equilateral triangle in the inner hexagon. Joining up the other points makes a second equilateral triangle and another six-pointed star with a hexagon in the middle

This pattern can go on and on.
