### **BENEFICE NEWS**

#### Remembrance Sunday

This year Remembrance Sunday will fall on 9<sup>th</sup> November 2014. This is a special year because of the 100<sup>th</sup> commemoration of the start of World War I and instead of the usual separate services in each church there will be one special group remembrance service in Fincham church. At that service we hope to have military and British Legion representation, and special musical pieces. Each church in the group will be asked to nominate someone to read out the names of the fallen from their parish during the service. Poppy wreaths will be blessed, so that they can be returned to the villages for laving on each War Memorial. Many people who live in our parishes have their roots in other areas and may wish to remember family or friends who died on active service and who are buried elsewhere (or who may have no known grave). Please feel free to pass those names and details to someone in your parish church so that they can be added to the list and read out on the day. The list of those to be remembered is not restricted to the fallen of the two world wars, and those who lost their lives in any war or peacekeeping operation occurring since 1914 can be remembered, so this might include other conflicts - for example, Korea, the Falklands, Afghanistan or Northern Ireland. UNISON, the UK's largest education union, and the National Society, which promotes and resources Church of England schools, have reached a landmark agreement that paves the way for all Church of England schools to gain Living Wage accreditation. The Church of England's nearly 4,700 schools are committed to paying the living wage but this new implementation plan will provide the means for all support staff to receive it by turning the schools into Living Wage employers\*. The schools are being given a step-by-step implementation plan produced by the union, covering both directly employed and contracted out staff to help them win Living Wage accreditation. The agreement follows a motion that was passed by the General Synod, which recognised that 'the widening gap between rich and poor harms all of society and that paying a Living Wage lifts people out of poverty'. It agreed to strongly encourage all Church of England institutions to pay at least the Living Wage, as recommended by Church Action on Poverty. This year, UNISON's evidence to the Low Pay Commission included testimonies from low paid workers across the country, highlighting the misery and stress on millions of families struggling to cope on poverty wages - which the Living Wage would go some way to addressing.

### **COUNTRYSIDE NOTES**

This year has been an exceptional one for berries which is good news for many species of birds. Yew has a reputation for being poisonous although it's said that only the leaves are harmful and then only to humans and horses. Interestingly the deadly poison responsible is 'Taxin' from which the word toxin is derived. Personally there is no way that I would try eating the berries either although there are many birds that relish them.

One of the earliest species of berries to ripen are those of the rowan (mountain ash) tree. The small, bright red fruits are much sought after by birds. In the north some conservation-minded moorland estates have planted rowan trees in sheltered gullies as they are also attractive to black grouse (blackcock). Waxwings, winter visitors from Scandinavia which arrive here in varying numbers depending on the weather and availability of food in their locality, love rowan berries. They also favour cotoneaster and are one of the few species to have a liking for rosehips, in fact one of the most likely places to find waxwings is among the shrubs and trees planted in supermarket car parks where they seem completely unfazed by people coming and going. Other winter visitors are redwings and fieldfares, both members of the thrush family. Crowds of them can be seen stripping the berries from hedgerow hawthorn bushes. They can also be found, along with many other species, raiding holly trees.

Tiny black berries hang in bunches on elder bushes growing in woods, hedgerows and waste ground. These are a particular favourite of blackbirds and wood pigeons who clumsily balance on the thin branches in an effort to reach such tempting morsels. Later on, acorns also prove very attractive to wood pigeons as well as jays and pheasants, although they can hardly be referred to as berries.

Wild cherries too provide early fruit. The hawfinch has a beak strong enough to crack the stones inside but generally seeds of hornbeam prove to be their favourite diet. Brightly coloured bullfinches have a special taste for the black berries of buckthorn and dogwood as well as the translucent red berries of guelder rose. There isn't very much mistletoe growing in Norfolk but in some areas, such as the Severn Valley, it is extremely prolific. Apple trees are the most common host, although it will grow almost anywhere. Mistle thrushes find the white berries very appealing, hence their name. The blackcap, previously only a summer visitor but a bird that now sometimes decides to stay, also

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relishes mistletoe berries and helps to spread the sticky berries by wiping its beak on tree branches.

Some berries, such as the peculiar bright pink spindle berries, don't seem to be so attractive, and sloes, the dark purple fruits of the blackthorn, are more popular with humans to add to gin which in turn is itself made using juniper berries.

Undoubtedly though, the most popular wild autumn fruit of all must be the blackberry for humans, birds and animals alike harvest the crop. *Jill Mason* 

### GARDENING TIPS

November, and we are approaching the end the gardening season – but I have no doubt, if you have not yet reached the retirement age, there will still be some jobs outstanding. When you are retired, like me, it is so much easier to get the garden tasks done in the more clement weather. However, I suddenly remembered a day or so ago that there was a job that I should have done but hadn't! It's the age and memory you know – and as the years go by it gets worse. I must take note of my own teaching and make a list, the only problem being to remember what to put on the list!! Ah, well, back to the garden.

If you didn't manage to get all those jobs done by the end of October then you should not delay, the weather in November can be a real problem. If you have to tread on really wet ground then do please remember to fork over the area where you have been. Leaving the soil compacted means the soil cannot breathe, the worms cannot work through those parts quite so easily and ultimately the quality of the soil will decrease besides making your life more difficult at a later date when you need to break up that area for future planting.

If you have not already done so any root crops still in the vegetable garden, with the possible exception of parsnips, should be lifted without delay, cleaned, and stored away for winter use. I liked to leave my parsnips in the ground until they had been frosted and then lifted and placed in store. Again this is a question of available time, but I always have held the belief that parsnips have a better flavour after frosting!

November is one of the best months to plant bare rooted subjects like roses and trees. Always dig a hole large enough to be able to spread out the subject's roots and if any are broken or damaged prune off the piece/s affected. It has

always been my practice to work well-rotted compost or manure into the bottom of the hole before planting, and to spread a dusting of bone meal over the excavated material so that when the hole is filled in the roots are immediately encouraged to set off in search of nutrients. Finally, having watered the subject well, and put a mulch of compost or manure round the base of the tree or bush, secure (if a tree), to a suitable support with a proper 'tie' having a buckle to tighten and then loosen as the tree grows. I now favour the support driven in away from the roots at an angle of approximately 45° to engage with the tree at about 45cm above ground level. Alternatively, there is now the belief amongst some that no manure should be put in the hole before planting. They suggest the compost or manure should be put around the subject as a top dressing and mulch. The decision is yours!

Any raspberry canes should by now have stopped growing, so give them a final tie to their support and nip out the growing tips. Sweet peas sown in October should now be potted up individually as described in my November 2012 garden tips. To avoid 'wind rock' through the winter I suggest you trim your rose bushes down to approximately 45cms (18 inches). It doesn't matter where you cut and you may get some weak growth after this which will probably get frosted, but this is of no consequence as the final prune in March next year will be much lower. If any of my bushes have been subject to 'black spot' I strip all the leaves away and spray the bushes and the surrounding soil with a fungicide solution.

With autumn upon us we shall all have the inevitable problem of fallen leaves. It is important to keep these cleared away as often as you can. Leaving them upon the ground will bring problems you would rather be without – slugs, snails and not least moss in your grassed areas!

The time has come to start thinking about the winter digging programme for the vegetable garden. Try to do the job when the soil is reasonably dry. Difficult I know at this time of the year, particularly so if time is short, but I have no doubt there will still be plenty of opportunities to get the job done before the winter is out.

Have you had that last look round to see that all is secure for the winter and that all of your tender plants have been put snugly away? *Roy Coughtrey* 

### **RECIPE OF THE MONTH**

With autumn in the air, thoughts definitely turn to comfort food. The Spanish name for this Mexican dish was quickly replaced by 'cheesy beans' in our household, but the colours and flavours are far less prosaic than this name implies. If you have a flame proof casserole dish, this is one pot cooking at its best – anything that reduces the washing up is good with me. What's more, as with many spicy dishes, the flavours mature with time, so it's even better as leftovers on day 2. Scoop up the soft beans with crunchy tortilla (nacho) chips.

#### Cheesy Beans (Habas Verdes con Queso) Serves 4 – 6

- 2 tins butter beans, drained and rinsed
- 300g cream cheese (eg Philadelphia type I use reduced fat version)
- 2 tblsp vegetable oil
- 2 cups chopped onions
- 2 large garlic cloves, minced
- 3 peppers, different colours, diced
- 2 medium carrots, diced
- 2 tins chopped tomatoes
- 2 teaspoons hot chilli powder (or to taste)
- 1/2 tsp dry mustard powder
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp paprika
- salt to taste
- tortilla chips to serve

Sauté the onions and garlic in oil until the onions are translucent. Add the peppers and carrots and continue to sauté for 5 mins. Then add the tomatoes and spices, reduce the heat and simmer for 15 mins, until the carrots are tender. Meanwhile, pre-heat the oven.

Stir the butter beans and cream cheese into the vegetable mixture. Pour into a greased casserole dish (unless you are using a flame proof dish in the first place) and cover. Bake at gas mark 4 /  $180^{\circ}$ C for 25 mins. Kirstie Urquhart

### What is Advent?



Advent is the four-week period beginning on the Sunday nearest the feast day of St. Andrew the Apostle (November 30) through the following three Sundays. Historians estimate that Advent, which derives from the Latin word for coming, has been celebrated since the fourth century. The period originally began as a time for converts to Christianity to prepare for baptism, but is now more commonly associated with the anticipation of the

anniversary of Christ's birth on December 25.

An Advent calendar is a special calendar used to count or celebrate the days in anticipation of Christmas. The days usually overlap with the Christian season of Advent, which can be as early as November 27 and as late as December 3. Many take the form of a large rectangular card with "windows" of which there are usually 24: one for each day of December leading up to Christmas Day. The calendar windows open to reveal an image, poem, a portion of a story (such as the story of the Nativity of Jesus) or a small gift, such as a toy or a chocolate item. Some calendars are strictly religious, whereas others are secular in content. Advent calendars typically don't follow the period of Advent described above. Instead, they begin on December 1 and mark the 24 days before Christmas. Today, most Advent calendars include paper doors that open to reveal an image. Bible verse, or piece of chocolate. The tradition dates to the mid-19th century, when German Protestants made chalk marks on doors or lit candles to count the davs leading αu to Christmas. The producer of the first printed Advent calendar in the early 1900s is widely thought to be a German named Gerhard Lang.

Around the same time, a German newspaper included an Advent calendar insert as a gift to its readers. Lang's calendar was inspired by one that his mother had made for him and featured 24 coloured pictures that attached to a piece of cardboard. Lang modified his calendars to include the little doors that are a staple of most Advent calendars today and they

became a commercial success in Germany. Production stopped due to a cardboard shortage during World War II, but resumed soon after, with Richard Sellmer emerging as the leading producer of commercial Advent calendars.

#### CANON ANDREW WHITE, VICAR OF BAGHDAD ON FORGIVENESS

Andrew is in grave danger from ISIS. He majors on reconciliation. Forgiveness is a learning process and I am grateful to have learnt more about it during my time in this benefice. Andrew writes: "Forgiveness is the most important thing in my life, since it is the only thing that can prevent the pain of the past from determining our future.

"Reconciliation is not an isolated event, but a continuing process; a journey. It is something that cannot quickly be conjured up, but requires immense patience and nurture. Forgiveness is a constant, continuous act of the will - something we walk out and practise regularly.

"When you release the wrongdoer from the wrong, you cut a malignant tumour out of your inner life. You set a prisoner free, but you discover that the real prisoner was yourself. This reminds me that 'Father, forgive' is a confession that releases grace to the wrongdoer, but freedom to ourselves. Forgiveness is a process that takes time, but so many cripple themselves by clinging on to the pain of the past, unwilling to relinquish it. Of course, it is not easy to let go of pain, but it surely prevents us from moving forward.

"So often, our cry for 'justice' is really a cry for what we believe we want or need which is often a vindictive strike back at the person or people who caused our pain. So often we are consumed with merely "getting back" at those who have hurt us in order to cause them similar suffering.

"Anger is wrong when it makes us bitter against people, and leads us to hate them and to want to do or say evil against them. Anger, as the mere expression of wounded personality, is sinful; for it means that self is in command."

May we all learn to forgive, as Andrew does in such a difficult context, and as Jesus taught us, even when he was being crucified. We surely need his help to do this.

#### **George Seymour**

George was baptised in Boughton church on 4<sup>th</sup> September 1887. He was the voungest child of William and Sarah Anne Seymour and had two older sisters. Harriet and Louise. On 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1913, he married Ethel Carter of Wereham. In the register he was described as a labourer, resident in Boughton. It wasn't until Pamela Jennings pointed it out that I realised he has an official war grave headstone. George and Ethel had a son, William, whose baptism is also recorded for 1914. George joined the1st/4th Bn. Norfolk Regiment and saw service as a private in the Palestine campaign. He was wounded and died of his wounds

at home in 1918. That's all I've been able to find out so far, but if anyone has

any more information, or a photo of him, I'd be interested to hear from them.
