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FROM THE RECTORY

As the evenings draw in and the mornings become crisp and chilly, my thoughts start to turn to November and to Remembrance Sunday.

Public attendance at Remembrance events has fluctuated over the years, but has increased more recently, partly due to greater awareness of the scale of sacrifice of our soldiers, sailors and airmen, especially when we commemorated a hundred years since the end of World War One in 2018.

In our rural villages here in Wissey Valley it is perhaps easier to comprehend in human terms the impact of the World Wars as we look at the number of names on our village war memorials. We can imagine the impact it had on these small communities, where everyone would have known those who had died and also the wives, young children and families they left behind.

Nowadays we increasingly also think of the service personnel who survive wars and conflicts, but are left with deep and enduring injuries, both physical and psychological. One of the privileges I had as a doctor was to care for some of the veterans of the two World Wars. They were a generation who had kept many things to themselves and suffered considerably in their silence. As a society we are now doing better in supporting them – but it is by no means perfect.

I hope over the coming weeks you will have time to reflect on how best to commemorate the lives of all those who served in the conflicts of the Twentieth and Twenty-First Centuries. Across the Benefice many of our churches will be holding services of Remembrance on 12th November, including a two-minute silence at 11.00am.

We should also look at how we can support those who still bear the scars of the service they gave for us and for humanity.

RECIPE PAGE

PARTRIDGE WITH APPLE

The game season is now underway and you should have no difficulty sourcing fresh partridge, contact me if you do and I will try and help. Partridge can become tough if over cooked so beware of this, serve it pink.

Ingredients:

No specific quantities as almost any ratio works well

2 Partridge breasts per person

Bramley (or any other cooking) apple diced and added to cold water with lemon

juice

Butter
Shallots, finely diced
Pernot or equivalent
Apple juice

Optional double cream
Optional seasoning





Method:

- 1. In a medium hot frying pan brown off the partridge breasts for around 3 minutes in butter. Remove and keep warm.
- 2. Dry then brown off the apple cubes in the same pan, keeping a bite to them. Remove and keep warm.
- 3. Add the shallot and cook gently in butter until soft.
- 4. Now add apple juice and a little pernod to deglaze the pan start with 1/2 tsp of pernod and taste add more if you like a stronger flavour. Add seasoning now if wanted. Reduce the sauce until starting to thicken at this point you can either add cold butter to make a buttery sauce or double cream if that is what you prefer.
- 5. Pop the partridge and apple back into the sauce for 30 seconds to warm then serve straight away with your vegetables or salad of choice.

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

Seals, or rather peoples' irresponsible interaction with them, were recently making headlines. Once seals were a rare site in England but during this century their population has exploded. There are two species to be found around Britain – the Grey seal and the Common, aka the Harbour seal, which ironically is the less prevalent. The Common is smaller and has a more rounded head and shorter nose than the Grey. Both species are large mammals with the Common reaching 5-6ft (1.5 m) in length and varying in weight between 180 -330 lbs (80-150kg). Greys are much bigger with males growing up to 9ft (3m) and weighing as much 650lbs (300kg) when fully grown. In the wild seals can live for up to 35 years. They are carnivores and feed principally on fish. They have no natural enemies and since gaining various degrees of legal protection since 1970 numbers have greatly increased which must be impacting on our coastal fish species.

Although numbers of grey seals dropped to only 500 in the early 20th century, there is now estimated to be more than 120,000 around Britain representing 40% of the world's population. The UK population of Common seals is around 55,000 and they are more abundant in northern waters. Only a few colonies exist along the east coast in sandy estuaries, between Scotland and the Wash.

Seals come ashore to have their young which they only suckle for three to four weeks. Their milk is very rich and the pups grow rapidly. The breeding area is known as a 'rookery'. Common seals have their young between June and August, the Greys between November and January. During this period they also moult and mate. The seals then return to the sea leaving their pups to fend for themselves.

We are very fortunate in Norfolk that there are two places where we can view seals close up. Grey seals can be seen at Horsey Gap during their breeding season from a viewing area which is accessible on foot. Both Common and Grey seals can be viewed by boat at Blakeney Point the year round. Trips are organised according to the state of the tides and depart from either Morston Quay or Blakeney. Seals can also sometimes be found on sandbanks off of Hunstanton and at Winterton. Blakeney Point is home to England's largest Grey seal breeding colony with well over 3,000 pups now being born each year. Numbers have consistently increased year on year since the first Grey seal pup was recorded there in 1988.

It's even actually possible to see seals closer to home. A couple of years ago we saw one swimming in the Great Ouse between Denver Sluice and Ten Mile Bank. Not sure how it negotiated the Sluice! Even closer than that was Billy who, in the 1920s and early 30s, was resident in Boughton Pit (pond). He was fed fish and by all accounts would make his way across to the George and Dragon for a beer! Billy is immortalised by being depicted on the village sign. *Jill Mason (Barton Bendish)*

IT'S ALL SYSTEMS GO AT MAGPIE CENTRE

With the start of the new school term, riding lessons have resumed at the Magpie Centre, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled.

Funding for these lessons has received a huge boost from the Central England Co-op community fund, although only one of its stores, in Terrington St Clement, is within both the Central England Co-op and West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled catchment areas.

A grant of £3,700 will help to fund vital lessons for young people, living with a wide range of physical and learning disabilities.

Caroline Dudley, who volunteers at the Magpie Centre, and shops at the Terrington store, said: 'I picked up a leaflet about the fund and mentioned it to our Trustee who deals with grant applications. I never thought we'd have a chance because we are right on the eastern edge of the Central Co-op area.

'Next thing I knew, we'd been awarded a grant to subsidise 200 lessons. The benefits of riding, to people living with disabilities, is immense and range from the obvious physical ones to an improvement in communication skills and social confidence. I was over the moon,' she added.'

Funds for the Magpie Centre sensory garden, officially opened in July by HRH the Princess Royal, also received a welcome boost, thanks to the efforts of two Trustees, Jan Calvert and Andy Beeston, who completed the Grand East Anglia Run in very good times and raised more than £700 in sponsorship for the garden.

Said Jan: 'Completing the run was a fantastic experience and many thanks to the kind people who so generously sponsored us.'

Second pilot session of Tea With a Pony took place early in September and was a huge success. These mornings aim to attract people living with dementia and their carers, who can socialize over tea and cake in the sensory garden and stroke some of our gentle ponies. Cost is £10 per participant, including carer.

Free Home Assessments on Offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

This was partly because the school was housed in a fabulous building and partly because they fed us with wonderful high teas. More importantly, the school was set in acres of beautiful heathland, dotted about with picturesque lakes. One year two young marshals threw mud at me on the way past. On the second lap I nudged them off the narrow track into the lake where they stood knee deep in water, looking a little surprised. Naturally no grudges were held.

I was sad to hear that the school had folded in 1980 and went back to visit the site on one of our many Norfolk holidays. The railway station no longer had trains running through it and one of the pubs had closed but, those things apart, the village was much the same. If you find yourself nearby, visit the majestic

atmospheric church, if only to look at the roof and roodscreen. Take a walk along the old track bed to Reepham and beyond. Take time to walk around Cawston Heath and explore the woods and lakes. If you want to know what is best about this hidden county, you will find it here.

The old school looked much the same, except it had now become Cawston Park Hospital. As soon as we parked, we were approached by sinister looking security men who brought us into reception and fired questions at us about what we were doing there. Eventually I was allowed to explain that I just wanted to walk around the once familiar campus but was told that this would be forbidden because Cawston was a high security psychiatric hospital with some potentially dangerous patients. Under escort I was allowed a glimpse of the former playing fields and told to leave.

Years later I was horrified to hear about the three entirely preventable deaths and abuse of patients which had happened there and led to the closure of the hospital. Now I can't help wondering whose security the guards were really concerned about. Many young people spent many happy and fruitful hours there as they prepared for their adult lives. What a tragedy that the same, lovely building has been used for such unkind and evil purposes. **Andrew Stephen**

The Barton Bendish Arts and Crafts Event

This hugely prestigious event, like so many others, couldn't be held last year and there was some very natural apprehension about how successful it would be compared with previous events in less troubled times. We needn't have worried. Like Open Gardens a couple of months before, it was an unqualified success. Indeed, it was the most successful ever. There was a palpable buzz around the village all weekend.

There is no doubt that people have missed doing normal things and opportunities to be part of something bigger. Looking at the work of artists and craftsmen....or craftspeople as I should say is always a real tonic. There was a display of real skill and variety, quite astonishing in its quality. So many visitors pointed out how amazed they were that such a small village keeps producing such impressive events. Many commented on what a lovely village it is and it's obvious that the villagers here are very proud to live here. We feel very fortunate too. Today's Barton Bendish is a far cry from the place derided by the Daily Mail as "the loneliest place on Earth" after a notorious murder in the Nineteenth Century. The secret of course is to be found among the people who live here. Some of them have transformed the Village Hall into a community facility that anyone would be

proud of. It is bigger, more airy and thoroughly modernised. Soon people will be falling over themselves to hire it! It is the PCC, however, who must take the credit for the Arts and Crafts Event and for so many others due to return. They are tireless and well organised and they supported this event with music, excellent catering and craft demonstrations. They made sure that exhibitors were helped as much as possible and that volunteers were very clear about their duties. We are all very grateful to them and look forward to the resumption of community breakfasts and a whole raft of familiar events.

Sales amounted to over £8,000 of which £3.500 is profit. 25% of this will go to the Alzheimer's Charity this year. The rest will go to St. Andrew's Church. It is a wonderful thing to see this amount of money raised for such good causes but it has also been so encouraging to see the community come together in such troubled and fractured times. **Andrew Stephen**

It is warm, airy and comfortable and full of very welcome facilities. Those doing the cooking will have found that job much easier than they would have of yore. A fully modernised and well equipped kitchen with a great deal more room to move in is a huge improvement on the cramped and limited facilities of the past.

The hall possesses impressive audio visual equipment and we were able to enjoy atmospheric music at the connection of a phone rather than having to find a cassette player or radio. What a go ahead bunch we are here. I know there are plans to create more community events to be held in the hall and I hope that many of them will be a bit like this, an opportunity to meet and chat in convivial surroundings. The numbers were a little low but after Covid this was

understandable. They will grow as will the message that the village hall belongs to the community, all of us. Our next target will be to persuade more people that there is a place for all of us, however independent we may be.

We would especially like to thank John Norton and Mark Lusby for helping us - your efforts are much appreciated.



Beachamwell Local History Group - An Update

Amazingly it is now over seven years since Beachamwell's Connecting Threads Weekend, which comprised guided walks and an exhibition in the village hall illuminating the history of the footpaths that criss-cross our village and celebrated the nature to be seen there. That weekend spawned an active Local History Group which in following years staged a number of events, which attracted a lot of local interest. It hosted a variety of talks, most notably two about people connected to Beachamwell Hall, Constance Villiers Stuart and the sculptor Oscar Nemon. The group also organised exhibitions showcasing archaeological finds, the history of Beachamwell Hall and some notable local families and the history of the churches in and around the village. At the 1918 Remembrance Day commemoration, Pat Stringer related the results of her research into men named on the War memorial in St Mary's Church. Philip Spencer created a website of items of local historical interest which is still (for the moment) accessible at www.beachamwell.org.uk.

The number of active members has dwindled as some have moved elsewhere. three (Mark Powell, Brian and Carole Wilson) have sadly died and the Covid pandemic meant the group became dormant. At the moment, our small band are looking at ways to conserve the materials used in past exhibitions and to make them more accessible to a wider audience, but none of us are able to take a lead on any future work. To carry on, the group would need someone new to steer a fresh course. If you are such a person and would be interested in resurrecting Beachamwell's Local History Group, we would really love to hear from you.

As the current chairman of the group, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those BLHG members who over the years worked hard to organise and contribute to the exhibitions, website and talks: Janet and Mike Walker, Helen and Gordon Ranger, Nevyn Ranner, Pat Stringer, Eileen Powell, Simon Smith, Chrissy Barr and of course, Philip and Leah Spencer.

Picnic Table: Councillor Coulten undertook to inspect the picnic table by the pond. He has subsequently done this and rebuilt one of the seats that had become unstable.

Grass Cutting: Two additional volunteers have come forward to help with the grass cutting and strimming on The Green and the Play Park. More help would still be welcome. Please get in touch if you can assist.

There has been much discussion in recent months about the future organisation of the Deanery, the groupings of churches in this area. As an area with mostly small parishes, it's difficult to maintain and grow the local churches, many of them with long traditions attached to their villages. A noble group of representatives in the Deanery have been developing a strategy, following an initiative from William Burke, the previous Rural Dean. Fraser Reich from Bexwell has done a great deal of work, looking at the situation and presenting it to Deanery Synod for onward transmission, with the aim of presenting a coherent plan to the Diocese about the future of these parishes. Many thanks to them for all the work they have put in and we've done our best to pass on the information within this parish. On September 30th, we met for a PCC meeting in the church and discussed the place of our church and our hopes for the future. We are a small band of regular worshippers, but we felt that there is a place for us and we voted to remain as a Parish Church for as long as possible, and to keep the present benefice structure (small groups of parishes with a focal minister), rather than have a model where one minister ran all 30+ parishes as one vast unity. We want a local minister who knows us, as we felt this would be more efficient and more acceptable. All these deliberations have now been sent back to Fraser and his team to be collated with everyone else and sent to the Diocese.

We are a small congregation and we are very glad to see those from other parishes who visit and join our fellowship. It would be lovely to welcome more people from the village, especially anyone who has just moved in and doesn't really know anyone. Apart from our two Sunday services (we are hoping to resurrect Breakfast Church before too long!) we also have a Thursday morning Holy Communion on the third Thursday of the month at 10 am. It doesn't matter if you are not a communicant, but just want to get out of the house, make a few friends and enjoy a cup of coffee. We are very friendly!

I must pay tribute to the PCC members, without whom I couldn't carry on. Everyone plays a part and puts in a great deal in different ways.
