Churches reveal 2013 Christmas campaign

COUNTRYSIDE NOTES REPTILES

There are six species of reptiles (three lizards and three snakes) found in Britain. If they are disturbed they all prefer to creep or slither away out of sight rather than attack. The only poisonous one is the *adder* or *viper*. All our reptiles hibernate between late October and the end of February and shed their skin three or four times a year.

Probably the most widespread and commonly seen is the *grass snake* which although seeming to prefer damp places, where it can even be seen swimming in ponds, can also be found in drier areas. It is completely harmless and can be identified by the pale coloured ring around its neck. It is our largest snake growing up to five feet long. I once found a complete cast skin that measured forty four inches. Females are about four years old and two feet long before they start to breed laying up to forty eggs usually in a damp warm place such as a compost or manure heap. As a young kid I caught one thinking I would take it home as I'd heard they could be easily tamed, however the revolting smell it secreted when I picked it up soon made me change my mind!

The *adder* or *viper* does not get much bigger than two feet long and prefers dry habitats. Although there is great variation in colour and markings characteristically a pair of dark bars on the head nearly always form a V or X shape. It hibernates in damper places. When I lived in West Sussex people used to come on the estate each spring to pick moss, they'd often find adders emerging from hibernation. Adders give birth to between five and twenty live young.

The *smooth snake* is rare and fully protected being found mainly on sandy heaths in Dorset, Hampshire and Surrey and some coastal dunes in Lancashire. It can grow over two feet in length and gives birth to live young. The smooth snake shares its habitat with the equally rare *sand lizard* which is its favourite food. This lizard lays six to twelve eggs from which the young hatch.

Common lizards are widespread and frequently found on dry heaths, moors and dunes. They are about six inches long and give birth to live young.

The one species of reptile that always causes confusion is the *slow worm*. It grows to more than a foot long and is pinkish in colour looking quite like an overgrown earthworm. While resembling a snake it is in fact a legless lizard and can be greatly beneficial in the garden as it has a liking for slugs. Although widespread it's most common in the south. It gives birth to between six and twelve live young and its main enemies besides misguided humans are hedgehogs and surprisingly adders.

CHOCOLATE SANDWICH CAKE

4oz butter

4oz caster sugar

3oz self-raising flour

1oz cocoa powder

2 large eggs

Teaspoon baking powder

Cream together butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time with half the flour to each egg. Beat in the cocoa and baking powder.

Cook in two 7" tins at 140C for 20 minutes.

Filling

2oz butter

4oz icing sugar

Tablespoon of cocoa powder mixed with tablespoon boiling water.

Beat together until smooth and use to sandwich cooled cakes together.

Topping

3oz icing sugar

Tablespoon cocoa

2 tablespoons boiling water.

Beat together until smooth and pour over cake.

GARDENING TIPS

The coming of October means that we are now firmly into the autumn months. With such a beautiful summer behind us how shall we fare this month? Very often after a long and settled spell of weather, such as we have had up until now (Monday, 2nd September), often bodes well for a reasonable autumn but our weather patterns now seem to be anything other than we were used to years ago so we shall just have to wait, as always, to see what is in store for us! That said, whatever the weather we gardeners always have work to do at this time of the year. Personally I like to have all my outside work done, with the garden looking ship shape and Bristol fashion, by the end of October. Being retired and given reasonable conditions, that is not too difficult, but I know when still at work it is a very difficult thing to do but nevertheless that should be the aim leaving only the winter digging and leaf clearing for November and beyond.

October is the ideal month to completely clear out the perennial flower border a daunting task but one that must be done every few years if you want to keep the border looking at its best. Ideally you need a spare piece of clear ground so that as you dig out the old plants you can split them up, keeping some of the best sections in the spare piece of ground, watering them well as they are They can sit in that position until you have finished digging and planted. cleaning the old border and are ready to replant. If the weather turns against you they can be left where they are until conditions recover in the following Whilst digging through the border take the opportunity to put in some sprina. well-rotted manure, if you can get it, or your own compost strengthened by some of the manure obtainable in bags from the local Garden Centre. This extra effort will be well worth while, it will show immediately in the quality of next year's blooms and will help to maintain the plants at their best through the years before the operation is repeated.

All roses, with the exception of ramblers and the shrub varieties, need pruning this month. I know many people like to leave their bush varieties whilst there are buds still to open but if, as is usual, we get the autumnal and then winter gales your bushes left untrimmed can suffer a great deal of damage. Personally I always trim mine back at the end of October to a height of approximately 18" (46cms) and at the same time I remove any damaged or diseased leaves both from the plants and from the ground around them. These latter should ideally be burnt but if you don't have the facility then dispose of them safely. Having completed this job I always spray my plants thoroughly with a herbicide particularly if there has been any signs of black spot. Climbing

roses need careful attention. So many climbers end up with all their flowers way up at the top of their growth leaving the lower stems bare. If they are growing against a wall or trellis arrangement then bend over the new growth in smooth curves, tying the briar securely in position. Cut away any dead or diseased growth and any growth that flowered this year unless it be a current year's stem that can in turn be tied back in a similar manner. Next year's flowering stems will shoot out from the curved stem giving you an almost complete covering of blooms. If you have climbers on poles leading onto an arbour then one has to thin out the growth from ground level. If this has not been done for several years it will be difficult and could lead to a year with hardly any blooms at all, but the whole idea with this type of arrangement is to produce a quantity of new growth each year then it becomes a question of thinning out the old briars. Following this practice will give you blooms all over the growth. However, do feed your plants whatever their form or style – they, like us, need to eat to survive! If you have new bare rooted roses on order put their roots in a bucket of water before planting in well prepared soil - they have to grow in that place for a long time so give them a good start!

If you are planning to grow quality Sweet Peas for next year then the third week of this month is the ideal time to sow the seed. Sow into John Innes seed compost spacing at about 1" (2.5cms) then when about $1^{1}/_{2}$ " (4cms) tall pot up individually using J.I. No.1 potting compost – more information next month but meanwhile prepare the ground where you intend growing the plants next year. Sweet Peas are deep rooting and need plenty of moisture retaining material at least a foot (30cms) if not more below ground level.

If not already done sort out your soft fruit – see last month's notes. This month is really the last opportunity this year to prune any shrubs that have not already been dealt with. Cut out any dead or diseased wood and cut off any long shoots that are spoiling the overall shape of the subject.

Finish clearing away the summer bedding cleaning the ground and plant out the subjects to provide next year's spring display – wallflowers, winter pansies, primroses and polyanthus. This is the last month to plant bulbs for next year's spring blooms. Years ago it was said that bulbs must be planted by the end of September, but now, courtesy of our efforts to warm up the planet, mid to the end of October is alright.

Keep an eye on the weather forecasts, October can be a difficult month in the garden – frosts are likely at any time so make sure your tender plants are in a

The Barsham family in particular have many gravestones close together and their wealth shows in the quality of them. The large raised tomb near the porch is a memorial to several Barshams. At the rear are many memorials to the Aylmer family who variously lived at Fincham Hall, Talbot Manor and The Moat House, as well as elsewhere. Some of their grander monuments are not in a good state of repair. Like the Barshams they were benefactors of the church for many years and have no living descendants in the village.

The large monument halfway down the rear part of the churchyard is a memorial to William Hebgin of Playters Hall and it commemorates his gift to the church of part of a field, in 1861, which became an extension to the churchyard. Most burials after WW11 have been in this part. Monuments to Barshams, Aylmers and Hebgins are also inside the church.

Fincham spends a good deal of money on keeping the churchyard cut. The Parish Council contributes about half the amount each year and so all Fincham residents who pay council tax help in this way. Some churchyards have wildlife areas where, for example, the grass is left to grow and mown only occasionally. This is more complicated than what we do now. However there are plenty of trees and shrubs around the edge of the site and we leave as much of the hedgerows uncut as we can. In Fincham we have some lovely

Other freedoms, such as the ability to introduce some flexibility to staff pay and conditions would help us recruit and retain the very best people.

As a Voluntary Aided school we are already the employer and are run differentlyto community run schools. Many changes that would take place for community schools converting already happen at our school and therefore we can see the benefit of being an academy.
