## **COUNTRYSIDE NOTES**

Working on my next book, which is about wild rabbits in Britain, part of my research has included looking at their history. The Romans may have brought domestic rabbits to our shores but it's generally believed that it is the Normans we have to thank (or curse) for the wild rabbits we have today. To begin with, having been brought from the western Mediterranean, they didn't cope very well with our wetter, colder climate and harder ground so artificial buries known as pillow mounds were constructed for them in some places. These however were not necessary on coastal sand dunes nor the light sandy soil of Breckland. During the thirteenth century it became apparent that rabbits could survive on the poorest of ground where nothing else would thrive and that a profit could be made not only from the meat but, later, also the fur.

It's believed that the first known case of coneys (as they were then known) being deliberately confined within a warren for breeding was in the Royal Park at Guildford in Surrey by Henry 111 in 1241. Over the next few centuries farming rabbits on a commercial scale became widespread reaching a peak between the fifteenth and seventeenth centuries.

When it came to researching Norfolk I reached for my copy of 'The Warrens of Breckland', a survey conducted and published by the Breckland Society in 2010. I know several people from Beachamwell were involved with this through volunteering to find out all they could about warrens in this area. Some of the Breckland warrens were producing up to 20,000 rabbits a year. Beachamwell Warren dating back to 1275 must have been one of the earliest. Knowing how important the industry was, with at least twenty six warrens in Breckland and two factories in Brandon processing rabbit fur for felt making, I thought it would be interesting to discover what the extent of commercial warrens across England had once been.

Well it was something that seemed a good idea at the time but......!! I discovered warrens in every English county and Breckland wasn't the only place where it was conducted on a large scale. Yorkshire, North Lincolnshire and quite surprisingly Dartmoor were other hot spots. However the only place I could trace another large fur processing factory was Brigg in South Humberside. It appears that generally it was a cottage industry; a small cluster of villages north of Bristol were not only treating the fur to make felt but also making it into hats. A few warrens specialised in breeding coloured rabbits. Thetford and

Crosby and North Ormsby in Lincolnshire were renowned for their silver-greys and locally Methwold and East Wretham for black ones; in fact Henry V111



insisted that his night attire should be trimmed with black rabbit fur from Norfolk.

For seven hundred years rabbits were a huge and profitable industry and it's difficult to visualize what the countryside must have looked like then. Most of the Breckland Warrens are now either part of Stanford Battle Area or planted with Forestry Commission conifers.

## **GARDENING TIPS**

September once again! Where does the time go? I am told that at least one local village has had a heavy thunderstorm. We could hear the thunder but all we had here, towards the southern end of Downham Market, was a light shower! I have no doubt our time will come but until then our plants must suffer the semi-drought conditions for just a little longer. Despite much more watering than would usually be the case many of my smaller subjects have just 'given up the ghost'. A further example brought about by this unusual period is that my chrysanthemums have come into bloom several weeks earlier than expected – I picked the first sprays on the 4<sup>th</sup> of August!

We are again approaching the end of the active gardening season but there are still jobs to be done. The remainder of the root vegetables, other than parsnips that will benefit from a good frost, need to be gathered in and stored away for the winter. Dry peat or dry sand make a good storage medium for carrots, beetroot and parsnips. Do make sure you dry off your potatoes properly and rub off any remaining earth before storing them away. It is advisable having stored them to check periodically to ensure there are no signs of rot or decay – I'm sure you all know the old saying about one bad potato! I used to grow a variety of early cropping Brussels sprouts, to pick before the wet conditions of autumn set in, for storage in a freezer. Whilst they may appear to be ready to pick towards the end of the month, providing they don't start to open out I would leave them, like the parsnips, to have a good taste of frost before they are gathered in. It makes so much different to their flavour.

Autumn raspberries will soon be finished – time, towards the end of the month, to go through the row/s and tidy them up removing weeds and dead growth and applying a mulch before winter sets in. It is unnecessary to prune out the canes that have produced this year's fruit. Indeed, leaving them in place can be beneficial in the event of a winter with really hard frosts; the old canes will at least provide the root areas (that will provide the buds for next year's canes) with some protection.

If you have not already done so prune out your soft fruit bushes without further delay. I always liked to take at least one third of the fruited wood from black currant bushes – red and white currants need to be treated a little more kindly, but you must still take out any dead, infected or damaged wood. A good tip for gooseberry bushes other than to take out dead or damaged wood is to keep their centres 'open'. That helps the fruit to mature and is also beneficial when picking!

# **GARDENING TIPS**

Lawns will need their usual autumn attention – a light scarifying and brushing, preferably with a besom, to remove any dead material, and then an application of autumn feed. The final cut of the year should leave at least 1" of grass; this should help to keep the moss at bay!

Towards the end of the month it will be time to start removing the summer bedding. Until then keep dead-heading as, providing we have some rain, there will still be time for the plants to provide a further flush of flowering growth.

This is the last month to safely take cuttings from this year's plant growth. I usually take my geranium cuttings either right at the end of August or, more likely, in the first week of September. I use a mixture of about 60% peat to 40% grit sand in clay pots with a little rooting hormone on the bottom of each cutting. I also take the opportunity at this time of the year, if I anticipate splitting and/or moving perennials, to take a few healthy shoots from around the extremity of the parent plant and pot them up in a slightly stronger mixture incorporating about 20% top soil or loam, leaving out 10% each of the peat and sand and adding just a dusting of bone meal to promote root growth. Perennial shoots, taken from their parent plant carefully, will already have roots in place and I find grow on slightly better in plastic pots rather than the clay variety.

It is always possible, at the end of September, to have a sharp frost. This is less likely these days compared to years ago, but be prepared to lift your dahlia tubers if it happens. *Roy Coughtrey*

# FROM THE SMALLHOLDING SEPTEMBER 2013

The country road which led to one of my Suffolk parishes passed through a no-man's land between two villages. Here the road took a wide curve which marked the boundary of quite a large cottage garden. Driving past I could see, as if the only life in that landscape, an old boy digging — accompanied by a chicken. I remember thinking 'when will he give up? And who will do it first, gardener or chicken?'. Returning to that stretch of road some long time later the cottage was still there but no old man and no chicken. The circumstances of their giving up was unkown to me — perhaps they had no choice!

It was with these thoughts in mind that we took the risk of leaving the smallholding for an early holiday in May. The eventual destination was northern Greece. Understandably vegetable gardens were further on than at home. However two things struck me; firstly, that even in northern Greece seedling beds need protecting against cold and even frost until quite late in their spring; and secondly that small plots can be made very productive very close to a house. In that part of Greece water for irrigation was not a problem thus proximity to the house made both watering and protection against likely predators relatively easy.

### Home thoughts from abroad - small, or smaller, can still be beautiful!

Back at Eastmoor at the end of May we found that Spring had continued to be cold, dry and late. Having suffered from attack by rabbits, muntjac and pigeons during the winter, protection of at least part of the vegetable garden would be an encouragement to keep going. Most of the patch furthest away from the kitchen window and therefore out of sight, is now covered by a walk-in cage netted with butterfly resistant mesh. It will probably need reinforcing for a foot or two from the bottom for rabbits to be deterred long term. Inside climbing French beans and brassicas are now looking very good. Having seen what the snow did to the aluminium cross pieces of the fruit cage I ordered a much wider mesh for the top, to be put in place with the onset of winter – snow in, pigeons out! I am most grateful to friends who battled with diagnals and the interpretation of makers instructions! It is a huge relief to see a flourishing brassica bed free of white butterflies. An occasional cabbage white has some how got in so plant inspection must still be a routine discipline.

Calendula can be found dotted around the holding both in the polytunnels and amongst the vegetables outside. It is a plant that really does attract hover-flies

and other insects and it is heartening to see both them and bees working their way through the anti-butterfly net to do their business. Larger bumble-bees must stay outside.

Elsewhere, in the orchard, the young replacement trees have responded to recent rain and are now looking good but each one still requires protecting. The long term plan is to erect a rabbit proof fence along the roadside hedge.

### Rabbit-proof fence and apple matters

The conservation societies and seed catalogues bombard us with suggestions as to how to make our gardens wild-life friendly. At Pightle House many untidy corners can be found, banks of nettles, hidden heaps of hedge trimmings and late cut thistles all attract all kinds of wild-life. In this year of the butterfly there is an added attraction to just sitting in the garden. Chris Packham, has told us in the Radio Times of the interesting housing requirements of rabbits and their skills at rearing young – depositing young in successful mothers' nests seems to be one such skill. The dramatic drop in wild-life species is truly worrying and it is hard not to feel guilty when killing white butterflies and trying reduce rabbit numbers. The populations of both these species are certainly not declining on my patch so a policy of balanced control and specific weaponry is being planned. A rabbit proof fence, if there is such a thing, may go some way to confine them to a paddock while keeping them out of the orchard. So here is a project for autumn and early winter because it is hard winters when there is little or no grass that rabbits seek nutrients and moisture from the bark of fruit trees.

### Good news from the apple front

Following last year's excellent crop at Pightle this year's is not going to be so good. However, reports and observations from the Group 4 catchment area suggest that there are going to be plenty of apples! Two <u>Juicing Days</u> are planned to allow for both early and later varieties, details on page 27.

In summary: the earlier dry weather put an end to the first raspberries, after very good red and black currants, Autumn Bliss and Joan J will soon be ready. There are satisfied murmurings from the kitchen (some times groans) as courgettes

roll in and a pleasing medley of dwarf and climbing French beans and runners, vie for space on the table.

What more can we expect from this summer full of surprises?

## REGISTER OF ELECTORS

The Government is requiring all Electoral Registration Officers in England to publish a revised Register of Electors on 17<sup>th</sup> February 2014. A form and reply paid envelope will be personally delivered to every property in West Norfolk from 1<sup>st</sup> October. You must complete and return the form. This is important because the Register is used not only for electoral purposes but also by many financial service providers dealing with mortgages, loans or new accounts etc. Anyone whose name is not on the Register will be unable to vote at future elections and is also likely to have problems using any service that involves a check of the Register.

The form is intended for the present occupiers of an address. The name of anyone aged 16 or over who is expected to be resident at the address needs to be on the form and the names of anyone no longer at the address crossed out. The date of birth of anyone aged 16 or 17 will also be required.

Forms received by owners of empty properties need to tick the "Property empty" box and return the form, this will avoid the issue of reminders.

In the event of any queries when the form arrives, householders can telephone the Helpline where any of the electoral staff will be happy to assist. The number are:

Prompt return of the form or, better still, confirmation by freephone, internet or SMS (details on the form) would be very helpful. It will also avoid the need for reminders and help to keep costs down.

# HAVE YOUR SAY IN BRECKLAND WARD BOUNDARY CHANGES

The boundaries for some or all Breckland Council wards will change in 2015. The Boundary Commission for England has accepted Breckland Council's recommendation, submitted earlier this year, that the number of wards in the district be reduced from 54 to 50. This will mean that some or all of the present district council ward boundaries will have to be redrawn. Parish Council boundaries will not be affected.

Any Breckland resident who wants to put their views forward about where the new Breckland district ward boundaries should be can visit the Boundary Commission website, www.lgb.org.uk, to take part in their consultation. Residents have until 23 September 2013 to submit their views.

### **Post Office Community Enterprise Fund**

I am writing to let you know about a joint competition which this Department has launched with Post Office Ltd to encourage sub-postmasters to work with local people to develop innovative ideas for how Post Office branches can support their local communities.

Many sub-postmasters already offer facilities and services which go far beyond their core business, and I believe there is great potential for post offices to further strengthen their role as a community hub by providing additional services or facilities which help local people, or by using their commercial skills to offer support to local groups and businesses.

There is £200,000 available to support up to 20 schemes in England in 2013/14. Sub- postmasters have until 18 October to work with local people to develop ideas and submit an application for up to £10,000 to put the idea into practice. Applicants will need to demonstrate that they have consulted local people and that the proposed scheme has support from the community.

## **INCINERATOR UPDATE**

### **QC Investigation Back On Track**

On June 10th the leadership of Norfolk County Council (NCC) announced it would follow Scrutiny Committee recommendations to investigate the incinerator contract. To give the process credibility opponents of the incinerator KLWIN, Cllr Kemp and the leader of West Norfolk Borough Council were asked to be the selection panel choosing who does each part of the work. On 4th July the County Council's Acting Managing Director provided panel members with a choice of three pre-selected QCs plus Delloite as the only option for financial advisers. KLWIN met with the other selection panel members to discuss how to proceed, all recognised there were problems. A joint email was then sent back to NCC suggesting how the panel's concerns could be overcome. The panel were not happy for anyone potentially under investigation to be influencing or instructing the direction of that investigation. The QC pre-selection process and the introduction of 'financial advisers' instead of approved waste specialists also caused concern, especially because Delloite were the only firm offered and they do significant Energy from Waste work on behalf of Cory Environmental. When NCC initially dismissed the Panel's concerns/suggestions it looked as if the reports would be nothing more than a costly 'PR' exercise for the County's leadership. This view was reinforced during a council meeting on 29<sup>th</sup> July when a senior Cabinet member, Mick Castle expressed his support for the incinerator. Cllr Castle then successfully called for all motions associated with the incinerator to be blocked from being debated. Following a meeting between KLWIN and representatives of the County's administration there was fresh hope of a breakthrough. An email from the County Council's Leader George Nobbs has now put the QC report back on track, not every concern raised has been addressed but some important issues were. KLWIN can now participate in the selection process and hopes rapid progress can be made. Schedule 26 of the incinerator contract if the County Council does not agree to a 'Revised Project Plan' by [29th October] the contract will be terminated on the same penalty terms as if Planning Permission is refused, this and other important clauses need independent reviewing urgently.

### **News From St Andrew's**

You may have noticed the presence of the stonemason's van at the church over the past few weeks. We have started to make some headway in the tremendously long list of repair and restoration jobs that were identified in our Quinquennial report as being urgent.

Many of the tasks were areas of render and grouting that needed to be repaired, especially before the winter weather arrives. The most obvious that you can notice is a large expanse on the lower part of the walls of the south Nave. Guttering has been realigned and leaks fixed. Drains have been repaired and holes filled. The tower has two floors in it, both of which needed clearing,

boards removed and joists inspected. Some minor repair work to these areas has now been completed. Roof fillets have been repaired on the Porch, Nave and Chancel, and unfortunately whilst this was being undertaken, further urgent repair work to the fillets high up on the Chancel/Nave roof joints was discovered but this will require scaffolding and is another job which will require funds to be raised.

Inside the porch there have been some small areas repaired and in the Nave the large crack in the wall above the steps to the chancel has been filled. (The stonemason said that the crack was large enough to put his hand inside and when he did so he found thatch,- trapped from the time hundreds of years ago when St Andrew's was the thatched church and not St Mary's.) In the Chancel the broken Medieval floor tiles have been reset, with thanks to the Barton Bendish Film Club who gave us a donation for this.

Please don't forget we have a working party on September 14<sup>th</sup> starting at 10am to sort out many little jobs in the church and churchyard, everyone is very welcome, please come and give whatever time you can. Please dress for mess!! Refreshments will be provided.

#### Boughton Fen Report To Parish Council Meeting 02.08.2013

As usual at this time of year, work on the fen is low key as we leave it to our summer visitors. We have, however, kept the wildlife walk clear with small working parties using our cutter and strimmers.

A team of moth recorders visited the fen recently, which I am sure would have looked rather spooky from above, with their bright lights dotted around the area, luring the varied species in to be recorded.

We are always pleased to let you know about youth involvement, and this has continued with further community work for the Duke of Edinburgh award, as well as the local cub pack meeting to learn about the fen.

The Fen Committee has reached the final four in the shortlist for the Lloyds Banking Group Community Fund for this area. Two of the four finalist will receive £3000 to spend on their projects. To win this, we need to be in the top two of the area public vote. It would be great to have your support in this, so watch this space for further details of how to make your vote.

With the sun shining and temperatures high, winter may seem a long way off but the team are already starting to plan this year's autumn and winter work on the fen. It would be great to see our regulars, plus some new faces later in the year.

The reed beds have grown higher and stronger than we have seen for a number of years, due to the very wet weather last winter. Often when down on the fen, you can see the marsh harriers, which we have almost taken for granted, but of course they only started to breed here successfully four or five years ago. A first for this year is that a family of bearded tits have nested in the reeds.

Finally, a group of us went to Norwich a few days ago to receive our Norfolk Biodiversity Partnership award in the Site Award Category. I would like to thank the Fen Committee, the Parish Council, and most of all the many people who have helped us achieve such high standards over the last six years.

**Boughton Cricket Club** has received notification that it will be listed as a Community Amateur Sports Club by HMRC. To achieve this, we were happy to make it clear that the club is open to all on an amateur basis, and at a subscription rate that is affordable. In exchange we now become the equivalent of a charity in that we can claim Gift Aid on any donation from a taxpayer. A donation is money given in exchange for nothing (so subscriptions for instance do not qualify). In effect, this means we recover the 20% tax paid by the donor

on their gift. For example to give us £10, a taxpayer would have had to earn £12.50 before 20% tax: we get this £2.50 from HMRC, increasing all qualifying donations by 25%. There is also a gain for a higher rate tax payer, who can declare the gift on their self assessment, adding the amount given to their basic rate band, and thereby giving them back 20% of their gift. Once the official notification arrives, we can invite all the wonderful donors to the Jon Allen/Steve Short bike ride, and Steve's 10K run to sign a short form to confirm their status as taxpayers, and bingo!

Incidentally, our government has extended Gift Aid relief to apply to all Church Collections, provided individuals donate no more than £20 at a time and in cash! This will be a big help for struggling Parochial Church Councils.

Short and Koopowitz's Elegant Partnership Wins Boughton their First Trophy

Gooderstone CC: 151-7 (40 Overs) [S. Morgan 26; Webb 8-3-17-3]

Boughton CC: 152-6 (37.5 Overs) [Short 54\*; Mowles 6-2-23-3]

A fine partnership of 90 runs between Ollie Short (54\*) and Eliot Koopowitz (32) led Boughton to a thrilling victory – and their first piece of silverware – as the season approaches a close.

Gooderstone batted first and their openers dug in against some tight bowling from Jenkins and (to a lesser extent!) Wilkinson; but Boughton did not find their first wicket until the 14<sup>th</sup> Over, when Ollie Short came into the attack with the score at 58-0, clean bowling the dangerous Sam Morgan. A fine spin bowling partnership developed after the drinks break, as James Webb and Eliot Koopowitz ran rampant through the Gooderstone middle order, claiming 4 wickets for 18 runs off 10 overs between them. Nevertheless, as the pressure mounted on Gooderstone at 89-5, their tail-enders came into play, playing risky shots which never seemed to go to hand. Although Gooderstone lost two more wickets in the process, they managed to add another 62 runs before the forty overs were up, leaving Boughton 152 to chase.

This, on a dry pitch with variable bounce seemed a daunting task and Boughton knew they would have to bat well. Boughton's hopes seemed dashed when the ever-reliable Hugh Jenkins was bowled for a duck on the third ball of the innings; he was followed five overs later by the in-form James Webb (7) and, at 24-2, Boughton looked to be in real trouble. Barry Ovel (10) and Eliot Koopowitz steadied the innings for a few overs, before Ovel was given out LBW to a

straight one from Gooderstone's second change bowler. The partnership between Short and Koopowitz that followed was extremely well-judged. For nearly 15 overs, they refused to take any risks, simply batting and becoming accustomed to the pitch. When they reached the 28th over - and had scored only half the required runs - both batsmen opened up. Ollie Short played two fine strokes - one slog-sweep over wide long on and a more classical cover drive: Koopowitz quickly joined the party with a couple of expertly placed paddle sweeps. Both looked so settled and in control that they looked likely to chase down the total between them, but on 127, Koopowitz was clean bowled by one that stayed a little low. Bartrum went to the crease and, first ball, was bowled by one that similarly kept low and before they knew it, Boughton were in trouble requiring 25 runs off 40 balls. Phil Koopowitz soon made a dent in that total, smashing an enormous six and a four in quick succession, before taking a risky run and being run out. By then, the damage was done, however, as Boughton required only two runs off 15 balls. Steve Kornmuller, who was injured whilst fielding, came to the crease very bravely facing three balls, the last of which drifted wide, was missed by the keeper and Steve grabbed a quick bye taking Boughton over the line to a fantastic, well-deserved and deeply gratifying victory.

**Seventh Annual Boughton Jazz Picnic** was again blessed with dry weather. Around 200 attended, picnicing on the lawn at Rectory House, to the lively



sounds of traditional jazz from Barry Tyler's band. Our parish chairman was even seen jiving with Sandy on the dance floor. Bet you didn't know that Boughton has its own racing circuit! You certainly



wouldn't hear it, as the vehicles are powered by electric. Where is it? Answer, at the far end of Roger Warner's runway and paddocks, on the Stoke Road. To be truthful, it is all on a small scale, as the cars (known as buggies) are 1/10 real scale, and the circuit is similarly reduced. But there are a lot of similarities with Formula 1, in that the cars are fitted

with a transponder (with its individual code number), which triggers an audible response on each circuit, measuring lap times and position. A variable audible beep even indicates if the buggy is a) fastest of the day or b) faster than it's last lap or c) just happy to be there (and recognised by the computer). No beep at all means you are not booked in correctly! £3000 of sophistication.

The buggies are alarmingly fast, reaching speeds of possibly 60mph on the one straight, almost instantaneously. Races last just 5 minutes, as the battery life is just 15 to 20 minutes, before a 20 minute recharge is necessary. They also appear to be indestructible, as collisions, rolls, and departures from the circuit altogether are commonplace. Marshals are in place all round the track, to put the buggies back pointing in the right direction (use of reverse gear is not permitted)

After each race, the buggies are scrutineered, as in Formula 1. 1 gram under the minimum weight of 1400 gram leads to a penalty! Likewise wheelbase is checked against the maximum allowed.

I was told one could purchase a buggy and it's control mechanism, from £300 upwards. Self assembly kits are available, serving as useful instruction in vehicle mechanics.

The picture was taken at a regional meeting this August, and shows the car controllers on the raised gantry overlooking the track. These meetings are run under the auspices of the British Radio Car Association, membership of which provides £5m public liability insurance. The village hall will be closed from the 19<sup>th</sup> August to the 23<sup>rd</sup> August whilst the builder, Jim Allan, repairs the floor. Bingo will still run on the 21<sup>st</sup> August. Jim will also action three other areas of repair work to the outside of the hall, the hall will remain open to the public during the external work. I'm pleased to report that a <u>very</u> kind and generous Wereham resident, who wishes to remain anonymous, has offered to pay for the repair work - whoever you are thank you, thank you - from all of us on the Committee and everyone who lives in Wereham.

Please remember that Wereham Village Hall is a charity, our responsibility is to provide a building for use by the residents of Wereham and surrounding neighbourhoods. We are working with our holding trustees (the Parish Council) on this. Now subject to Parish Council approval at the next meeting in September.

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
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
