'FROM THE RECTORY'

Dear All,
We plough the fields and scatter
The good seed on the land,
But it is fed and watered
By God's almighty hand:
Hymns Old & New No. 534

This much-loved harvest hymn seems to have come from the very depths of the English countryside, so it would be no surprise to learn that it had been written by someone in Constable Country. In fact, it is a translation from a German original written by Matthias Claudius, who was born in Lübeck in 1740, the son of a Lutheran pastor. His harvest hymn first appeared in a play he wrote in 1782, about a harvest celebration in a North German village. It was closely based on a peasants' song he had heard sung by one of the farmers. The original ran to seventeen four-line verses but when the hymn was published in 1800 it had been shortened to six verses with a chorus. This shortened version was translated into English in 1861 by Jane Montgomery Campbell, the daughter of the vicar of St. James', Paddington. One modern version of this hymn has the lines:

We plough the fields with tractors,

With drills we sow the land

and

We add our fertilizers

To help the growing grain.

Nowadays English harvest celebrations seem incomplete without hearing the traditional version sung at least once. We are entering the season for Harvest Festivals in our churches and I expect that this hymn will be sung at every harvest service – why don't you join us and carry on the tradition? COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

With the shortening days thoughts turn to chillier evenings and the need for some supplementary heat. A lot of people now have woodburners so the need to get stocked up with firewood becomes imminent. If you have access to woodland and can cut it yourself other than time and effort the logs cost you next to nothing. As an added bonus it makes you warm several times from the physical activity of cutting the wood, getting it home then stacking it. The last is the most pleasurable as you sit beside the burning fire. Green wood doesn't burn well and leaves tar deposits inside the chimney so for maximum efficiency logs need to be seasoned, that is left to dry out. This is important. A load is expensive to buy so best to deal with tried and tested sellers than to buy cheap and be left disappointed. To burn well big logs may need splitting into smaller pieces. The choice of wood from certain trees can also make a big difference especially if it's to be burned on an open fire. Their qualities vary and the smoke from some causes a lot of tar to form in the chimney.

First choice must surely be apple wood for it burns slowly and brightly with great heat and an aromatic smell. Ash, sadly, is likely to be increasingly available as diseased trees are felled because of die-back. The wood can be used as fuel but it's recommended that it shouldn't be transported outside the local area to avoid infecting more trees. Ash burns rapidly and gives off a significant amount of heat. Oak and beech are slow to burn but once well alight give off a lot of heat. Elm burns with little flame producing less. Sycamore burns quite fast. Birch burns far too quickly and is best mixed with slower burning varieties. Lime also burns rapidly giving off a lot of heat as it does so. Mature hazel burns quickly with a bright yellow flame. Holly, field maple and hawthorn yield heavy logs which burn well. The flames are deep orange tinged with purple indicating great heat. Walnut, box, laburnum, laurel and rhododendron all burn well giving off a surprising amount of heat.

Quite a few species such as willow, horse chestnut, poplar and in particular sweet chestnut all tend to 'spit' when burnt. For this reason they are far better used in an enclosed stove than risking red hot embers popping out onto the carpet from an open fire. Wild cherry burns evenly with a fragrance but unfortunately also spits. Most conifers burn reasonably well but once again spit badly. In times past furze (gorse) was 'poor man's fuel' and, tied into faggots, would be burnt on an open hearth.

150g plain flour


½ tsp baking powder

GARDENING TIPS

Once again we fast are approaching the start of the final season of the year. Where does the time go? It seems only a month or so ago that I was making the first sowings of the year! At least the weather seems to be getting back to normal after the autumn like conditions towards the latter part of July and at the time of writing this, things seem to be warming up again. The brief spell of cooler conditions was welcome from one point of view in that at least it brought us some much needed rain which was welcomed by all of my plants. Dahlias which seemed stunted at about 12 inches (30.5cm) suddenly doubled in size and actually started to come into bloom! I had purchased a number of new tubers earlier in the year and was anxious to see what the flowers would be like. Those that have bloomed so far look quite good, not up to exhibition standard but a nicely proportioned bloom for garden decoration.

Now that we are in September our thoughts must turn to certain important jobs in the garden. The soft fruit season, other than for the autumn raspberries and a few remaining black berries and similar fruits, is over and attention must be given to the bushes and canes. Prune out any diseased and other old and unwanted wood that has fruited. Ensure that the centre of the gooseberry bushes is kept 'open'. The crop and quality of fruit will be enhanced and it will be so much easier to pick. Cut out all of the old fruited raspberry canes and start tying in the new canes to their restraining wires. Clean-up round the soft fruit bushes and raspberry canes, removing weeds and any other unwanted rubbish and mulch around the plants. If you have it, home-made compost is the ideal mulching medium. If the soil is still very dry I would always water the bushes and canes well prior to mulching and finally, fork over the ground to open the surface to any natural precipitation. Pruning the autumn raspberries can be left until next spring.

Have you taken your cuttings yet? If not, do not delay any longer. Normally September's weather conditions are ideal to take cuttings in that they can be placed in a semi shaded position, protected from the attentions of our feathered friends. Cuttings need warmth and cool conditions to root well and reasonably quickly. Subjects that like moist potting medium do best in plastic pots but I personally find that the pelargonium family do best in clay pots. Although they need moisture to root they do not like wet conditions and a clay pot allows the potting medium to breathe and be damp rather than wet. I use a medium of 60% peat (or similar) and 40% grit sand. All species can do with the assistance of a rooting compound, but buy new each year. Do not use that which has been

hanging about since last year — it will have lost any help it may have had! If I can get it I like to use the liquid kind, although I have also had very good results for the powdered variety. Propagating perennials is very simple. Having selected the plant for propagation gently drag away a little soil from the edge of the parent plant adjacent to a nice healthy new growth. The latter can be eased away from its parent and cut off with some roots already in place. Pot up the new growth in John Innes Number 2 compost, water, place in a semi shaded spot and then keep the compost just damp. You will then have a nice new plant very quickly; ready in fact to be planted out into the main flower bed towards the middle of October or, you can keep it over winter in a green-house and plant out when the frosts have finished the next spring. This process can be carried out in the spring but any flowers will be rather later than usual.

Most vegetables other than the late brassicas and parsnips have now been harvested and it is time to have a good clean up round the vegetable garden. Clear away all the old rubbish, weeds and leaves that have fallen from the brassicas. With damper conditions not far away any litter left on the ground will only provide shelter and food for slugs and snails and hiding places for overwintering aphid varieties all of which spell trouble for the future.

Much has been written about lawns and their care by many people and there are so many different compounds on the market to produce that 'perfect sword'. Over the years I have tried many of them, some having partial success but nothing to date has given the lasting quality despite several applications. I have come to the conclusion that the quality of a lawn is almost entirely down to the type of soil it is growing on and not down to the various compounds that can be applied to it. Yes, it needs proper attention in the spring and autumn by spiking, scarifying, sweeping and dressing with either autumn or spring feed to keep what grass there is in as good a condition as is possible. On sandy soils copious quantities of water is an absolute necessity to even keep it green and that can be very expensive and really frowned upon. If you have a clay based soil then there is not quite so large a problem but even there, when it gets very dry, whilst everything may not go quite so brown there is another problem, that of the turf cracking. Is it any wonder that there are so many 'gravelled front lawn areas in Downham Market'? I don't like them but I am coming to understand why so many residents have them!

Sorry to end on rather a morbid note but it does seem that maybe the pundits are right – it's getting warmer and dryer to boot. Are well, there is always next year – it will probably be so wet that I will have to completely re-think!

This autumn, Breckland's Environmental Services Team is focusing on a different area every month. September's focus is on preventing food waste and the team has found some helpful advice for residents, to help you save money whilst protecting the environment.

The 'Love Food Hate Waste' website has lots of useful tips including advice on portion planning and tasty recipes to help you use up odd items of leftover food. http://england.lovefoodhatewaste.com/

The website also has a handy app that you can download for free. Great for when you're on the go as you can create a shopping list and look up recipes by ingredient. Planning meals and creating a shopping list (whether on the app, or with pen and paper) is one of the best ways of keeping control of your shopping spend.

If you have any unwanted items of food that are not perishable and still in-date, you can donate them to your nearest food bank to feed local people in crisis.

If you have leftover food that cannot be re-used, this should always be put in your green bin and never in your black recycling bin. Food put into black bins contaminates other items and they will all end up in landfill.

NORFOLK RECYCLING CENTRES READY FOR HAZARDOUS WASTE AMNESTIES

Check your cupboards, sheds and garages for toxic household chemicals that you don't want any more so you can take them to be disposed of safely and securely at a series of household hazardous waste amnesties taking place at Norfolk County Council's recycling centres during September.

Wood preservatives, bug and weed killers, paint, thinners, varnishes and special cleaning products are among the wide range of household chemicals that will be accepted – for free – at the weekend-long events. These products are too dangerous to be tipped down drains or sent to landfill without damaging the environment.

Events will take place between 9am and 6pm at the following sites and dates:



SWAFFHAM WEA: LEARN SOMETHING NEW

Founded in 1903, the Workers' Educational Association (WEA) is a charity and the UK's largest voluntary sector provider of adult education. Although originally aimed at workers, as the name suggests, nowadays all are welcome. Courses are informal and friendly. There are no tests or exams and you don't need previous knowledge of the subject, so there's no pressure to achieve a particular standard – just the pleasure of increasing your knowledge and experience and the opportunity to meet new people.

The Swaffham Branch of the WEA offers two contrasting courses this autumn.

Beginning on Monday September 28th at 7.30pm and continuing for 8 weeks is *Flappers and Flyers*. This takes a human interest approach to the golden age of aviation, looking at the antics and escapades of airmen and air women in the 1920s, when men and women challenged the skies, sometimes successfully, sometimes disastrously but always with a pioneering spirit. It encompasses the politics of aerial domination and aerial policing – influences that extended well beyond the decade. In a lighter note, it looks at flying fashions; barnstormers and stunt pilots, male and female, as it frolics through their antics and escapades. From a young woman sunbathing naked on the wing of her machine to more serious developments in air travel and the courage of those trail-blazing pioneers who began shrinking the world for countless folks to follow in comfort. Tutor Ian McLachlan is making a welcome return to Swaffham following previous enjoyable courses from him

On Friday mornings at 10am, beginning on 25 September, Shelagh Ashe presents *Gardens through History*. Shelagh, who is a garden designer, will look at gardens from ancient civilisations through to the present day. In particular this course relates the development of gardens to social history, art and literature. It includes the creativity of the Italian Renaissance, the place of gardens in Tudor Britain and the novels of Jane Austen, as well as looking at more modern gardens. There may also be the chance of picking up ideas to use in our own gardens.

Both courses run for 8 weeks; the cost for each is £48. You are welcome to attend the first session as a 'taster' for just £5 with no obligation to continue. Courses are held at the Community Centre, Campingland, Swaffham. There is no need to book, just come along and you will be very welcome.
