#### 'FROM THE RECTORY'

Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> September 2016 will be a special day for me – it will be almost six years to the day since I was licensed as Priest-in-Charge to the Barton Bendish and Fincham Group of Churches, and it will also be my last day as the Group's parish priest. My final service will take place that morning at 10am in St Martin's Church, Fincham, and all will be very welcome, so I hope you can come along and have some refreshments afterwards. I am moving to take up a post in our next door Deanery of Wisbech Lynn Marshland, where I will be Priest-in-Charge of two parishes, being Walpole St Peter and West Walton. In addition I'll be working in secondary schools in the Deanery and also encouraging the use of 'Fresh Expressions' in the Deanery – in other words, producing church services in a different way, in frameworks such as Café Churches and Messy Churches.

#### **APPLE BETTY**

2 large eating apples, peeled, cored and sliced

50g sultanas

8 eggs

4 tbsp sweetener

2tsp vanilla essence

175g vanilla yoghurt

Pinch of cinnamon to dust

Preheat oven to 190 C/ 170 C fan/ gas 5

Arrange the apple slices in a 20cm flan dish and sprinkle over most of the sultanas

Beat the eggs with the sweetener and vanilla essence, then add the yoghurt and beat again.

Pour the mixture over the apple slices and allow to sink into the fruit. Sprinkle over the rest of the sultanas, dust with the cinnamon and bake in the oven for 30 mins or until set.

Serve warm with cream or fromage frais

#### **COUNTRYSIDE NOTES**

There are 42 different species of ladybirds in the UK coming in a variety of colours which even within individual species can vary greatly. Nearly all are carnivorous and of great benefit to gardeners and farmers as they and their larvae feed on harmful insects such as aphids, small caterpillars and scale insects. The most common is red with seven black spots. The striped ladybird is a chestnut colour with cream stripes or spots, kidney-spot ladybirds are black with two large red spots, cream-spot ladybirds are maroon-brown with 14 cream spots. There are also yellow ones with varying numbers of black spots – and the list goes on! Harleguin ladybirds are unwelcome new arrivals to Britain and being cannibalistic pose a threat to our native species. Introduced originally to mainland Europe from eastern Asia to control aphids and scale insects it was only going to be a matter of time before they made it across the English Channel. Harlequins vary greatly both in the colouring of their wing cases and the number of spots which can range from none to 21. Because there is such a great variation it is very difficult to tell them apart from our native ladybirds but close inspection reveals they are generally larger and their legs are almost always brown in colour. Adult ladybirds hibernate outdoors in winter seeking shelter in conifer bushes, crevices in trees, etc but they also find their way indoors by hiding away in window frames and conservatories. In spring the first warm, sunny day stirs them into activity. When ladybirds emerge from hibernation they first feed and then mate. The females lay tiny, bright yellow eggs in a cluster on the underside of a leaf which after about a week hatch into small, black, six-legged larvae. These feed greedily on aphids and grow so quickly they shed their skin three times before becoming full grown. After 3-4 weeks each larva attaches itself to a leaf and forms a pupa from which the adult emerges a week or so later in mid to late summer. Occasionally ladybirds make headline news when great swarms appear. After feeding for a few weeks they seek out places to hibernate. Most survive less than a year but it's estimated in that time they will have consumed 5,000 aphids. Their bright colours issue a warning to birds not to eat them - the joints in their bodies give off a foul tasting fluid.

There are two theories as to why these little flying beetles got called ladybirds. Our most common ladybird, the bright red seven-spot, is thought to have inspired the name. 'Lady' referring to the Virgin Mary (Our Lady) who in early paintings is depicted wearing a red cloak, the seven spots being symbolic of the seven joys and seven sorrows of Mary. Alternatively in the Middle Ages people recognised how beneficial they were in destroying agricultural pests and they became regarded as a gift from the Our Lady hence the name ladybird. *Jill Mason*

#### **BRITISH HARVEST TRADITIONS**

Harvest festival is traditionally celebrated on the Sunday nearest the harvest moon, although these days it tends to be on the Sunday that we have a service. The Harvest Moon is the full Moon that occurs closest to the autumn equinox (22 or 23 September). Normally falling towards the end of September, or early October, harvest festival is the closest thing we have to a day of thanksgiving. In the past, lives depended on the success of the harvest and everyone in the community from young to old took part in the communal effort. Nowadays few of us have a direct connection to farming and the land, but Harvest Festival is still an important day in the calendar. Almost all churches still decorate their building with flowers and fruits, but today people are encouraged to bring in packets and tins of food which can be donated to the local foodbank for those in need. It is also the custom in some churches to donate the harvest festival collection to a charity which will help those less fortunate than ourselves, where lives still do depend on the success of the harvest..

Harvest celebrations pre-date Christianity, but it has always been seen as a very spiritual time to give thanks for the year's crop.

Corn dollies, made out of the last sheath of the harvest, were placed on the tables when parishes had their harvest meals. The doll was then kept until the spring to ensure the continuation of a good crop next year. This custom began with Saxon farmers, who believed the last sheath contained the spirit of the corn. They would sacrifice this corn along with a hare – normally one hiding in the crop - although later there was no sacrifice and **model hares** were made out of straw instead. This then led to the making of corn dolls, which were hung up in farmhouses, and which were supposed to represent the goddess of the grain.



The word harvest normally makes us think of farming, but many harvest celebrations exist around the country tto celebrate another type of harvest. There are about 24 festivals that give **thanks for the fishing seasons**. In October, in Billingsgate, London, there was the Harvest of the Sea Thanksgiving, where fish and netting decorate the church. These festivals arose in many fishing towns and villages, where the locals depended largely on fishing for a living. A tradition in North Shields, during the Blessing of the Salmon Fishery, is to give the first salmon catch to the vicar.

From the first harvest celebration, to the last – **St Michael's Mass**, on the 29<sup>th</sup> September, celebrates the end of the productive season. Also known as Michaelmas, it signifies a time when all the harvest should have been brought in.

Its beginnings can be traced to the 5<sup>th</sup> century when the cult of St Michael spread

to Western Christianity. During the Middle Ages it was celebrated as a huge religious feast, and the harvest traditions grew from there. Fairs with market stalls and games, and churches decorated in autumnal colours started around this festive time. People also ate geese on this day, said to bring financial protection for the next year.

In the Barton Bendish half of the benefice, the custom started many years ago of a joint Harvest Supper prepared in each of the four villages in turn. This year is the turn of Barton Bendish itself and Harvest will be celebrated with a service and a wonderful meal on Saturday October 8<sup>th</sup>. Our friends from the Fincham half of the benefice will be welcomed. It's always a lovely occasion, with good food, companionship and thanksgiving. The Thin Man (1934) is a detective novel by Dashiell Hammett, originally published in Redbook. #### Free home assessments on offer

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life.

The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes.

Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

## Help shape this key planning document – September consultation

Breckland Council is calling on local people to help shape a key planning document that will provide a framework for growth for the next 20 years and set out the policies used to determine planning applications.

The third Local Plan public consultation will open mid-September and run for six weeks. This consultation focusses on the preferred sites for housing and employment growth and outlines proposed changes to settlement boundaries.

During the six weeks residents and businesses can view the proposals and make their views known via an online consultation on the Breckland website or through written responses. You will also be able to find out more at a series of drop-in events held in the market towns.

Feedback from the previous two public consultations, and from expert bodies such as Highways England, Natural England and the Environment Agency, helped shape the current draft proposals. More recently, Town and Parish Councillors gave their views at a series of meetings held over the summer, to help Breckland Councillors refine the document before the September public consultation

Breckland welcomes the input and on-the-ground knowledge of local people and all comments received during the consultation will be considered and used to help shape the next version of the Plan. This will go out to a final public consultation before submission to the Planning Inspector.

Once adopted in 2017, the new Local Plan will identify a five year supply of housing land which will give the Council more control of the location of new housing and will reduce the likelihood of ad-hoc development.

Dates and venues for the drop-in events will be given on the Breckland website nearer the time.

#### **BOUGHTON VILLAGE NEWS**

All Saints' Church

Thanks to Sandy and Frank for putting on another Breakfast Church in August, as the normal September date will be Barbara Burton's last service (10 am at Fincham) before leaving for a new appointment in West Walton and Walpole St Peter. We will miss her and wish her well in her new benefice. We've all enjoyed working with her and hope to see something of her in the future Breakfast Church welcomed people from Fincham, Wereham, Wretton, Luke and Stacey, who will be marrying in the church in October, Downham Market.......and some from Boughton. Everyone was pleased to congratulate Isabella on her ninth birthday.

The church's Harvest Festival will be celebrated on Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> September and everyone will be welcome. If possible, please come along and help decorate the church on Saturday morning, after 10.30 am if there is a Pilates class. If you can't bring yourself, please bring some autumn flowers or foliage and fruit if you wish for decoration purposes only. In recent years, our Harvest offerings have taken the form of tins and packets, or jars of coffee, jam, etc, and these are donated to the Foodbank in Downham Market. Please be generous, as there are many poorer places and people than Boughton In addition, we normally donate our Harvest Festival collection to a charity. If anyone has a suggestion or a preferred charity, please let me know – not Cats' Protection or Dogs' Trust in this instance!

The PCC has an application in to Ely because we want to do some work on the decorative gratings which lie underneath the long carpet down the centre of the church. It's planned to infill them with a coloured material, which will allow them to be revealed and admired. They were originally installed to allow air to the old boiler system. We are also seeking permission to widen the church path, so that wheelchair access can be improved. The present path is not wide enough and causes a problem when the weather is wet. We need permission from Ely to do any work in the church and sometimes in the churchyard itself. Earlier in the year we had a meeting with a representative of the Norfolk Wildlife Trust and went round the churchyard noting how many different species of wildflower could be found. A proper survey has been done and when we have received it we are looking to allow small areas of the churchyard to remain uncut so that the native flora and fauna can re-establish. The areas will be small and will not make the main churchyard look uncared for. More of this later.

The outcome of this stunned us. The moulded plastic bottle is an original Quality Street sweet jar, and despite several different wear patterns visible in the screw neck, the top is original. To our delight Sothebys provided us with a provenance . Informing us of it's substantial value

We were then contacted by the Fitzwilliam museum in Cambridge asking if they could place our bottle on display for a couple of weeks, which of course we agreed to. While at Fitzwilliam they became very interested in the printed label, and they contacted Cambridge Science Park, instigating a thorough scientific examination of the label. They have declared that the word "DONATIONS" was in fact printed by one of the original Sinclair printers, of which there were only two produced. One is at Cambridge science park. The whereabouts of the other being currently unknown.

This has now substantially enhanced the value of our bottle, which I must add has now had a GPS tracking device installed and is kept in a very safe place.

Tim Scrivener to his credit realised that if we were able to attach an accurate history to our bottle, its value would again be enhanced. Tim has started researching the bottles history for us and has uncovered some very surprising facts.
