





COUNTRYSIDE NOTES

One of the drawbacks of an English summer is flies and there have been plenty of them about this year. Apparently there are more than five thousand species in Britain. They vary greatly in size; some are useful but most are not. At least in England we're not plagued with midges or at risk of contracting malaria from mosquitoes although, having said that, it was rife in England's marshes and fens until the late nineteenth century. A few, such as hover flies, which look like small wasps and dart about as well as hovering, are beneficial to plants as pollinators while *lacewings* feed on aphids, mealy bugs and spider mites. Most flies however are potentially harmful. The most familiar are house flies which show no inclination to go back outside once indoors. They are major carriers of disease being attracted to food and faeces, are annoying when they settle on you and appear to be immune to fly spray (but not a swat!). Bluebottles/ blowflies, which lay their eggs on carcases, are also horrible but at least they oblige by going out the window when you open it. Fruit or vinegar flies also come indoors to aggravate us. In winter cluster flies hibernate in lofts. It is they that appear from nowhere indoors on a sunny winter's day. Minute *vellow* swarming flies often hibernate with them.

Outdoors in summer there are black flies which swarm round our heads and sometimes bite and several species that plague livestock. So called horse flies inflict very painful bites to both animals and humans. Males actually feed on nectar and pollen, it's the females that go for blood - with mouthparts like miniature knives they slash through skin with a scissor-like motion. Clegs too are painful blood suckers. Greenbottles lay their eggs on a sheep's dirty wool. When they hatch the maggots eat their way into the sheep's flesh. This is known as 'strike'. Large warble flies are parasitic with a most unpleasant life cycle. They lay their eggs on the forelegs of cattle and deer. When these hatch the larvae bore into the skin and migrate through the animal's body until they reach its back growing bigger all the time. They show as lumps before the huge maggots pop out. Thankfully warbles were eradicated from the UK in 1990. Less damaging, but probably more stressful, are autumn flies which plague cattle and horses by gathering round their heads in large numbers. They breed in animal dung as do khaki coloured dung flies which feed on any insects attracted to cowpats. Another familiar fly is the Crane fly, better known as 'Daddy Long Legs', a large, flying, long-legged insect which, in late summer, can sometimes be disturbed in their thousands when walking across grassland. They themselves do not bite although their larvae, better known as leatherjackets, cause untold damage beneath the ground by eating plant roots. Frit flies can seriously damage cereals and other major crop pests are aphids, thrips, greenfly and carrot flies Jill Mason

RECIPE PAGE

Crab and Sweet Corn Soup



1tbsp corn oil; 4 oz cooked crab meat; salt; 1tbsp rice wine or dry sherry; 12oz can whole corn kernels; 2 pints chicken stock; 2 lightly beaten eggs (whole eggs or simply beaten egg whites); 2 level tbsp corn flour

Heat oil in saucepan. Add crab meat, season with salt and wine. Add drained corn and chicken stock. Bring to the boil, reduce heat and simmer for 5 minutes. Add corn four blended with a little cold water. Cook for a few minutes then finally add eggs and cook for a further minute.

Sweet Potato and Lentil Soup



4 big sweet potatoes; Big mugful of yellow or red lentils 1 large onion; 2/3 dried chillies or a very small one chopped (be careful with them, add bit by bit and taste regularly) or you could just add some black pepper); Tin chopped tomatoes;

Seasoning; Greek yogurt/crème fraiche for topping (optional); Chopped parsley (optional)

Peel and chop the sweet potatoes into very small pieces and boil until fairly soft. Meanwhile chop and fry the onion in a large separate saucepan until soft.

Add a pint of water, add washed lentils, bring to the boil and leave to cook on a low flame.

When the sweet potatoes are ready mash them and add to the lentils when they are nearly cooked.

Keep the liquid from the sweet potatoes to top up the soup if it becomes too thick.

Stir it all in and watch over it, giving it a stir every so often.

When it is thickening and the lentils are soft add some of the very finely chopped chilli (optional), some salt and the tin of tomatoes.

Add water or potato juice if needed.

Add Greek yogurt/crème fraiche for topping and some chopped parsley

FREE HOME ASSESSMENTS ON OFFER

Older, disabled or vulnerable residents of West Norfolk are being encouraged to book an appointment for a free home assessment from Careline Community Services.

The assessments, which are carried out by a team of qualified staff, will help residents, who may be living with a disability or dementia, or who are simply older and less mobile, to identify concerns in their property which may be affecting their day-to-day life. The assessor, trained by the Disabled Living Foundation, will inspect the home to see whether measures could be introduced that would reduce the possibility of slips, trips and falls and generally make it easier for people to live safely and independently in their own homes. Measures that could be considered include installation of a Careline personal alarm, improved lighting arrangements, heating checks, draught proofing, smoke detectors and easy-to-use taps along with recommendations for other adaptations that may reduce any potential risk to the resident. Practical solutions for those living with dementia are also available, this includes signage or colour differentiation for those who suffer with memory loss and are visually impaired.

The assessors will also be able to advise whether any grant funding is available for any works required.

COULD YOU HELP A YOUNG PERSON WITH A DISABILITY TO THINK ABOUT THEIR FUTURE?

The CSV Futures Project supports young people with learning disabilities to explore their options as they think about leaving education.

Volunteer Mentors provide one to one support to a young person to help them develop a personal profile of their skills and interests, their likes and dislikes and their future goals. The Mentor can then support the young person to start working towards these; this can include accessing work experience and training opportunities plus the chance to try out volunteering and new social activities.

CSV needs volunteers who can offer a couple of hours of their time each week to mentor the young people as they make choices about their futures, raising aspirations by exploring together the young person's skills, interests and abilities.

We are looking for people ages 16+ - Mentors can come from all walks of life and no experience is needed but patience, the ability to listen and a sense of humour are all useful skills. Mentors receive full training and support and out of pocket expenses are paid.

Given Norfolk's proud and historic links to the Royal Air Force you may well have heard of us as the leading welfare charity for those serving and those who have served in the RAF, as well as their families. We provide a range of support from financial assistance, independent living help to emotional and mental wellbeing support. In addition, we recently launched a new Community Connector service to tackle social isolation and loneliness amongst the RAF family across Norfolk (*based Downham Market but covering the whole county*) - <u>https://www.rafbf.org/news-and-blogs/raf-benevolent-fund-launches-new-</u>

community-scheme-help-isolated-raf-veterans

We estimate that there are approx. 42,000 veterans living in Norfolk, a significant number of which will have an RAF connection. Our World War Two and National Service generation are a shrinking demographic and by 2030 we have lost 400,000 of them. It is vital therefore that we reach these individuals now and make them aware of the welfare support available to them. It is for this reason that Fund is about to launch a <u>major reaching out campaign</u> to raise awareness. We know that too often pride and self-reliance holds veterans back from seeking the support available. We are therefore reaching out to their families and friends - we estimate that 1 in 3 people in Norfolk has known someone who has served or is serving in the Royal Air Force – to get these veterans back on our radar.

It is with this urgent need to reach out and raise awareness that I am contacting and visiting Town, Parish and Borough Councils across Norfolk and the Armed Forces Covenant Group at the County level. If any councillors are aware of any RAF veterans who may benefit from our support please ask them to call 0300 102 1919 or direct them to our campaign website at: <u>www.rafbf.org</u>.

As the Mundford Bowls Club need their premises for its own activities at this time of the year, the club took to the road in July and August and headed to The Imperial War Museum at Duxford where they were treated to displays of fighter and training aircraft which were rehearsing for the weekend's air show. Between the pauses in the flying displays we viewed the exhibits in the Land Warfare Building and visited the workshops where the vintage aircraft are restored.

The combination of the fine weather, excellent flying, interesting exhibits and convivial company made the day memorable and worth repeating next year.

In August, a few more of us set off for the Norfolk & Suffolk Aviation Museum at Flixton. Most of us had been there before but, with so much to see, interest was maintained for the whole five hours we were there. Whilst sitting aboard a Vickers Valetta – which served suitably as a reception centre – we were briefed by Steve, the chairman of the museum, who gave us an extensive and entertaining account of the initial and continuing developments of the project which functions almost entirely on volunteer support and public donations. Steve then took us on a private tour of some of the exhibits and even allowed the lucky few an opportunity to perform a simulated flight in a converted Bristol Sycamore helicopter. Another member of the crew, Ray, a wartime avionics expert, briefed some of us with his knowledge of early radar wizardry. We owe both chaps a debt of thanks for their attentiveness *and* tolerance towards our ribaldry and banter. Best wishes to you all at Flixton; you deserve it.

Barton Bendish Annual Parish Council Meeting held on 10th July 2019

The Chairman, Cllr Will Chapman, presided over the meeting and two members of the public were in attendance.

The PC considered concerns which had been raised by residents on Boughton Long Road regarding the wooden posts installed to protect the trod (informal footpath) on the corner. The concerns related to incidents of larger vehicles being unable to pass and fears that an accident could occur. The primary reason for installing the trod, and getting the wooden posts installed was to protect the safety of pedestrians using the road, including school children walking to catch the school bus. The PC felt that if the posts were removed this would leave pedestrians vulnerable if vehicles drove across the trod, as had happened in the past. It was therefore agreed that the posts should remain in place but that the PC would ask Highways to widen the other side of the road, as they had agreed to do this previously.

The PC had received complaints that dog fouling was still an issue within the village. Borough Councillor Colin Sampson informed the PC that the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk had agreed to employ a Dog Warden to help deal with several issues relating to dogs, including fouling, as many areas did have a problem with this. More information on this to be provided when the person is in post.

RAF Marham asked the PC to nominate 10 residents to attend their Annual Friends and Family Day on 25th July. As this was the second year this had happened the PC assumed that it could be an annual invitation and would therefore like to ask residents to contact the Clerk, on the details below, if they would like to be nominated to attend this event in future.

The PC had been approached by a local heritage group who had volunteered their services free of charge to carry out restoration and improvements to the Eastmoor telephone box, notice board and surrounding area. The PC agreed in principle to them carrying out work on the assets which were owned by the Parish Council, subject to approval of a schedule of work to be provided. It was expected that this work would take place in 2020.

The next meeting Monday 23rd September 2019. This will be an Ordinary Parish Council Meeting starting at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall.

St. Mary's Church Progress Report From The Friends of St Mary's



St Mary's has been nominated as a case study for a research project being undertaken by the University of Cambridge and commissioned by the Diocese of Ely on how churches are being used. An interesting meeting was held on the 1 August run by the researchers from Cambridge who asked a number of searching questions about the past and future vision of the church. Those who attended (there was very little notice) were enthusiastic and it was

clear how well supported and loved our building is! It is a 3 year project and we will have a short piece written about St Mary's - the results of the research will be interesting but the project is in year 1 so there will be a wait before any recommendations are known

A friend who is an ecclesiastical lawyer has recommended that we do not rush towards establishing a particular form of Trust to manage the repair of the Church as there are a number of models being explored by the Church of England and a number of churches experimenting with different models. It is clear that it will be important that the building remain consecrated to enable us to access the largest number of funding bodies for grants and from the village meeting we held in April it is clear the village would prefer the church to remain open for at least a limited number of special services such as the Christmas Carol Service, Remembrance and Harvest Services and that some form of Festival Church was the preferred option. There are a number of Trust options I am investigating and I will be seeking further advice from a range of organisations. It is clearly a complex area and one which is evolving!

In the meantime we are slowly making progress to identify the best thatcher to undertake the repair work to the thatched roof. We hope to have a target figure for the project identified soon and I will keep you updated. The fundraising continues and there is another quiz on Saturday 14th September to look forward to!

The insurance claim for the replacement of the lead roof is progressing slowly. The decision has been taken to replace the lead with Terne Steel which has no commercial value but which is approved by the Church of England as a heritage material and apparently looks like lead, so subject to getting all the necessary permissions at least hopefully the theft will not be repeated.

The AGM of the Friends will be held in October or November when I hope we will have further information as to the legal process and repairs. I would like this to be another village meeting and we will let you know as soon as a date is fixed....the support of the village as a whole is much appreciated.
