

A Parish Meeting was held in The Schoolroom on Thursday 1st March 1973 at 7pm, due notice having been posted.

Present. Mr & Mrs F. Savage, Mrs Savage Senior, Mrs Smith, Mrs Carter, Mrs Walton, Mrs Proctor, Mrs Quodling, Mr & Mrs J. Savage, Trevor Helen, Mrs Shephard, Mr T Rix, Mr R. Sherwood, Mr C. Rix, Mrs R. Payne & the Chairman.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read approved and signed.

#### Business Arising

The Chairman reported that the Grand Raffle organised by Mr F. Savage cleared £38.25. The draw was made by the Doctor, The Rev. S. J. Bennett & Mrs Bennett at 12.30pm on Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> July.

Mrs Payne said she was delighted to record in the minutes that Boughton had actually won the Best Kept Village Competition (for villages over 400 population) & also won the Best Kept Village Green Competition & were commended on the Cheshireyard. The presentation ceremony was held on the Village Green at 6.30pm on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> August. Mrs Semmonds, chairman of the Best Kept Village Competition unveiled the Plaque that was presented to the village for the year. She also presented a voucher for trees. Mr Dawson of the C.P.R.E. presented the chairman with a cheque for £10 in aid of trees. There was a large attendance of villagers & friends, the editor of the E.D.P., Mr Murphy of the County Council, & members of the Downham Amenity Society. After the ceremony, held in perfect weather, warm, sunny & calm, refreshments were served at a social gathering in the village school. A special Victoria cake, baked & iced by Mrs J. Gotlibe, was cut by Mrs Payne & passed round to everyone present.

In September, the Chairman stated that she had received a letter of congratulations from Commander McNeil

Smith R.N.(Rtd), from Portsmouth, enclosing a cheque for £5 for the village funds. The Commander had been born in the Rectory at Boughton in 1898, his father being rector for 7 years and his grandfather, the Rev. Smith Churchill, was rector for 44 years & had carried out the restoration of Boughton Church.

A few weeks later a further cheque for £5 & letter of congratulations was received from the Commander's brother Mr Charles D. Smith of Toronto.

The Clerk of the Council of the Doncaster R.D.C. wrote to the Chairman in October, conveying the congratulations of the Council to the Parish of Boughton & that this had been duly recorded in the minutes of the Council.

#### Business

The Chairman stated that she had been to see Mr Carter of Swaffham regarding the <sup>proposed</sup> carrying of a village sign for Boughton. Mr Carter had submitted his design and this was passed round for all to see, & depicted a rural scene with house & cartload of hay corn, & the words Boughton (Buckstuna) underneath. Buckstuna being the old name for Boughton in the Domesday Book, Mr Carter said that this could be done complete, for the sum of £80. This was approved by the meeting & the Chairman was authorised to make a firm order to Mr Carter.

It was reported that the two trees so far presented to the village had been planted, a forest beech in the north corner of the churchyard & a hornbeam on the verge by the Hallgate Parade, on the main street.

Mrs Page told the meeting that the Bishop of Ely would be visiting the Village on 11<sup>th</sup> June, during his 'Beating of the bounds' of his Diocese during the 1300<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Ely Cathedral. The Bishop was due to arrive by helicopter on the village green at 2pm. It was hoped that the village sign might be ready & in time for this day.

After some discussion it was decided to hold a villa-

Fete this summer, to be held on the village green on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> June. It was further decided to hold a Raffle again & Mr F. Savage was authorised to order the tickets. A further meeting to discuss the Fete was arranged for Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> March at 7pm in the Schoolroom.

Mr C. Rix enquired whether any arrangements had been made to clean the War Memorial. Mr Page said he'd made enquiries but had little success. Mr Long, stone-mason of Dorking was suggested & Mr Page promised to contact him.

Mr J. Savage raised the question of the possibility of purchasing a bus shelter for the village, which could be used by the schoolchildren and for general regular bus users. This was discussed at some length & Mr Page said he would look into the matter & investigate types & prices of suitable shelters.

Being no further business, the meeting was then closed.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read, approved and signed.

#### Business Arising.

The Chairman reported that the Village sign had been erected, and was unveiled by the Lord Bishop of Ely on June 11<sup>th</sup> 1973, when he was in Broughton during the 'Re-taking of the Bounds' ceremony as part of the 1300<sup>th</sup> centenary celebrations of Ely Cathedral.

#### Business

The chairman congratulated all those who had helped make the Village Fete held on 30<sup>th</sup> June, such an outstanding success, with a clear profit of £234. A special vote of thanks was made to Mr Frank Savage for so ably running the Fete.

As already announced - the Prizes, the chairman said that Copleham had won the Best Kept Village Competition this year, but only by a very small margin. Broughton were Runners Up, & were presented with a Token for 3 Trees for the village. Broughton also won the Best Kept Village Green Competition, and had received a Token for £10 towards something for the village green. After some discussion it was decided to ask for a seat & to let the Norfolk Society know that we would be willing to make up the amount if necessary. There was also some discussion on what trees to request. It was decided to ask for 2 oaks and a cherry, or 2 planes & a red map.

The Chairman then passed round some pages on new bus timetables & route numbers that had been sent by the R.D.C.

The Meeting was then asked for their ideas on what further amenities the village would like.

It was decided to definitely look into the possibility of having a bus shelter built, both for the schoolchildren and the local people. After several other ideas were discussed it was finally decided to offer to take all old Age Pensioners - the village to a show in Norwich, around Christmas time, free of charge. Any empty seats could be used & paid for by any others. Also the Meeting decided to send a donation of £10 to the <sup>Fareham</sup> Club of St. John's Ferg.

The Chairman was requested to ask the Council if the name plates for Church Lane could be changed to Church Road.

It was suggested that a coach be organised to take the people of Boughton to Norwich for Xmas shopping, sometime around the end of November.

Mrs Payne was asked if Peggs' Coaches could arrange for their coach to leave Boughton at 10.30 am <sup>for Downtown</sup> on Friday morning, could be changed to another time as there was another bus already at 10.30 am.

The Chairman was asked if anything could be done about the <sup>old</sup> road on the bend out of the village, which was so rutted it made access to the bungalow behind very difficult.

It was suggested that a Rocking Horse, or fixed swing with seat for Toddlers, be purchased for the playground. Mrs Payne said she'd look into prices.

It was further suggested that some daffodils be purchased & planted round the trees on the green.

Being no further business, the meeting was then closed.

A further Parish Meeting was held in the Schoolroom  
on Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> November <sup>1973</sup> at 7pm, due notice having  
been posted.

Present: Mr F. Savage, Mrs T. Smith, Mrs J. Savage,  
Mr C. Pix & the Chairman.

The Par<sup>y</sup>e read a letter of thanks from Mr Knappett  
of the Forgetmenot Club, Stoke Ferry, for the £10 donated  
to the Club by the Parish Meeting.

The Chairman then stated that the R.D.C. required  
the approval of the Parish Meeting to the request of  
the residents of Chapel Lane to change the lane name to  
Chapel Road, this to be forwarded with the signatures of the  
residents. Approval was given to this.

The Chairman told the Meeting that arrangements  
had been made to take the six pensioners of  
Boughton to the Black & White Minstrel Show in Norwich  
on Wednesday 2nd January 1974. Sixteen pensioners had  
accepted the invitation and in order to fill the coach  
seventeen adults & two children were also going but  
paying for themselves. Carles of Falderon were supplying  
the coach at cost of £10. for the return journey. The total  
cost to the Parish would be £19.60. (Tickets were £9.60.)

The proposed Bus Shelter was then discussed and  
Mr Payne produced a drawing of a shelter that  
Mr Tomlinson of Stow had given estimates as  
follows:- brick shelter - £175 - wood shelter £160.  
In view of current vandalism, it was decided to  
accept the tender for the brick shelter. The chairman  
was asked to emphasize the need for urgency for  
the shelter. Mr Miller was to be approached re the  
siting of this close to his farm entrance.

The Chairman said she had had quotations from  
the En-Tech (as long ago) and Messrs Wickhams & Co.,  
<sup>proposed</sup> for a metal working base for the children's playground.

both quotations were identical - £112. plus VAT. (£141.00). There was some discussion on the matter due to the large increase in price, and due to the small number of people present, it was decided to defer this matter until a future meeting.

A letter from the R.D.C. was read by the chairman concerning the need for Postal mini-buses. It was felt by the meeting that this could not be requested as no firm numbers of people requiring the service could be given.

Mrs T. Smith enquired of the chairman how soon the question of Peggy's bus co. changing the time of their bus to Doncaster from 12pm to 10.30pm will coincide with the Easter康蒂斯 time. Mrs Page said she'd not been able to trace the name & address of the bus company. Mrs Smith volunteered to obtain this, when Mrs Page would then take the matter up.

Being no further business the meeting stood closed.
