A Meeting of the Annual Parish Meeting was held in the Schoolroom on Tuesday 11th March 1975, at 7.15 pm, due notice having been posted.

Savage, Mr C. Armsby, Mrs Mrs Bert Armsby, Mr C. Rix * The Chairman. Apologies were received from Mrs W. Smith & Mr R. Payne. The Minutes of the last Meeting were read, approved and signed.

Business Arising. The Chairman noted the objection that the bus shelter - now half completed, had not been built according to the design committee, so that the floor had not been tilted & drainage holes needed to carry away rain water, as requested, & that a sloping roof had been agreed on & it would appear that a flat roof was going to be constructed. Accordingly she had contacted Mr Tomlison, the builder & he had agreed to take down the height by two courses of bricks - to put a sloping roof on & to see that the floor would drain adequately - all to be done at the original estimate. There was considerable discussion on the bus shelter & it was suggested that it was far to small & it would be better to enlarge it now than to wait until it was completed. A vote was taken & it was carried unanimously to authorise the Chairman to request the builder to extend the shelter by three feet & that the extra cost would be borne by the Improvements Fund. The chairman then reported that the cheque from the CPRE £-£10 had now been received & had been paid into the Improvements Fund.

The parson stated that the £40 donated by Mr Charles Smith of Toronto had gone towards purchasing of food parcels for all the old age pensioners of the village - the Parish Improvements Fund donating the balance of £32.09. The total cost of the parcels was £72.09. The parcels were delivered by Mr Brewster, Mrs Shepherd & Mrs Payne ^{just before Christmas.} They were much appreciated.

BUSINESS
The Chairman gave the statement of accounts as at 11/3/75 - The Parish Meeting Account £14.09. The Parish Improvements Account £426.32 with a further £175 committed for the bus shelter (this will now be increased for its enlargement).

Mrs Payne reminded the meeting that there was a notice on the Parish Board regarding concessionary Bus Fares for Old Age Pensioners, the Handicapped & Blind, permits were being issued by the West Norfolk District Council, at the Council offices in Dereham Market.

The Meeting then discussed the Bed Heist Village Competition & it was decided to enter again this year, though fears were expressed about the mud caused by the new buildings on Hill Hill Rd. It was also decided to enter for the Bed Heist Village Green & Churchyard.

The question of the large numbers of ducks & drakes on the pond was discussed & the Chairman was asked to try & arrange for surplus ducks to be caught & given away, or released at a suitable distance.

The Chairman told the meeting that the ^{P.X.} Committee under Mr Edwards were proceeding well. The fete to be held - June 14th would be opened by Lady Roberts of Cuckney Hall & that the other six villages in the Phoenix Cross Group of church, Winton, West Denham, Sheldham, Shouldham, Thorpe, Finham & Marham would all be running stalls. Baughton was undertaking the refreshments - under Mrs Shepherd - &

the competitions & side shows. Mr Frank Savage kindly offered to 'stage manage' the Fete. Mrs Poage said that the band of the Festhulme Secondary School were coming, so Wrenham School had promised to put on a country dancing display & Boulton School & art & model exhibition. It was suggested that a floral display be put on - the chair & pony an exhibition of by-gones.

As the Hall Mark Hatchmen were closing down, & they would not be able to supply the gang mowers in future for the grass cutting of the green, the Chairman suggested that it might be a good plan to approach Hall Mark to see if the ^{improvements} Council could purchase the gang mowers from them. This site was authorised to do.

A long questionnaire from the West Norfolk District Council on facilities & services given & ideas & suggestions were requested from the Parishes. The points were later one by one & suggestions duly noted.

The need for two more litter bins was brought up, one for the bus shelter & one overlooking the copper beech. The chairman was authorised to purchase these.

Mr Proctor brought up the question of the bad condition of the road access to Mrs C. Burton's bungalow at Mill Hill corner - this was a disused piece of road that was left behind a grass strip by the Council on the easement of the land on the road. It was stated that a bus driven by Mrs Burton for Waterfalls was the main cause of the rutting & mud on the entrance. Mrs Poage said she would take up the matter with the Council.

Bearing no further business the meeting closed at 9.30pm.

Motions The Minutes of the last meeting were read, approved and signed.

Business Arising.

The Chairman informed the meeting that because the bus shelter had to be half demolished before extending it a further three feet, that the cost had risen considerably. The builder had submitted a bill for £317.37. after deducting £50. all time sheets & work sheets had been submitted for scrutiny by the Chairman. Mr Payne's were in order, as the bill was duly paid.

It was reported that Broughton had won the Best Kept Village Competition - in the Village Green section. Mr & Mrs J. Savage, Mr & Mrs Proctor & Mrs & Mrs Shepherd went to Pulham Market to receive the prize from Lady Baconst. A cheque for £10 from The Norfolk Society & £10 worth of trees from the Economic Forestry Group. The Chairman read the judges report and also a letter from the Chairman of the W.N.D.C. expressing their congratulations. The Chairman thanked all those who had helped cut the green.

Mr Payne reported that the Primary Cross Groups of Church Yate - held in Broughton this year - made a net profit of £460. £450 was paid into the Church Restoration Fund & £10 donated to the Methodist Chapel.

The Chairman reported that the gang mower had been purchased from Hall Mark Hardware for the sum of £25.

The N.N.D.C. had promised two more litter bins for the village and the chairman was arranging to collect these.

Mrs Payne said that so far she'd been unable to get any satisfactory reply from the District Surveyor regarding the ownership of the corner plot at Mill Hill corner. Mr. Roden said the road was across the centre to the bungalow had very bad puddles & almost impassable. The chairman promised to take this up again & also the question of the bus which was kept on the open.

Business

The chairman said the finances were now rather depleted. The Parish Rates A/c standing at £11.88. and The Parish Improvements Fund £53.95.

In view of the financial state, it was decided to hold a village fete in early summer 1976.

The chairman then brought up the matter of the purchase of 18 acres of land^{on} which Mrs. F. Parker were installing a pig breeding unit of some 400 sows. She outlined the action she'd taken, contacting Mr. Sonnett, the chief Planning Officer, the Environmental Health Office & the Anglian Water Authority. All seemed to have sympathy but could not do much as it ~~hadn't~~^{didn't} ~~required~~^{permits} obtained any planning ~~action~~. The chairman said that she had reported the lack of water pressure to the A.W.A. on several occasions & now reiterated her fears that the pig unit would make matters far worse. The A.W.A. wrote to say that since turning off a valve in Stoke Ferry that the water pressure was now better - (this was agreed by all present) - & they would make double checks before connecting the Pig Unit - so the Boulton would not suffer... The Environmental Health Office stated that until there was a nuisance established they could take no action.

After much discussion it was decided to ask the

Chairman to contact Mr. Boller & ask him if he'd come out to look at the site & meet some residents who were expressing alarm & concern at the movements of the village. It was also suggested that the chairman write to the Gooderham Village Council to enquire how they'd managed to turn down the proposed proposed quarry.

It was further requested that chairman ask Mr. Robinson if he could move his much loved farm to field near the workshop & village centre.

The subject of the control over the use of the village pond was then raised. The chairman had raised the question of complaints of the people living around the pond regarding noise, parking, & use of gardens or bus shelter as a toilet etc., with the W.N.D.C. & the Harness of the District Secretary's office advised the chairman that since was the Parish Meeting could make its own ruling on control of fishing in the pond as it was the registered owner of the Pond as part of the village green. He also suggested that the Parish Meeting send to the Home Office for a copy of the Model bye-laws for Village Greens - & if appropriate - could alter & adopt a bye-law & send it up for approval.

After much discussion, it was proposed by Mr. Pearce & seconded by Mr. Brocton, & carried by 17 votes to 6 "That fishing in Boughton Pond be restricted to parishioners and children 16 & under". It was decided, however, that each parishioner had a right to have one guest to fish, in company with him/herself. It was further decided to review the situation at ^{the} next Parish meeting in the Spring. Mr. Paul Pix reminded the meeting that the close season for fishing was from March 14th to June 16th.

Mr. Paul Pix was then invited to make his proposition that the pond be dredged in order to clear deep mud & to enable water weeds to be planted to provide oxygen for the fish & pond life. Many fish having died due to the low

water level & lack of oxygen & algae caused by the very hot summer & continuous sunshine & lack of rain. It was estimated that the work would cost over £50 & also local farms would be required to cart the mud away. After discussion it was decided that a good rain would solve most of the trouble & that the Parish Meeting could not afford this at the present time, but this could be looked at again at a future date.

The misuse of the bus shelter by youths & fishermen using it as a latrine was brought up. It was decided to erect a notice on the shelter & to ask for co-operation of everyone to try & stamp out this undesirable habit.

Further concern about the Pig Unit was 16/- expended and it was proposed, seconded & carried by 30 votes to 1 with 5 abstaining, that the Chief Executive of the West Norfolk District Council (Mr Bottom) be asked to come out to view the site & to meet the villages concerned. The Chairman promised to write to Mr Bottom.

Several parishioners asked if the public footpath from Coston Common to the church lane could be re-made where it had been ploughed up - also if notices could be erected. It was asked if Messrs F. Parker knew of the footpath that crossed their land. The Chairman said she would look into the situation & report back.

Mr Roeder asked if the washing of paunches in the village pond could be stopped as it made a horrid smell & was very unhygienic as - the summer children paddled in the pond. There was general assent to this request so the Chairman was asked to request the person concerned to cease this activity.

Being no further business the meeting closed at 9.10pm.
